With the Farm Home Administration, the Federal agency with which the club is negoiating their loan, all planning, along with tentative bids, may be submitted at one time. This "package" is then sent to the FHA's Temple office and if approved there, will indicate acceptance of the plans after which the loan will be approved. After approval of the loan, the money is said to usually be available with not more than 90 days.

"Unless we run into some unforseen difficulties," said Mr. Pace, "we ought to be underway within 90 to 120 days."

Plans expected to be approved will include a new club house, a swimming pool, a watering system for grass fairways, a gathering system and three more water wells. The proposed new club house will be approximately the same size as the present one but will be made of tile and brick with a design that will include locker and dressing rooms for men and women, a golfers grill, the "nineteenth hole" .a ballroom, a pro shop and assorted storage areas. There will be no living quarters in the new building. To provide living quarters for the caretaker, the club is considering the purchase of a trailer house.

New Mexico Firm Gets Low Rent Housing Award

A telegram from Cong. O. C. Fisher in Washington advised the Rankin Housing Authority that their request for additional funds for the low rent housing program here had been approved by the Housing and Urban Affairs Department. The increase amounted to some \$8,000 and was made necessary when, after advertising for bids two different times, the local authority found that they did not have enough money alloted to go into construction on the ten-unit project.

However, with the notification by Congressman Fisher that more money was forthcoming, the program, which had been more or less in suspension for the past 30 days, moved into high gear with telephone calls from the Ft. Worth office of HUD and the receipt of the usual stack of paperwork.

On Tuesday the Gray Construction Company, 518 N. Turner Street, Hobbs, New Mexico, was officially notified by the Rankin Authority that they had been awarded the contract to build the houses. A pre-construction meeting was set up in Fort Worth for Thursday, June 27 at which time

contracts will be signed and other details attended to. Following this meeting, the contractor will have ten days in which to begin work—which means that by July 7, the Rankin Housing Project, started in December, 1965, will have worked its way through several thousand sheets of forms, over \$12,000 in preliminary costs—and finally started

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

Pesticide accidents don't just happen-they are caused by people who do not use chemicals properly.

Don't let a pesticide accident mar the pleasure you get from gardening activities. Just remember these safety precautions:

-Identify your pest carefully. You may choose the wrong chemical and be dissatisfied with the results.

-Read the pesticide label properly and thoroughly.

-Follow all directions and precautions exactly, including the wearing of respirators and protective clothing when recommended.

-Keep unused pesticide containers under lock and key, and away from children and pets.

-Avoid breathing the pesticide mist or vapors.

-Don't spill liquid concentrates on your skin.

-Wash your hands immediately after using any pesticides.

A mulch works like a silent gardener helping to stabilize soil temperature, hold moisture and prevent growth of weeds around trees and shrubs and in flower beds and vegetables.

An organic mulch can be of straw, sawdust, bark. You can use an inorganic mulch such as gravel or plastic film in very light weight. Don't use clear plastic because sun light penetrates and allows weeds to germinate and

Coffee grounds, wood shavings, wood chips and chopped leaves can be used as mulches. A solid mat of leaves prevents air exchange needed to keep the surface water from getting stale so grinding the leaves is preferred.

Peat moss is a good soil conditioner and mulch. But mulches should not take the place of fertilizer.

Straw makes a good mulch in the vegetable garden but for use around shrubs, in flower beds and flower pots, something prettier such as gravel chips in white or colors like blues and reds works best. These chips are coarser than gravel and should not be mixed

Generally mulches are used 1 to 2 inches deep. It's often hard to estimate the bushels or bags needed. Baled mulches sometimes have tags that tell the coverage to expect.

If you're counting calories, count on buttermilk as the perfect beverage.

With buttermilk, sacrificing calories doesn't mean a sacrifice in enjoyment. Buttermilk has its own temptingly smooth and mildly acidic flavor. It's thirst-quenching and adds to the pleasure of good eating.

Buttermilk's tangy flavor can be attributed to the special bacterial culture. Salt is usually added to help bring out the natural taste.

For variety try a half-andhalf combination of buttermilk and tomato juice. A pineapple juice-buttermilk drink can be made by combining 11/2 cups of buttermilk and pineapple juice, after which add 1 to 2 tablespoons of lemon juice and 1/4 to one-third cup of sugar.

Buttermilk and other dairy products are pientiful now. You will enjoy using buttermilk in cooking. It offers uniform texture as well as flavor goodness.



Report Published on **Upton County Water** from Survey Work

ED.: Several years ago, a water report on Upton County was began through the Commissioners Court, working with state and federal agencies. The report has now been completed and published in book form. The following news release is one received here this week concerning the report.

Upton County's water supplies are obtained almost exclusively from wells, according to a new Texas Water Development Board publication. The report, "Ground Water Resources of Upton County. Texas," was written by D. E. White of the U.S. Geological Survey. It was prepared by the Survey in cooperation with the Water Development Board and the Upton County Commissioners Court.

Large supplies of ground water were found stored in the Trinity Sand, the county's principal aquifer. About 8 million acre-feet is available to wells. but its renewal is extremely slow. "Because of the low rate of recharge," the report concludes.





On 20,000 gallons, the old rate would be \$13,00 and under the summer rates, \$10.50.


Property owners are reminded that bills received from the City water department also contain charges for sewer connections and for trash hauling in addition to the water charges.
