Approved bills and attended to routine matters.

## No Increase Seen in Tax Bill for District --

# School Budget Upped for 1970-71

In a hearing on the budget for 1970-71 held Tuesday night, June 2, Rankin Schools presented proposed figures nearing the three-quarter million dollar mark, at \$734,187. This represented an increase of some \$35,000 compared to the 1969-70 budget.

Despite a drop in values, the school tax office says that there will be no increase in either the tax rate or the percentage factor over last year's figures.

"Your school tax figure should be the same as it was last year," said W. O. Adams, Tax Assessor-Collector for the District.

down, reveal anticipated revenue of \$53,820 from Per Capita—the number of students enrolled; \$8,800 in State and Federal aid; \$634,984 in local taxes and \$55,633 from surplus funds. It was this surplus figure that enabled the District to "take up the slack" in the increased budget amount without a tax increase.

A total of \$19,050 is expected to be discounted from anticipated income. This represents 1 percent discount for early payment of the 1970 tax bill and 2 percent for non-collections.

As has been the case in most of the recent budget increases, salaries accounted for the majority of added expense. For administration, the figure was up from \$37,530 last year to \$39,692 in the proposed amount. This represented an increase in the Superintendent's salary from \$16,365 to \$17,333, the business manager from \$11,365 to \$11,959, the Superintendent's secretary from \$4,100 to \$4,350 and the business office secretary from \$5,600 to \$5,950.

Overall administrative expenses were cut from \$7,275 to \$6,900.

Total administration costs were put at \$56,092 as compared to \$54,305 last year.

In instruction, salaries were again up. All three principals were raised from \$12,283 to \$13,130. Elementary teacher salaries increased from \$100,505 to 105,150, Junior High down from \$92,684 to \$80,685 and secondary teachers, up from \$108,150 to \$132,870. Salaries for school librarians were up from \$17,462 to \$19,760. Salary for the

principal's office was raised to \$5,080 from \$4,710 last year.

Teacher salary increases are tied to state salary laws. In addition, they earn certain increments for length of service and degrees held.

Total instruction costs increased from \$371,860 to \$396,030.

Pupil transportation costs were up—primarily because of plans for a new \$7,000 bus—from \$25,860 to \$33,600. Salaries for bus drivers—and bus custodian—were up from \$13,500 to \$13,800.

Plant operation was increased slightly from \$59,620 to \$60,900. Salaries for custodians increased from \$27,570 to \$28,600.

Maintenance on plant was down from \$37,150 last year to \$33,100 in the proposed budget. Salaries for full time maintenance workers were lowered from \$13,150 to \$13,000. Contracted services were also cut from \$7,600 to an anticipated \$5,000.

Property insurance was up from \$5,230 to \$6,800. Food Services increased from \$7,025 to 9,305 with salaries raised to \$4,905 from last year's \$4,625. Replacement of equipment was jumped by \$2,000.

Student body activities were to be lowered from \$22,900 to \$19,900 with the band taking the big cut from \$6,820 to \$3,000. A number of new band uniforms were in the budget last year. Athletic funds remained the same at \$14,200.

In capital outlay an increase upwards from \$13,750 to \$19,420 was (Continued to Page 7)

## High Turnout in Saturday Vote

Approximately half of the registered voters of Upton County participated in last Saturday's District Run-Off Primary. Total turnout was 1,135.

Breakdown of this figure saw 227 in Precinct No. 1, 141 in Precinct No. 2, 141 in Precinct No. 3, and 410 in Precinct No. 4.

In the McCamey, drew most attention with its four races whereas the rest of the county only had one contested events.

In race for Precinct 4 Commissioner, Charlie Fletcher defeated Newton Key to replace the late Joe Conger on the Upton Commissioner's Court. Fletcher is currently employed by the county as maintainer operator in the Bridge Department. He received 23 votes in the absentee, 17 in the box for a total of 40. In the J. P. race in 4, B. D. Ford Bearden 201 to 200. Both men received 20 absentee votes.

In nomination in the race for County Treasurer was Doris Speed. She received 88 absentee

votes, 191 in Box 1, 130 in Box 2, 78 in Box 3 and 121 in Box 4—for a total of 608.

Her opponent, Shirley Campbell, received 48 absentee votes, 35 in Precinct Box 1, 11 in Box 2, 142 in Box 3, and 280 in Box 4 for a total of 516.

In the Clerk's race, Buena Coffee won the right to meet Republican

Oteka Darby in November. Mrs. Coffee had 57 absentee votes, 57 in Precinct Box 1, 22 in Box 2, 150 in Box 3 and 321 in Box 4 for a total of 607.

Her opponent, Sybil Browning, had 74 votes in the absentee, 168 in Box 1, 118 in Box 2, 64 in Box 3 and 75 in Box 4 for a 499 total.

"Dear Abby", the much-read column appearing in most daily newspapers, has goofed up a part of the newspaper business. Abby publishes letters signed by such dandies as "Lame in L. A.", "Up in Arms", "USMC", and any of the little idioms people might use to sign their letters. In fact, the "Dear Abby" column will not generally print a letter signed by the writer.

And this process of printing unsigned letters is a little strange to the paper operation. For many years they all had to be signed by the writer. Ninety-nine percent of "Letters to the Editor" still are.

And that's about the percentage with The Rankin News. Right now I have a well-written letter by a local reader which addresses itself to subjects of considerable interest but I can't print it unless it is signed. In the case of "Dear Abby" most of her letters deal with the writer's own personal problem. In the case of Letters to the Editor, the writer is generally

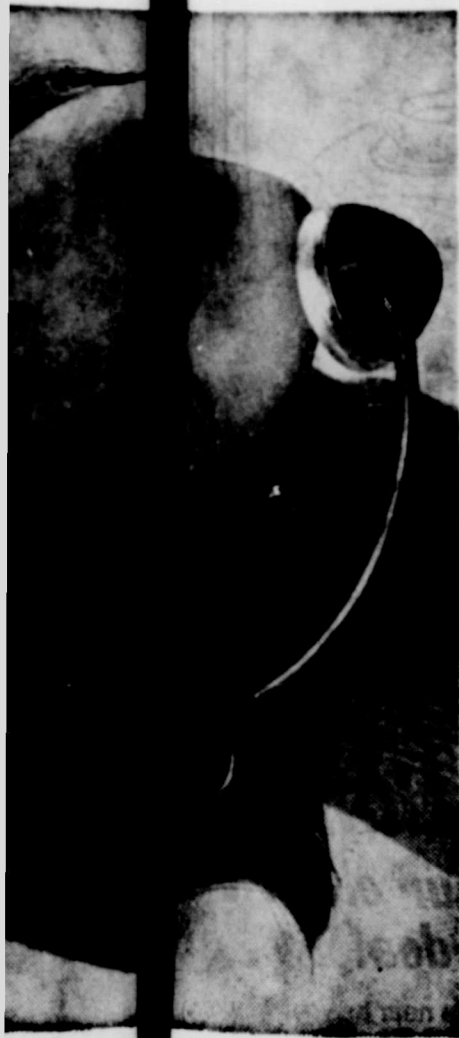

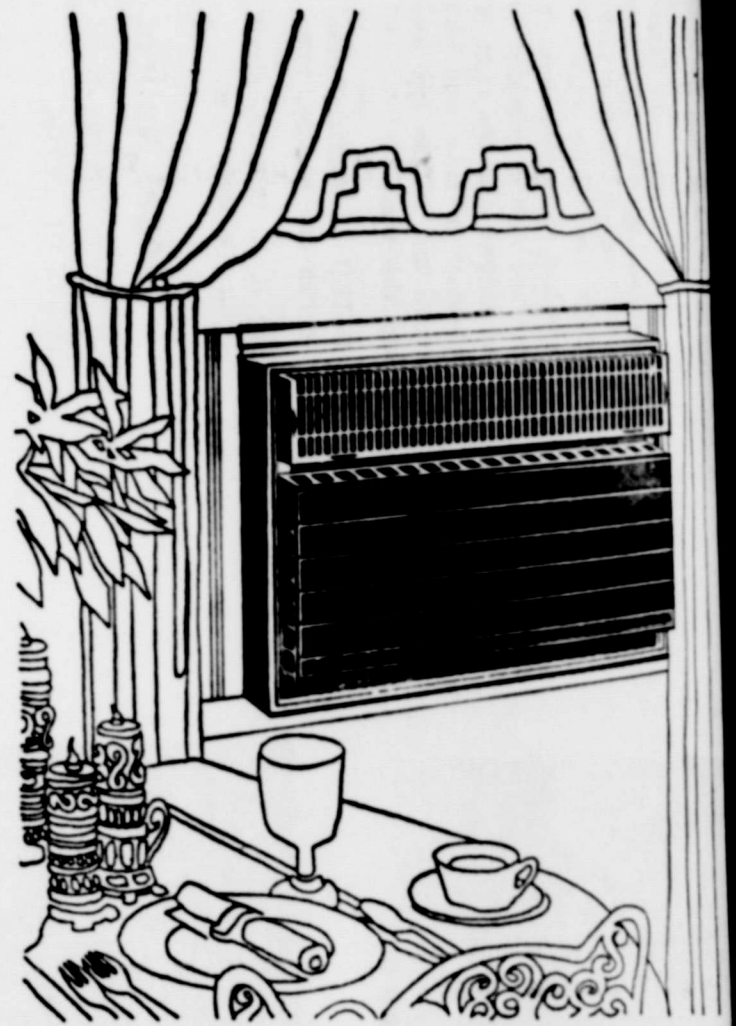

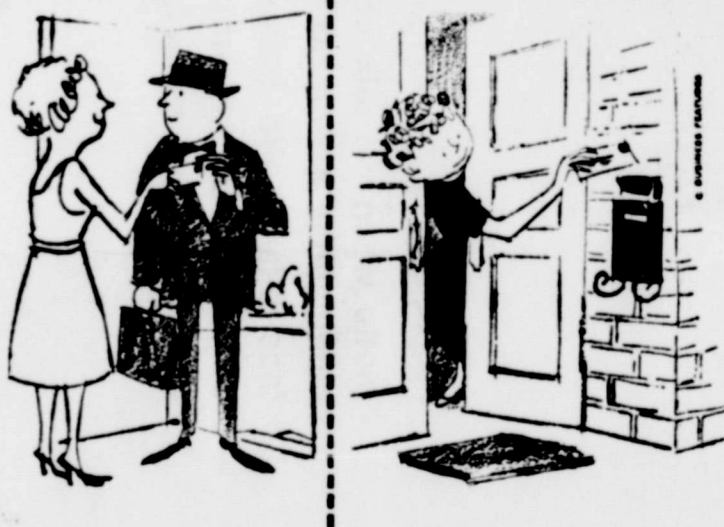
