## RED DEVILS TO COAHOMA FOR 1968 BALL SEASON OPENING

With possibly their best opportunity for a district championship in a number of years ahead of them, the Rankin Red Devils open their 1968 football season in Coahoma Friday night in what will surely be a test of their championship material. Kick-off time is 8:00 p.m.

Rankin will field a team that is generously seeded with seniors and better than usual—for Rankin—speed. Passing is expected to play a major part in their game plan but they do have a reasonable amount of power into the line and good speed for the end runs.

The Red Devil defense has not been as solid as the coaching staff would like but in two scrimmage games, the Red Devils have not given up a score from mid-field.

Against the Red Devils, Coahoma's Bulldogs will pit a team that is not quite as strong as the one fielded in 1965—the last encounter between the two schools. That year, Coahoma was rated 5th in the state, a position they held most of the season. In 1965,

they defeated the Red Devils by a 20-0 mark. In 1964, it was Coahoma by 21-13 in a game in which Rankin won all the statistics but lost the score.

In 1963, Rankin shelled the "Dogs" 31-14 and back in 1962—the first eleven-man game for the two, Coahoma took the tilt 22-6.

Rankin will be without the services of John Kidd and Lester Titsworth, two senior performers. Otherwise, they are expected to have all performers in condition for the game.

As pointed out by head coach Wayne Mitchell, "we need to win this one—to get our season off to a good start—and to get the series on a little more even basis."

And the word in Rankin this week has been, "Bust the Bulldogs."

Done up in something like 150 pages of art work and mixed-up charts that will require about thirty minutes per page of study to make any sense at all, the report was mailed this week to newspapers and, I guess, to schools since that's what it's all about.

In listing the people who were appointed by Johnny to get out this report, it will be noted that the only one living west of Fort Worth was way out in Abilene unless you count Amerillo—although one once lived in Midland. None from El Paso, none from Lubbock, none from Midland or Odessa. In other words, West Texans as usual with things done out of Austin—didn't have a voice in the undertaking.

Among the proposals made by the committee is one—in effect—that says all schools in Upton County are to be combined.

## George Baker Hits the Campaign Trail

Big Lake—Responsible officials should have the same freedoms of choice as fellow-traveler professors using freedom of speech as a guaranty of immunity for advocating overthrow of the American form of government. Big Lake Lions Club members were told at their Thursday luncheon by George Baker of Fort Stockton.

Baker, veteran Fort Stockton newspaper man and civic leader who is the Democratic nominee to succeed Gene Hendryx, Alpine, as state representative for the 66th District, is launching an active campaign in all thirteen counties of the vast district.

"The professor is entitled to his opinions and to his expressions; but the officials of the University should be just as free of decide they no longer need him around to spread the seeds of revolution in the minds of Texas young people", Baker said.

In his discussion of the freedom theme he called for a reversal of the swing of public opinion to back legislation which would seek to improve the position of the officer of the law

in questioning the criminal—for whom freedom today has become an escape hatch for all sorts of crime.

Freedom of information laws passed by Texas lawmakers in recent sessions were praised as being a protection for the public's right to know—and not a license for the press to slant news—in any direction, liberal or conservative.

Law abiding citizens are entitled to own and keep their guns without restriction or license for lawful use, he said.

### THE RED DEVILS—

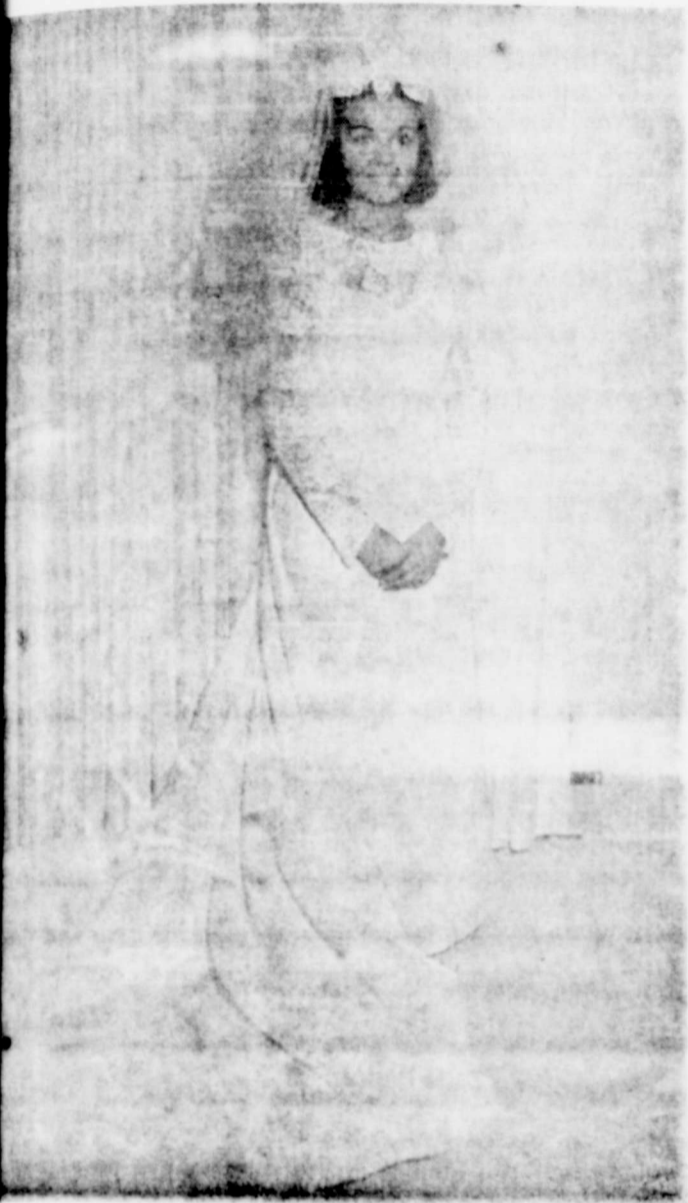
