READY!

Last Balloting Until November --

Voters to Polls Saturday in Second Primary Vote

On Saturday, Texas voters will wind up what they started last May 4 and decide the Democratic nominee—and most likely — next Governor of Texas. Liberal Don Yarborough heads the ticket in Upton County, opposed by conservative Preston Smith.

For about half of the Upton County folk, there will also be a Commissioner race in the

Second Primary. In Rankin, the Precinct 1 voters at the courthouse and in Midkiff, will make their selections between Johnny Rankin and H. Wheeler. In McCamey, Precinct 3; Voting Box 4, the choice will be between Kenneth D. LaQuey and E. K. Bufford. For the remainder of the voters, there will be only the Governor's race.

The fact that the ballot is a short one has, evidently, not dampened voter interest if absentee balloting is any indication. Over the state as a whole, this portion of the voting is reported to be running high and in Upton County, Nancy K. Daugherty reported that 123 absentee votes were cast—a very respectable count for a Second Primary. The absentee polls closed last Tuesday, May 28.

Polls will open at 8:00 p.m. in the county and remain open until 7:00 p.m. Results should be available shortly thereafter due to the short ballot. Boxes in the Rankin-Midkiff area will be at the Courthouse for Precinct 1, the Park Building for Precinct 2, Voting Box 2, and at the Phillips Camp Recreation Hall in Midkiff for Precinct 1, Voting Box 3.

This will be the last balloting presently scheduled until the November General Election.

RODEO PLANS POINT TO BIG ATTRACTION

A report from the office of County Agent Dub Day this week indicates that plans are moving along well for the staging of the 19th Annual Upton County 4-H Club All-Kid Rodeo. Already one of the largest of its kind in the state, this year's event is expected to continue the pattern set over the past years of "bigger and better." Entries are coming in at a good clip and Day has said that he expects a full field when the show opens its two-day run June 7-8.

Another feature of the Rodeo, the Youth Horse Show, added a few years ago, is also expected to draw a large number of contestants from all over West Texas.

A considerable amount of remodeling work has been done on the arena area with the addition of new grandstands leading the list. All pens and chutes are now constructed of iron pipe and

mesh wire, welded and all painted in 4-H green. Cables and posts have been installed to direct the flow of traffic, both horseback, and in automobiles.

Day also said that the stock for this year's show was "the best available" and that there would be no lack of action.

Another highlight of the All-Kid Rodeo has been the parade, held on Friday evening. Floats, horses and a wide assortment of youthful cowboys and cowgirls are featured in the parade.

"Rodeo time is just around the corner," Day said, "and we hope everybody is getting ready for a big one."

Pecos Trail Caravan to Rankin Saturday

The Texas Pecos Travel Trail will be dedicated during a June 1 and 2 tour, with formal ceremonies Saturday night in Del Rio.

The tour will pass through Rankin at 8:00 a.m. Saturday and will stop briefly at the Rankin Drug. Several of the local dignitaries and interested citizens are to be on hand to extend a welcome.

The schedule calls for departure from Midland at 7:00 a.m. Saturday, with stops in all the towns along the way, arriving at the almost-completed Amistad Dam that evening where Governor John Connally is tentatively slated to preside over dedication ceremonies.

The Pecos Travel Trail is the third longest of 10 travel trails established this year by Governor John Connally, winding for an estimated 626 miles along a land of movies, caverns and of western lore. In addition to Upton County, the Pecos Trail passes through Crockett, Ector, Edwards, Kinney, Midland, Sutton, Pecos, Val Verde, Ward and Terrell.

COUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

There have been some inquiries about how to get borers out of trees. Here are some tips on the control of borers and other insects in the trunks of trees. If you already have borers in the trunks of trees, this will probably not do any good, but the best way to keep borers out of your trees is to start this type of treatment before you get them.

The adults lay eggs in the summer on the tree trunk. Eggs hatch in about 10 days. Borers enter the bark and feed on the cambium and inner bark at or below soil level. Any of the following treatments may be used:

1. Dieldrin spray— make two applications, one in early June and the second in mid-August. Use 1 tablespoon in 3 gallons of

water of 50 percent Dieldrin wettable powder. Apply material to run-off point on tree trunk. Take extreme care to prevent contamination of the fruit.

2. Paradichlorobenzene (moth balls)— Treat between October 20 and November 15 when the soil is dry and soil temperature is 55 degrees F. or above. Remove weeds and loosen and level soil about 1 ft. from the tree trunk. Place PDB crystals in a narrow circular band, preferably in a groove about 2 in. from the trunk. Place several shovels of clean soil over the crystals and mound the earth into a cone-shaped pile about 6 inches around the base of the tree. In placing the first few shovels of soil, avoid pushing any of the materials against the tree, since crystals in contact with the tree cause injury. Compact the soil

with the back of the shovel. Remove earth mounds in the early spring. For 2 and 3 year-old trees, use one-half oz. of crystals; 4 to 5 year old trees, three-fourths oz.; mature trees, 1 oz.
