That's According to the Census Figures--

Rankin Population Gains 52.87% in Ten Years

While many West Texas towns of less than 10,000 population were moaning the blues over results obtained in the recently completed census in which many had drastic drops, Rankinites were a bit chesty in their whopping 50 percent-plus gain. That's according to Census Bureau figures.

In 1960, Rankin was credited with 1,214 persons. In the figures just released, this had jumped by 640 to 1,854.

Other area towns included Mc-Mamey, down from 3,375 in 1960 to 2,589 this year; Big Lake, down from 2,668 in 1960 to 2,445 currently; and Crane, down from

3,796 to 3,447. A similar drop was reflected in a large percentage of small towns throught the state.

Backing up the increase for Rankin are figures obtained from several sources. Among these is the City Hall where water connections in 1960 stood at 398, gas meters at 377 and sewer connections at 276. Current figures released by City Hall show 436 water connection, 436 gas meters and 359 sewer connections.

For Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, a check with their business office shows 827 phones currently in operation here. Although 1960 figures were not available, the business office employee estimated that the number was "nearly double" what it had been in 1960.

"Rankin has really grown lately," the telephone company employee said.

COURT IN ROUTINE MONDAY MEETING

Upton County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, June 8 and attended mostly to routine matters.

Among these were the appointment of Dr. James L. Cooper, a McCamey physician, as County Health Officer. The appointment is for two years and runs from June 30, 1970 through June 30, 1972;

Set salaries for caretakers and lifeguards at the various county-owned and operated swimming pools. These included a salary of \$500 per month for the caretaker at the Rankin Pool, and \$350 per month for the Rankin lifeguard. The McCamey Pool lifeguard was voted a salary of \$300 per month and the lifeguard at the Dunbar Pool, also in McCamey, is to be paid \$1.60 per hour. No salaries were mentioned in the minutes for the McCamey caretakers.

In still other matters, the court again entered into a contract with the Thomas Y. Pickett Co. for evaluation services. The firm, which specializes in this type of work, is to assist Upton County in determining the taxable value of all oil, gas, minerals, public utilities, railroads, industrial and manufacturing properties within the county. They do not assist the county in fixing values on land or personal property such as homesteads. This is done by the court, sitting as the

For West Texas Utilities Company, meter connections stood at 521 as of last Monday. To obtain the 1960 figures, it would have been necessary to go to the warehouse and dig through back years of files. However, Ruth Johnson, bookkeeper at the local office of WTU for more than ten years, said that she would estimate that the percentage of gain for the electrical suppliers had been about the same as that for city meters.

Another indicator, although a bit harder to define, can be seen in voter registration. In 1960, Precinct 1 had 370 registered voters and Precinct 2, 292, for a combined total of 662. These two precincts are composed largely of Rankin residents although they also include those living in the "country". In 1970, Precinct 1 had 466 registered voters and Precinct 2, 273, for a combined total of 739—for a gain of 77.

However, and this is where the confusion sets in, in 1960 there was a Precinct 3, composed primarily of Midkiff area voters, which had 127 registered votes. Several years ago, Precinct 3 was combined into Precinct 1 and it is now far more difficult to determine how many voters live in that area.

Overall, the principal reasons for the gains made in Rankin population are the increases in the work forces of Halliburton Services, The Western Company and the moving into town of a numb-

er of families from oil camps.

There is some question with a number of local residents that the 52 percent gain is an accurate figure—some feeling that the 1960 count was too low. However, it is well established that Rankin has gained in population over the past ten years and that has brought a measure of pride to all civic boosters.

BAND SESSION TO BEGIN ON JUNE 29

Highway 67 - a Rocky Road for Auto Traffic

Motorists on Highway 67 were still driving with their fingers crossed as rocks recently used in topping the road continued to take their toll of headlights and windshields.

Estimates as high as 60 windshields in Rankin alone have been made by local garages and service station operators. Lowery Insurance said that they had already processed about twenty-five claims and knew of a number of others.

In the headlight department, service stations reported from a half dozen to "all we had". Again, a number of vehicle operators have not as yet replaced their broken headlights.

over the rocky road. windshield, broken headlights and

To replace a windshield—depending on the vehicle—can cost between \$100 and \$250.

And, as pointed out by one garage operator, "these are only the ones we know about locally."

With the summer traffic building up on Highway 67, it is estimated that for every damaged local vehicle, there is at least another one that is from out-of-town and never reported locally.

And the good news continues. It is now reported that the Midland Highway will get a similar treatment of rock in the near future.

The Highway Department strikes again. Nuts.

THE SCOOP by Scoop

THE COUNT—

While many newspapers, City Halls, Chambers of Commerce and aroused citizens are up in arms over figures announced in their recent census count—saying that the count is too low—I think I'll be different and say ours is too high.

Well, not actually too high for the more the merrier and it sure makes us look good in comparison to our neighboring towns, but the truth of the matter is that I see no way in the world we could have gained 640 people in the last ten years. Either the count is wrong now or was wrong in 1960.

Let's see. In 1960, City of Rankin had 398 gas meters, 377 water meters and 276 sewer connections. Taking an average between the gas and water, we have a count of something like 388. Now they claim that there's an average number of 4.5 (est.) persons per family in the U. S. Using this figure, we come up with the figure of 1646—432 more than the census count of that year for Rankin of 1214.

Now in 1970, we have 436 water meters, 436 gas meters and 359 sewer connections. Using the 436 figure again, and the 4.5 persons, we come up with 1952 people—or only 98 off from the census count of 1854. Pretty close.

From the change in water-gas meters—388 in 1960 and 436 now—we have a gain of 48 meters. Multiply that by the 4.5 figure and you get 216. Add that to the figure mentioned above for 1960 of the "guesstimated" 1646 and we get 1862—only 8 off the 1970 count of 1,854.

Rankin has gained in population over the past 10 years and considering what has happened to most small towns, it's something of which to be proud. But we have not gained from the 1960 count of 1,214 up to the present 1,854—not with only 48 extra houses moved into town.

To the Editor:

What I am really opposed to is the people on both sides who constantly use one sided criticism and never try to reason things out. That is why it bothers me when the Scoop implies that all student protestors are just kids out to raise hell, free, or when the Scoop takes a couple of quotes from a

Jerry Rubin speech and uses them as conclusive proof that he caused the Kent State killings and further implies that people like him are responsible for most of the other bad things that happen on campuses. For every quote that Scoop or people with his views can get from a Jerry Rubin, the other side can get a quote that is equally brutal and psychotic from extremists national guardsmen, construction workers, and policemen. There are extremists on both sides helping to cause these violent confrontations and other problems. I don't think that it is reasonable to lay the blame on one man or one group.

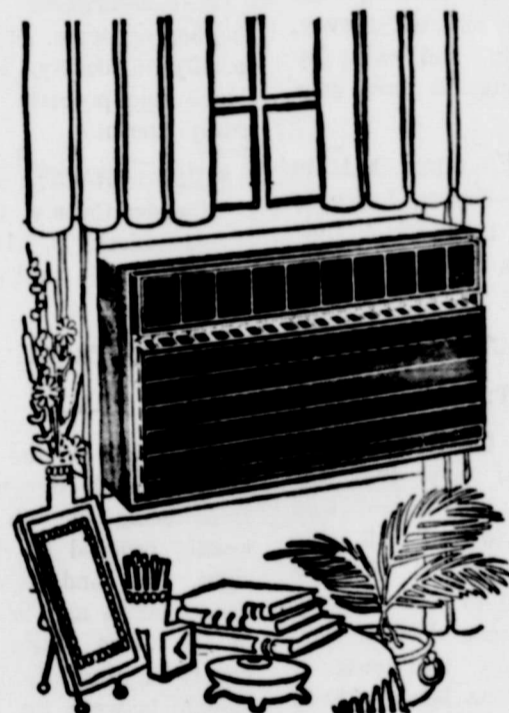

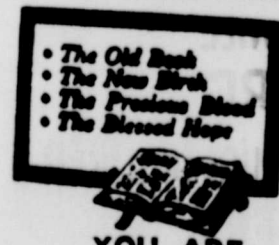
