Gary Houchins in Tokyo Hospital

Gary Houchins, son of Mr. and
Mrs. Leon Houchins of Rankin, is
in a Tokyo, Japan hospital re-
covering from wounds received in
Viet Nam action. He called his
parents last Monday and report-
ed that he was doing well.

Houchins, who only recently ar-
rived in Viet Nam where he was
assigned to the 196 Americal Di-
vision, was wounded in both legs
and the shoulder when his eight-
man outpost was hit by an en-
emy force. Two Americans were
killed and the other six injured.

At this time it is not known
whether the Rankin G. I. will be
returned to Viet Nam or not after

PAY ATTENTION—

As you all know, Congress is in the process of taking care of all of us taxpayers. They are going to rewrite the income tax law and plug up some of the loopholes so that everyone pays his fair share.

As picked up from last week's Wink Bulletin, here is one of the proposals that is going to make it easier for all of us. It is from the proposed Tax Reform Act of 1969 (H.R. 13270).

Here is part of Sec. 277, "Limitation on Deductions for Individuals":

"(a) General Rule—If a taxpayer (other than a corporation) has allocable expenses for a taxable year, the deduction otherwise allowable under this chapter for such expenses shall be disallowed

to the extent of an amount equal to the lesser of—

"(1) the aggregate of such expenses multiplied by the section 277 fraction, or

"(2) the allowable tax preferences.

"(b) Section 277 Fraction — For purposes of this section, the section 277 fraction is the fraction the numerator of which is the allowable tax preferences and the denominator of which is the sum of the allowable tax preferences plus

Grading System Used to Rate Red Devils Performance

Coach George Boal this week released the results of the grading system used to score performances of the individual members of the Rankin Red Devil squad in their game last Friday in McCamey. Boal explained that this system is one that has been in use for many years in determining the performance of a football player.

Grades are arrived at by the coaching staff from viewing the game movies. A grade of 60 is considered a winning grade — if its for linemen, and 75 or better for the backs and receivers. However, it is possible to win even when the team, as a whole, does not perform up to the passing standards. This would generally be in instances where the opposing team had a poor performance record for the game.

Selection of boys who earn one of the maroon helmets is also determined from these grades. In the McCamey game, Bob Parham, a lineman, and Jim Vick, from the backfield, made passing marks on both offense and defense and were the first to earn the right to wear the maroon helmets.
