Rankin to Van Horn for Chase of District Leader

In what is definitely a do-or-
die situation, the Rankin Red
Devils face the tough and talent-
ed Van Horn Eagles Friday in
Van Horn. Kick-off is 7:30 p.m.—
our time.

With their top scoring ace out
of the line-up, the Rankin squad
was faced with several days of
wet, chill weather in their work-
outs. However, Coach Boal re-
ported that the team was in fine
spirits and that their shifted line-
up—due to the injured Vick—was
working hard to get their offen-
sive unit going.

This will be the 12th meeting
of Rankin and Van Horn in the
current eleven-man series. Start-
ing back in 1952, the Red Devils
have a slight edge, having won
six of the games and tied one.
The Eagles have won four—two
by hefty margins. The past re-

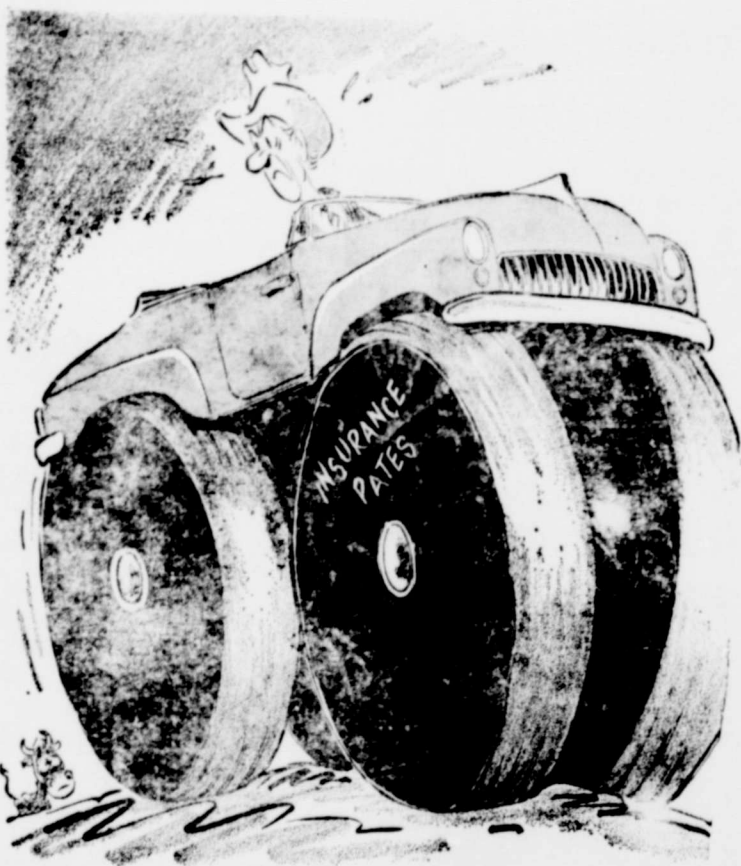
pound. Needless to say, the Agent sounded like a Chamber of Commerce booster as he told of the possibilities of pecans for this particular part of West Texas.

**KOUNTY AGENT'S
KORNER**



Increasing numbers of screw-
worm cases are being reported
south of the Rio Gradne, and of-
ficials of the Screwworm Eradi-
cation Program warn that more
cases are likely to occur noth of
the river along the border.

Although colder weather is at
hand in some areas of the state,
in order to knock out screwworm
flies, temperatures must dip to
below the 45-degree mark and
remain at that level for a pro-
longed period. Otherwise, as mid-
day temperatures warm up, the
flies become active again and
continue to cause livestock dam-
age.

Most recent screwworm cases
occurred in Presidio and Pecos
Counties above the Big Bend a-
rea on October 8 and October 10.
No additional cases have been
confirmed since that time. How-

ever, producers should continue
on the alert for new cases of
screwworms, and send in samp-
les of all worms found in any
wounds so that positive identifi-
cation can be made.

Only when cases are confirm-
ed can sterile fly treatment get
underway. So it continues to be
important to report all cases or
suspected cases so that we can
know where to drop the sterile
flies.
