THE GAMBLE—

On May 4 Texas voters will go to the polls and cast ballots in Primary elections. At the same time, they will vote on three referendum propositions. One on liquor by the drink, one on horse race betting and one on milk. The milk item has already been discussed in this column and it should be soundly defeated.

No discussion on horse betting nor liquor drinking will be carried here, simply because we all have our minds pretty well made up on these two questions and no amount of arguments are going to change us much one way or the other.

Still, there's a parallel between betting on a horse race and something most of us do all the time. Most of us—the editor included—do not think of ourselves as gamblers. I've never wagered a plugged nickle on a

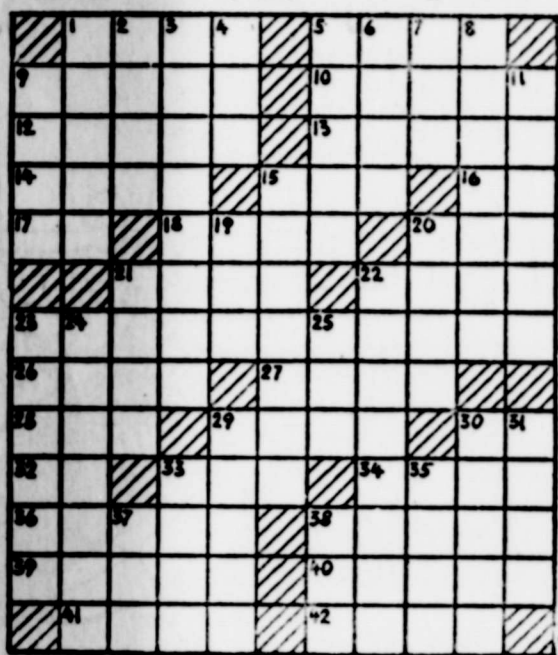

Why humiliate and embarrass the parents and crucify the child, if you are really interested in seeing that he has a chance to make a good citizen? The law gives the prosecutor with old foggy ideas a chance to help a child get back on the right track. The public interest is best served by producing as many responsible citizens as possible. It has been a rare thing in my experience to have a child get into trouble the second time.

I am asking for your vote and confidence based upon my record of performing the duties of the office. If you are not familiar with my record, please inquire. My history as County Attorney, as a citizen and as a helpful neighbor, will stand investigation.

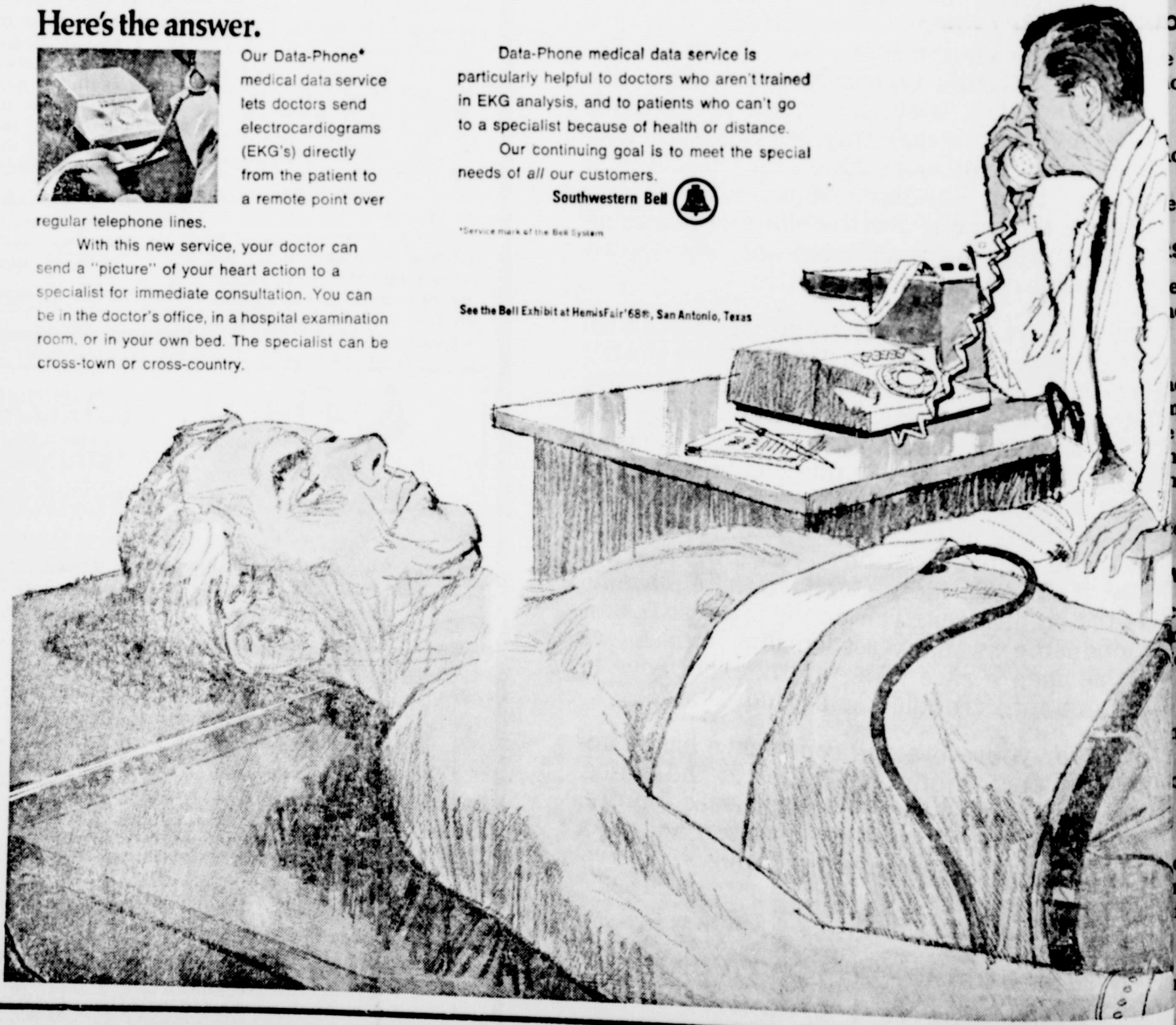

HINTS for the HOMEMAKER

By Mrs. Louie S. Jeffers, County Home Demo. Agent

CONSIDER ALL COSTS WHEN SHOPPING

Few homemakers take into account all their expenses when shopping. For example, consider the cost of driving an automobile to and from the grocery stores—if you shop at several.

These little forgotten items — which result in an extra trip — can be quite costly. Careful planning for shopping can save you many of these extra trips.

To arrive at the cost of picking up the forgotten items, do

some simple arithmetic. Jot down the mileage from your home to the store. Figure the round trip to the store for the trip when you forgot to get the item, then the second trip to pick it up. Use a conservative 7 cents a mile as the cost of driving. The trips actually cost more than this.

Next, consider other items you may have bought while you were in the store, such as candy bars, a package of chewing gum, and a magazine. Now add up the cost of travel and the cost of the impulse purchases. It may be

almost as much as the necessary things you went back to buy. So you may be spending a much larger amount than you thought just to get back to the store to buy the items you forgot.

Another factor to consider is your time. While your time at home does not have a dollar and cents rate, it could have been used in several different ways. There were many useful and productive things you could have done with that time, instead of re-tracing your path to the grocery store.
