Rankin Housing Authority began operations in February of this year, was filled up by March 1 and reached the end of their Initial Operating Period on June 30.

At the close of the IOP, the project went on "its own" as far as maintenance and cost operations are concerned. No further Federal operating funds will be available although the Federal HUD department will make annual contributions in the amount of approximately \$7,000 to help repay the funds used for construction.

At the end of their IOP, it was determined that the project owed to the City of Rankin, in lieu of taxes, some \$123, covering the income operations since the February opening. A check was given the city secretary at the end of the IOP.

Currently the project has two two-bedroom apartments vacant and are receiving applications for their rental by qualified persons.

Classes Open Monday, August 25th --

Registration Opens Monday for 1969-70 School Term

Registration for the 1969-1970 term at Rankin Schools starts next Monday, August 18. First day of school will be Monday, August 25.

The following is a schedule of registration for all students who will attend RUSD this year:

Students who will be attending Rankin High School for the first time this year, and those students who did not pre-register last spring are to register Monday. They should report to high school principal A. C. Copeland between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

On Tuesday, August 19, students who attended Rankin Schools last year and who will be classified as juniors or seniors during the upcoming term are to report to the principal. Freshmen and sophomores will then report on Wednesday, August 20.

Classroom assignments will be made during this time, lockers assigned and books and book covers will be issued. Students will

be requested to cover their books properly before being dismissed.

Students are asked to adhere to the above schedule, and only for emergency reasons will there be any deviation. Students are also requested to wear conventional clothing when they register.

JUNIOR HIGH, ELEMENTARY

It is requested that all new elementary and junior high school students who did not attend Rankin Schools last year report to their respective buildings for registration Tuesday, August 19.

Mr. Mike Hughes, elementary principal, will register all new

students in grades 1 thru 4 in the elementary principal's office between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Mr. Hughes states that those first graders who have already received their notices or information of their registration need not report.

Junior high principal, Mr. E. G. Walker, will register new students in grades 5 thru 8, Tuesday, August 19, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Mr. Walker also said that those students who attended Rankin Schools last year and pre-registered need not take further action until the opening of school on August 25.

New Coach Well Pleased—

Red Devil Work-Outs will Start on Monday

"It looks like we're going to have a good bunch of tough ball players—the kind I like," said Coach George Boal this week following his first get-together with some thirty-nine prospective Red Devils at a meeting last Tuesday night. About a half dozen more are expected to report as soon as the return from vacations and other out-of-town trips.

Preliminary activities were underway this week such as issuing shoes and undergoing physicals prior to opening of the regular practice session Monday, August 18. Coach Boal said that two workouts would be held daily — helmets and shoes in the mornings at 9:00 a.m., followed by an evening two-hour practice in full uniform. The evening sessions are to be determined as to time by the weather. Some will be under the lights.

Rankin has two scrimmages on schedule during the pre-season workouts—one here with Stanton and one in Wink. Times and dates will be available to fans later.

said that he will institute a policy of awarding a purple helmet to players who exhibit outstanding performance and attitude, both in practice and in the games.

"Only our outstanding players will wear a purple helmet," he said. "And they will have to earn it."

In order to earn the right to this mark of distinction the player must give 100 percent in practice, 100 percent in the game and be 100 percent hard-nosed, as well as being able to play both offense and defense, according to the

KORNER**



Extra care of roses during August and September can mean more beautiful blooms this fall.

Check the mulch applied in the spring. Make certain it is still at least an inch or two thick. Water the rose bed thoroughly as needed and soak the soil to a depth of 8 to 10 inches. Frequent light waterings encourage shallow root development and make the plant susceptible to disease.

It is also essential that the spray program be continued, even though the weather is hot and dry, to prevent blackspot. Heavy dew in

the mornings will encourage black spot just as do frequent showers in the spring.

The rose plant should be sprayed with a fungicide containing maneb or folpet every 10 to 14 days. Continue the spray program until the first killing frost because the leaves are the food manufacturing organs of the plant. Thus, it is essential to retain as many leaves as possible to build up food reserves in the plant and to promote larger flowers with more intense color. Good food reserves will also help the plant to withstand severe winter weather.

Examine rose plants at this time of the year with a critical eye to determine if there are plants which need replacing. Many excellent rose varieties are available. It's a waste of time and effort to keep plants which do not live up to your expectations.

USE OF DISGUISED PLASTICS IN FURNITURE

Consumers can expect to see more and more disguised plastics in furniture. Furniture manufacturers are stepping up the use of plastics in furniture. But for the most part, the plastic resembles wood in appearance.

The increasing scarcity of furniture wood is prompting expanded uses of plastics for shelves, drawers, decorative details and even furniture pieces molded entirely of plastic. Plastic provides lighter weight and lower cost furniture than when fine hardwoods are used.

Since the use of plastics in furniture is often difficult to detect, consumers should always read labels and ask questions to determine materials used in the construction.

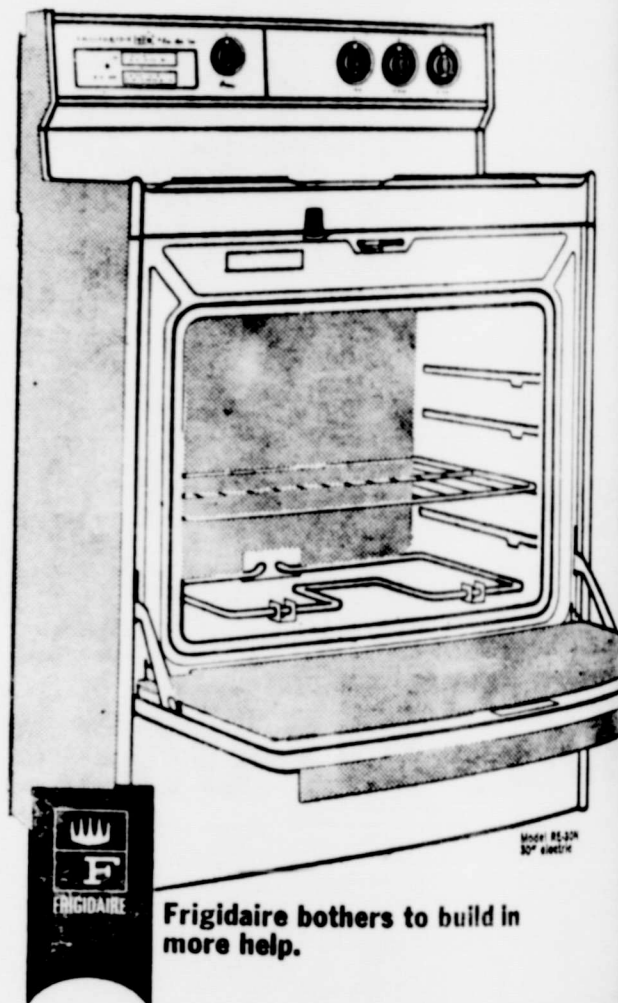

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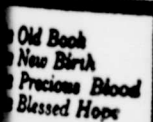
