This tree, which consists of strands of colored lights reaching from the top of the tower to the ground and arranged in the shape of the traditional Christmas tree, can be seen for many miles on a clear night and has drawn wide comment. And this year's will be even more spectacular, according to the Lions Club. They have made

Rankin gets taste of west Texas weather quirks—

How about that -- it snowed

It snowed in Rankin. That, in itself, is not really too unusual for a like performance is usually rendered weatherwise several times each winter. As a rule, however, the snows in Rankin are very light and very dry. And they don't come on Thanksgiving.

But, true to the West Texas weather pattern, the unexpected is the case more often than not and a white Thanksgiving was enjoyed by one and all.

Mr. Fred Welling, the official weatherman for Rankin, reports .61 inches of moisture from the fall, which, had it all stayed on the ground, would have measured about four inches, according to his weather gauges.

But was it really an unusual snow or a big one? Not really, according to Hamp Carter, Mrs. Ray Boggs and Mrs. Pat Yocham, all old time Rankinites who can recall past winters.

For example, back in the early 20's, Carter recalls a snowfall in Rankin of some 12-15 inches and said that over near Big Lake it was over 18 inches deep. He said that cars were stranded in the area and that things were pretty rough considering the road conditions in those days.

Mrs. Boggs tells of a large snow here in 1946 and Carter backs this up by remembering that that was the year his daughter was married and that some of the wedding party was stranded in Alpine.

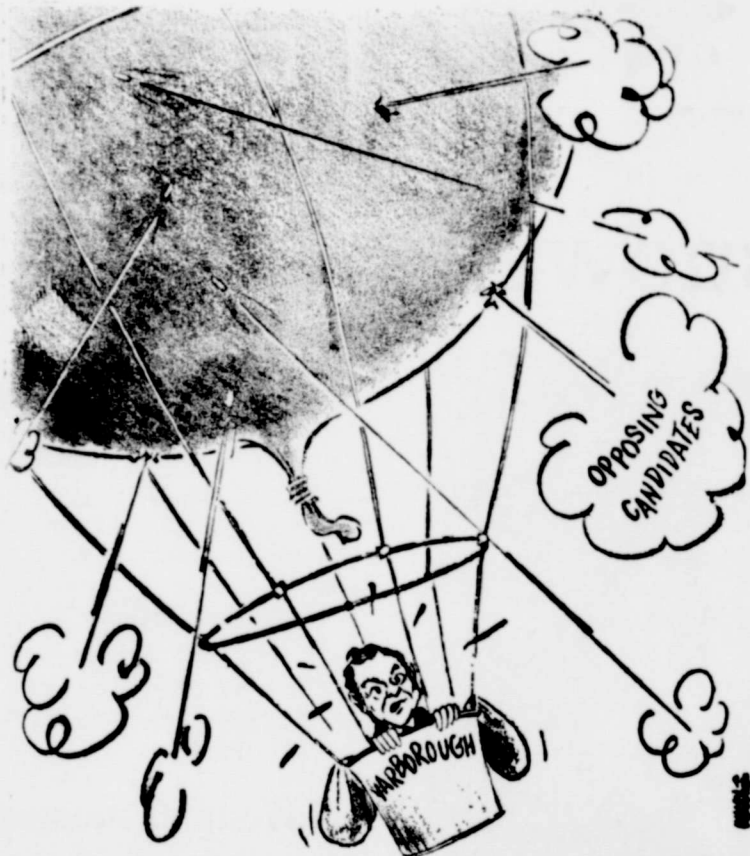

CHRISTMAS TOYS—

A well-designed toy costs no more than an ordinary toy but it is more valuable to a child.

Toys should be selected as carefully as any other purchase.

Look for toys that are washable, have no breakable parts, are sanitary made of "safe" materials and do not have too many details.

Buy toys that let a child use imagination and creativity. He has plenty of both.

A child is interested in what he can do with a toy; a parent usually wants one that looks real.

Wooden blocks, stylized boats, trains, cars, some movable machinery, hand puppets, puzzles with large pieces, baby dolls and doll houses are good choices for young children.

Small children need toys that they can grasp easily. Older children are able to manipulate the more complicated toys.

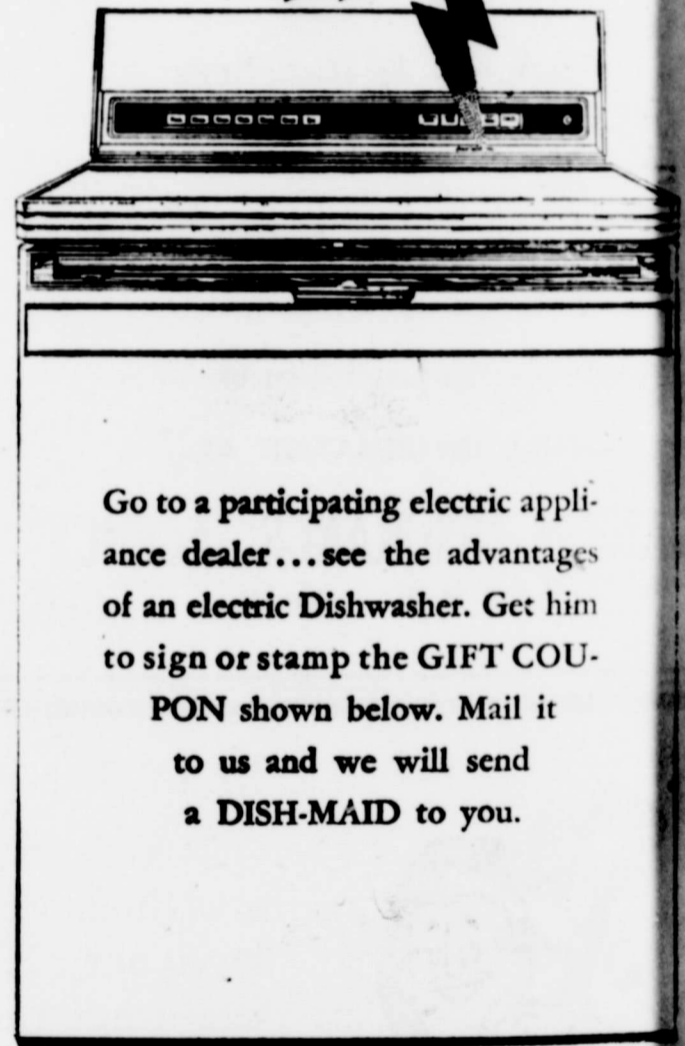
