## Plans Made for Veterans School Open in Friona

Plans are underway to start a Veteran's Vocational School here. Although the school will be set up to cover most vocations, a class in agriculture is planned for the beginning. The school will be an approved school of education, and veterans attending will receive a subsistence allowance of \$90.00 a month if married, and \$65.00 if single.

Qualifications for entering this school are, that the veteran must be a farm or ranch owner-operator, or renter-operator. Disabled veterans are also eligible to attend.

The school will consist of about eight hours class and shop work per week, with 3 to 4 hours of group work and two hours individual work with instructor; most of which will be at night.

Each instructor is limited to twenty trainees and only one class will be started now. Other classes can be added if enough veterans want the school.

Several veterans have already asked to be in the first class. First come will be first served. For further information inquire at Dan Ethridge's office.

NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF PARAMER

To the Resident qualified Property Taxpaying Voters of Paramer County, Texas.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 5th, day of November, 1946, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 12th, day of August, 1946, which is as follows:

On this the 12th, day of August, 1946, the Commissioners Court of Paramer County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Farwell, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit:

A. D. Smith, County Judge, W. H. Filppin, Commissioner Precinct No. 1, F. T. Schlenker, Commissioner Precinct No. 2, T. E. Levy, Commissioner Precinct No. 3, W. S. Menefee, Commissioner Precinct No. 4, being present, and, among other proceedings had by the Court were the following:

Commissioner F. T. Schlenker introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner W. H. Filppin. The motion carrying with it the adoption of the order prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Commissioners W. H. Filppin, T. E. Levy, F. T. Schlenker, W. S. Menefee; NOES: Commissioners, none; The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9 of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may reallocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8 by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, at a general or special election, and in event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Paramer County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided; THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF PARAMER COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held in said County on the 5th day of November, 1946, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified taxpaying voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of PARAMER COUNTY, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding Fifty-Five Cents (55c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

Not exceeding Thirty Cents (30c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

Not exceeding Five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and

Not exceeding Five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be authorized, by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

"AGAINST RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows: PRECINCT NO. VOTING PLACE PRESIDING OFFICER

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows: The same polling places and the same presiding officers as have been heretofore selected and appointed respectively to hold the General Election on November 5, 1946 in Paramer County.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES," at the Courthouse door of said County, and in each of the election precincts of said County for thirty (30) days prior to the election, which notices shall be posted by the Sheriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.

Notice of said election shall also be given by publication thereof in a newspaper published in Paramer County, once each week for three consecutive weeks, the date of first publication being not less than twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date of said election.

ADOPTED AND APPROVED, this the 12th, day of August, 1946.

60 percent of Americans are alcoholic addicts. During the war many essentials were reduced in order that liquor might be made, and supplied to our armed forces as well. **Southwest Markets Up for Grains; Poultry, Eggs, Cotton Says USDA**

SEPTEMBER 30

(USDA)—Southwest markets reported higher prices for cotton, grain, poultry and eggs last week, stronger trends for livestock, and a weak undertone for most vegetables, according to USDA's Production and Marketing Administration.

Southwest fruits and vegetables picked up strength near the close of last week at central markets because of the Jewish holiday. Louisiana and Texas sweet potatoes moved in light volume at steady prices. Kansas honeydew melons were slightly weaker, but apples held steady. New Mexico moved apples and carrots at about steady prices but onions remained dull and weak. Oklahoma apples and turnip greens found firm demand at firm prices. Colorado out-ranked most states in heavy shipments of onions, potatoes, cabbage, cauliflower, tomatoes, peaches and pears. Shipping point prices ranged from steady on cabbage to dull and weak on onions.

Prices of most grain moved higher last week as supplies began to tighten. Wheat gained one to two cents a bu., oats and corn three, and barley two cents. Sorghums lost gains made early in the week but closed higher. Feed was unsettled.

Cotton jumped about \$4.50 a bale this past week to reach a new 26-year high. Farmers sold freely and received prices unusually high in relation to central market prices. Sales in the 10 spot markets totaled 172,500 bales last week compared with 129,500 bales a week earlier and 142,200 bales for the same week last year.

Domestic wools were active in Boston and producing areas due to a rumor or a price increase. Rush of buying took 10 million pounds of Texas wool. Adult mohair sold at 61 cents.

Spring lambs and aged sheep were generally up 25 to 50 cents a cwt. last week over the previous week's close. Southwest markets reported active trading for light supplies. Good and choice springers realized \$17.75 to \$18.25, Wichita: 17.75 to \$18, Denver: \$17.50 to \$18, Oklahoma City; and \$17, Fort Worth. Mostly eyes showed up at San Antonio where common and medium kinds sold at \$6.50 to \$7.

Meager supplies of eggs brought ceiling prices at all markets.

Most southwest cattle markets reported light receipts last week with heavy runs of stockers. Active trading cleared most offerings at steady to stronger prices. Houston quoted stocker steers \$13.50 and canner and cutter cows 50 cents higher at \$6.50 to \$8.50 a cwt. Medium and good cows brought \$10.50 and stocker calves \$14 to \$15.65 at San Antonio. Medium and good slaughter steers and yearlings realize, \$15 to \$18, Fort Worth and \$15.2 to \$17.25, Oklahoma City. Denver sold common and good stocker, and feeder steers at \$10 to \$16. Wichita moved medium and good light stocker steers and yearlings at \$14 to \$16.

Poultry and eggs found only fair demand last week despite meat shortage. Most dealers attributed this to rising prices. Current receipt eggs ranged from 40 to 45 cents depending on locality. Heavy hens brought 40 to 41 cents a lb., New Orleans; 28 to 30, Fort Worth, 26 to 30 Denver and 26 to 28 Dallas.
