





"The professor is entitled to his opinions and to his expressions; but the officials of the University should be just as free of decide they no longer need him around to spread the seeds of revolution in the minds of Texas young people" Baker said.

in questioning the criminal- for whom freedom today has become an escape hatch for all sorts of crime.

Freedom of information laws passed by Texas lawmakers in recent sessions were praised as being a protection for the public's right to know-and not a license for the press to slant news-in any direction, liberal or conservative.

Law abiding citizens are entitled to own and keep their guns without restriction or license for lawful use, he said.
