# Housing Authority Lets Bid on Ten-Unit Work

In their bid opening on April 25, Rankin Housing Authority let the contract for the 10 low-rent housing units that are to be constructed here. Only one bid was received at this time.

Start of work will be delayed about 30 days due to the fact that the bid was some \$3,000 above the money available at this time. A request for the additional funds is now being processed through the Housing Administration in Washington.

"You will get your houses," said Mr. Homer Pace, architect and guiding hand of the Rankin project. "It is unfortunate that costs have increased so much since the budget was first made for the work; however, too much money has already been invested to turn back now."

West Texas Utilities Company will sponsor twenty-two students and teachers to the Eighth Texas Nuclear Science Symposium

for High Schools at the University of Texas on June 4-7.

Tommy Ray Thompson of Rankin has been selected by school officials to attend the four-day meeting. He will be accompanied by Roy R. Johnson, Rankin High School teacher.

Some 500 outstanding science students and their teachers will attend the meeting in Austin. They will have the opportunity to hear scientists from the fields of both industry and education discuss nuclear physics and related topics. Two afternoons will be spent touring the science laboratories of the university. Included will be visits to the experiments being carried on in thermonuclear (fusion) research by scientists at the university for the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

"West Texas Utilities Company is interested in this research as a future source of generation of electricity," Roff Hardy, president, said. "These experiments are aimed at eventual control of the nuclear reaction which takes

place in the hydrogen bomb. When harnessed, the energy released in this nuclear reaction could be used for such peaceful purposes as power generation."

## Danger Arises from Screwworm Pests

The costly livestock pest—the screwworm—is invading Texas again. Near ideal conditions exist for the propagation of the screwworm fly. For the first time in a number of years, the great abundance of wildflowers, weeds, and grasses along both sides of the U. S. Mexico border are contributing to the fly problem, now being aggravated by warm temperatures and humidity. Screwworm flies are also migrating northward in Mexico, and movement of livestock from the interior of Mexico to improved pastures near the border are other contributing factors to the potentially grave and repulsive screwworm situation.

As of April 8, Texas has had five confirmed screwworm cases, with two in Starr, two in Hidalgo and one in Kenedy counties. California has recorded six cases to date, and all are in Imperial county.

Realizing the graveness of the

situation, Dr. S. C. Gartman, veterinarian in charge of the Mission fly plant, and Dr. M. E. Meadows, Jr., veterinarian in charge of field operations, plan to make inspection visits—starting late this week and continuing for several weeks—to their field staffs and other key livestock leaders in crucial counties along the border.

Livestock people are asked to keep a close watch on livestock and check for possible cases. Also to treat any man-made wounds such as shearing cuts, marking cuts, etc.

### LEAF BEETLE CONTROL TESTED IN
