COUNTY EXECUTES 60-YEAR LEASE WITH GOLF CLUB ON LOCAL LINKS

In their regular session last
Monday, the Upton County Com-
missioners Court approved re-
ports submitted by the various
county officials and attended to
routine business.

Among items was a change or-
der for the McCamey Hospital in
which certain items were deduct-
ed or canceled on a contract
with Terrell Supply Company.

In another action, the court
approved publication of the quar-
terly Treasurer's Report in both
the Rankin and McCamey News.
This report had previously been
published on an alternating basis
in the two county newspapers.

In still a final move, approval
was given to a 60 year lease of
property presently occupied by
the Rankin Golf Club. This lease
is subject to Rankin Golf Club's
completion of a proposed loan
from the Farm Home Administra-
tion for some \$65,000 for impro-
vements to the installation. If
the loan is not completed, the
lease is void.

Terms of the lease call for the
payment of a \$1 a year fee by
the Club. A parts of the require-
ments for securing the loan
stipulate that the club must hold
a lease of one and one-half

times the length of the loan—
which, in this instance, will be
forty years.

The play: Also on Thursday—a week later on the 25th.

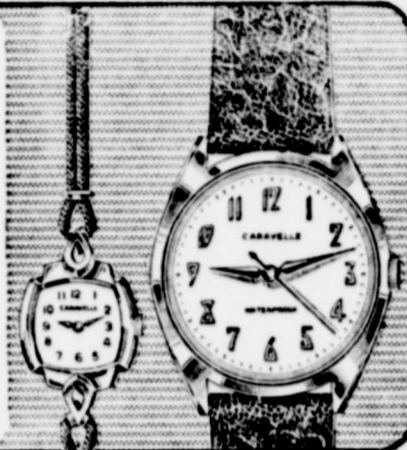

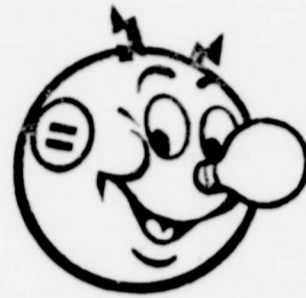

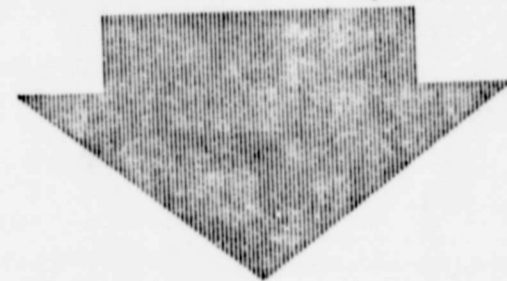

New County Citizens May vote in Primary

Voters in the May primary who moved into Upton County on or after November 4, 1967, must vote between now and April 30 in the office of county clerk, Mrs. Nancy K. Daugherty.

A new law enacted last year permits registered voters with less than six months' residence in a county to vote on all state-wide offices and issues if they have lived in the state longer than one year, but they must vote in the county clerk's office under procedures similar to absentee voting. The new law puts into effect a constitutional amendment adopted in November, 1966.

Formerly, a person who moved from one county to another within the state was totally disfranchised for the first six months after he moved.

The voter must appear in person at the clerk's office unless he is unable to appear because of sickness or physical disability or unless he is absent from the county during the time of absentee voting. Sick or disabled voters and those temporarily absent from the county may obtain a ballot by mail.

**Farm Home Adm.
 Aids Area Economy
 with \$743,290 Outlay**

A total of \$743,290 in loan funds were used during 1967 by the Farmers Home Administration office in Fort Stockton to support rural farms, construct homes for rural residents, develop water and sewer systems for rural towns, purchase farm land for farmers and carry out the other loan programs of the agency.

One of the heaviest demands for loan funds in 1967 was for rural home construction. The Ft. Stockton county office loaned a total amount of \$364,930 for rural homes in the 1967 calendar year.

One loan for a water and sewer system for the rural town of Sheffield was made in 1967. The loan is for \$83,500 and bids for this construction are being taken now.

FHA loans can be used to buy land, refinance debts, acquire livestock and equipment, pay fertilizer and fuel bills and pay other expenses connected with acquiring, improving and operating farms and ranches.

Loans are made only to families who are unable to obtain adequate credit from other sources. The program is tailored to individual family needs and loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm and money management.

The Stockton county office of FHA serves a land area of about 20,000 square miles and includes the counties of Pecos, Upton, Crane, Brewster, Presidio and Jeff Davis.

COUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

Warmer weather comes with insect problems in the garden. Knowing which insect is giving you the trouble can help you plan control for the pest. Insects such as aphids, thrips, psyllids, flea beetles and other "bugs" will be wing, stunting, wilting and severe infestations can result. They can introduce materials into the garden. Create honeydew on leaves, mold fungus grows. DDT and Malathion are re-

commended controls for sucking insects. Chewing insects are easily recognized. They eat holes in the leaves, stems and fruit. Carbaryl, DDT, Diazinon, Malathion, Methoxychlor and Rotenone are effective controls. Soil insects are especially harmful to seeds and young plants. Common insects in this group include many kinds of maggots, wireworms, cutworms, ants, white grubs and mole crickets. Treating the soil about four weeks before planting with 10 percent dust and either wettable powder

or 74 percent emulsion in water will control most soil insects. Checking the plants frequently and applying controls as needed gives an extra measure of protection against insect damage. Publication L-642, "Insect Control in the Home Garden," is available from my office, free of charge.
