School Board Meeting Covers Routine Items

School Board met last night for their regular session. Matters at hand were of a routine nature.

The board was the rearrange-ment of the school calendar so that holidays are to cover the school year.

Dates will be announced for substitute teachers to be more in line with other schools. Previously, non-degree substitutes were paid \$15 a day. These were increased to \$15.00 and \$17.50. Adams advised the accreditation team from the Southern Conference of

Colleges and Secondary Schools would be in Rankin in December to do a re-valuation study of the local system. For the past several years, Rankin Schools have held full accreditation for all three sections; elementary, junior high and high school.

Bills were paid, new teacher contracts approved and the tax rate for formally adopted.

Badgers in Favorites Role --

Rankin to McCamey for Upton Championship Tilt

After finding the Coahoma Bulldogs to be pretty rounchy characters, the Red Devils this week go on the road for a visit to the den of the McCamey Badgers. A short trip, it may be a long ride home for the Maroon and White and their followers.

McCamey last week put the stopper on Alpine—a pre-season favorite in West Texas to be a tough team—by a 10-0 score. The McCameyites also hold a scrimmage win over the Lakeview Chiefs.

They are big and well experienced and are talented both on offense and defense.

To offset this, Coach Boal and his Red Devils have put in several hard workouts this week trying to make use of the lessons learned in the Coahoma game. With new men in almost all positions and using the new Houston pro-type

defense, the Rankin squad is believed to still be several games away from their top-performance conditioning.

In the current series of games, Rankin holds only one win and one tie over the Badgers. Most of the games have been well contested with Rankin having skunked the Badgers twice and had the favor returned only one — last year's 0-0 affair, played in a ty-

pical West Texas rain—a lot of thunder, lightning, wind and a smidging of wetness.

Red Devils Find Bulldogs' Bite Worse Than His Bark

With a full house for openers, the Rankin Red Devils found the Coahoma Bulldogs tougher than expected and were shocked by a 32-0 lead ran up by the visitors in the first half of play.

Using traps and sweeps, Coahoma roamed almost at will in their first few possessions of the ball as the Red Devils tried to adjust their defenses.

Between Coahoma touchdowns, Rankin never maintained possession of the ball for more than three plays and a kick. But then things changed.

On the tail end of the second quarter, Pina picked out Vick in heavy traffic along the far sideline, laid out a nice pass and the speedster raced across the goal-line going away. Again, in the 3rd quarter, Rankin moved the ball both on the ground and in the air and tapped the Dogs for more points when Pina laid a pass on Kelly in the end zone. Kelly made the completion while being racked by the Coahoma defender.

Beginning midway in the second quarter, the Rankin defense put the stopper on the Coahoma offense to the extent that the visitors were never able to score again although they ran rather freely in the mid-field area.

Although the Bulldogs had the strength to move the ball well, Rankin almost made a close thing out of the game. After putting two touchdowns on the board—and an extra point by Titsworth, Vick almost outraced the opposition in a punt return up the middle. He was headed for the end zone when finally stopped near mid-field. Had he broken through the last defenders, it would have been no

contest.

Again, with speedy Booker T. (Lightning) Dixon running the ball—a job he did well all night—one block downfield would have resulted in another Red Devil score and what would probably have meant a new ball game.

Among fans the general feeling appeared to be that the Coahoma team was a well polished ball club and that they outgunned the Rankin squad during the first half. In the second half, most of the action went to the Red Devils who came close to pulling it out of the fire.

**Boat Operators must
Report on Accidents**

If you operate a boat, you had better read up on the laws and regulations governing same.

The Texas Water Safety Act now requires boat operators involved in a collision with other boats to assist each other and file a report of "the accident" if amount of damage exceeds \$50.

The operator must assist so far as he can other persons affected by the collision "without serious danger to his own vessel, crew and passengers" in order "to save them from or minimize any danger caused by the collision, accident or casualty . . ."

The operator must assist, so far as he can, other persons affected by the collision "without serious danger to his own vessel, crew and passengers" if damaged by the accident.

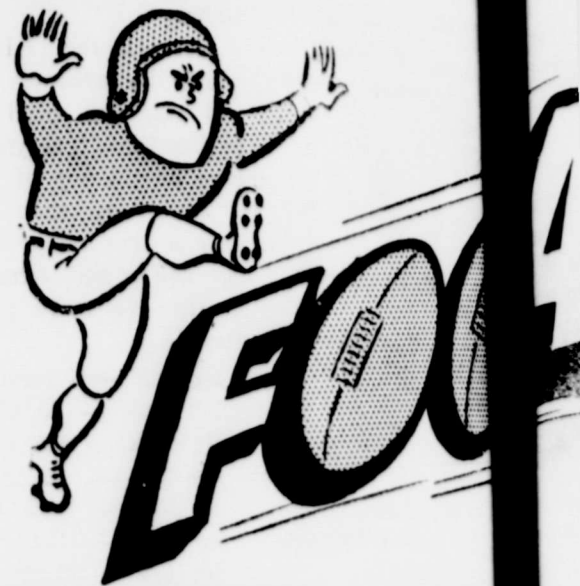

have been reported in recent weeks, as all worm samples being received have continued to decline from seasonal norms. We hope that ranchers are all checking their heards carefully, and that the cases reported reflect a true picture of the situation.
At mid-week, no screwworm cases had been reported. This stretches out the number of crew worm-free days in Texas to 28. However, ranchers should continue ont he alert for screwworms since recent rains and high humidity can cause serious worm problems in a hurry.
New Mexico reported the last previous crewworm case on August 18, in Lincoln Country. Texas' last confirmed case was on August 13., in El Paso County.

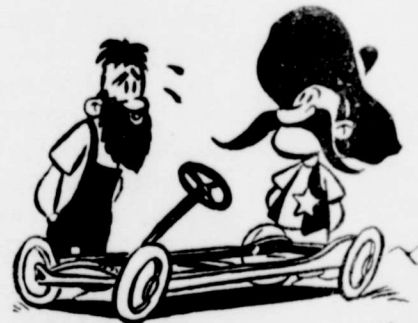
