First Kindergarten Class to be Offered --

Rankin Schools to Open Term on August 24th

It's been a short summer. At least, that's probably the feelings of area youngsters as they face an August 24 opening day for the 1970-71 school term.

Some mothers may feel a bit differently about the occasion.

The office of the superintendent released the school calendar this week and it indicates a registration date of August 17-21. Further details on registration will be announced within the next week or so. First full day of school is Monday, August 24.

Buses will run their regular routes and the school cafeteria will offer a full range of services.

For the first time in its history, the Rankin school system will offer a full-time kindergarten class. With enrollment already indicated at twenty-five, the class will be open to all students who are five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1970.

Forty-three teachers have been employed for the term with over-

all enrollment expected to be around 500. This is the same number of teachers used last year and the enrollment figures are expected to be about the same.

Billing dates for school lunches will be moved to the 25th of the month, rather than the end of the month as previously. The regular school lunch will again be 40c. A kindergarten snack is offered for 15c or the snack and regular lunch together will be 45c.

For those who are not overly

enthusied with the early beginning of the school term, there is, however, a bright spot. Their first holiday will come after only two weeks of classroom work—on Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 7.

School will resume at regular hours on Tuesday, September 8.

Other holidays will be November 26-27 for Thanksgiving, December 24-January 5 for Christmas and April 5-9 for Easter. Also, no school will be held Oc-

tober 23, when Rankin must travel to Clint near El Paso for a football game, and on November 13 for the TSTA District Convention.

A total of 180 days of classroom work will be held with May 28-29 to mark the end of the term.

Agape-In Plans to Open on August 10

Official opening of the "Agape In", a coffee house-type establishment located on Main Street, was announced this week. Sponsored by the First Baptist Church, the Agape In is located in the former site of Hurst Barbecue.

In announcing the opening, the following statement was given the News:

"We want dialogue with you. We are trying to be Christian. Do you know who you are? We are all bound together by the crucial problem of identity.

"We invite you to share the existential journey (within the pilgrimage of being) with us at The Agape-In. There will be coffee, Cokes, ideas, and ourselves. We are motivated by no ideas of religious paternalism, but seek only a genuine I-thou encounter. Be with us next Monday night at 8 p.m. to help us create the spirit of Agape (God's love) as we open our new Christian coffee house. There will be a group from Midland to entertain in a way that will thrill the soul of the young and old alike. We invite everyone that feels the need to find who they are, and how to have life and have it more abundantly, to come and join us in the fellowship."

Identity Established on McCamey "Doctor"

After a good many hours work, a sizeable delay on the part of the FBI, and no help at all from the suspect, county officials last Saturday released the news that they have identified the so-called "McCamey Doctor".

The FBI says he is Francis William Dalglish, born March 13, 1943 in Cairo, Egypt.

His father is said to have been in the British Navy at the time he was born, making him a British subject. In various places, he has listed his birthplace as England, in others, Memphis, Tenn. He has also traveled to many parts of the world and has used a variety

of names and identities.

Said to be an accomplished aircraft pilot, he can fly single and twin engine prop planes and once flew a jet after having the controls explained to him.

He has worked as a vet, as a policeman, for a detective agency, a meat inspector, a clothing store operator, and of late, as a doctor in the McCamey Hospital. One report also indicates that he has posed as a priest and on the passport he was using, believed to have belonged to a brother, his occupation is listed as that of navigator.

His former wife, contacted by telephone in Massachusetts, has indicated a strong desire to come to Rankin and confront her former spouse.

But as of Wednesday, Dalglish was still confined to an Odessa hospital and doctors were reported to be concerned for his well-being. They have suggested that he be transferred to a hospital with even larger facilities for the treatment of seriously ill patients.

Seven Amendments to go before Voters on November Ballot

The 61st Legislature, which convened in January, 1969, proposed a total of 16 amendments to the Texas Constitution, 9 of which were voted on August 5, 1969, with the remaining 7 to be considered on November 3 of this year.

Only four of the proposals presented to the voters last year received approval: the so-called clean-up amendment, which removed obsolete, superfluous, and unnecessary sections of the constitution; the amendment giving the legislature authority to increase the ceiling on state assistance for the four classes of the needy to a maximum of \$80 million; the amendment authorizing the legislature to provide payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of certain governmental officials and employees, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve or auxiliary units; and the amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan.

Since it became effective in 1876, the present Texas Constitution has been amended 195 times. In every regular session except in 1885, for amendments can be proposed only during regular sessions of the legislature, joint resolutions to amend the state's fundamental document have been introduced. The all-time record was reached in 1961, when 108 such resolutions were introduced in the 57th Legislature. However, only 14 of these were approved by both houses and thus appeared on the ballot. The record number to reach the ballot was achieved by the 59th Legislature, in 1965, which placed 27 proposals before the voters.

A short caption of the seven proposals to be voted on in November follows. Further comments will appear in the News from time to time between now and election day.

AMENDMENT NO. 1 H.J.R. No. 30

Amending Article V, Section 1-a, of the Texas Constitution, relating to removal, retirement, or censure of justices, judges and justices of the peace under prescribed circumstances.

AMENDMENT NO. 2 S.J.R. No. 10

Amending Article XVI, Section 20, Subsection (a), to authorize the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulation the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis.

AMENDMENT NO. 3 S.J.R. No. 15

Authorizing the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm, and forest lands based on the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce

farm and forest crops.

AMENDMENT NO. 4 H.J.R. No. 15

Amending Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), to reconstitute the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission.

AMENDMENT NO. 5 H.J.R. No. 28

Authorizing any county to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county under certain conditions.

AMENDMENT NO. 6 S.J.R. No. 32

Amending Article XVI, Section 51, to increase the value of the homestead exempt from forced sale from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

AMENDMENT NO. 7 H.J.R. No. 22

Authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government and

for performance of governmental functions by contract between political subdivisions in any county.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT General Election Nov. 3, 1970 NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two

years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

ance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts, and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

recommendation. Upon order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary.

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, the process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner as any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not a fee is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

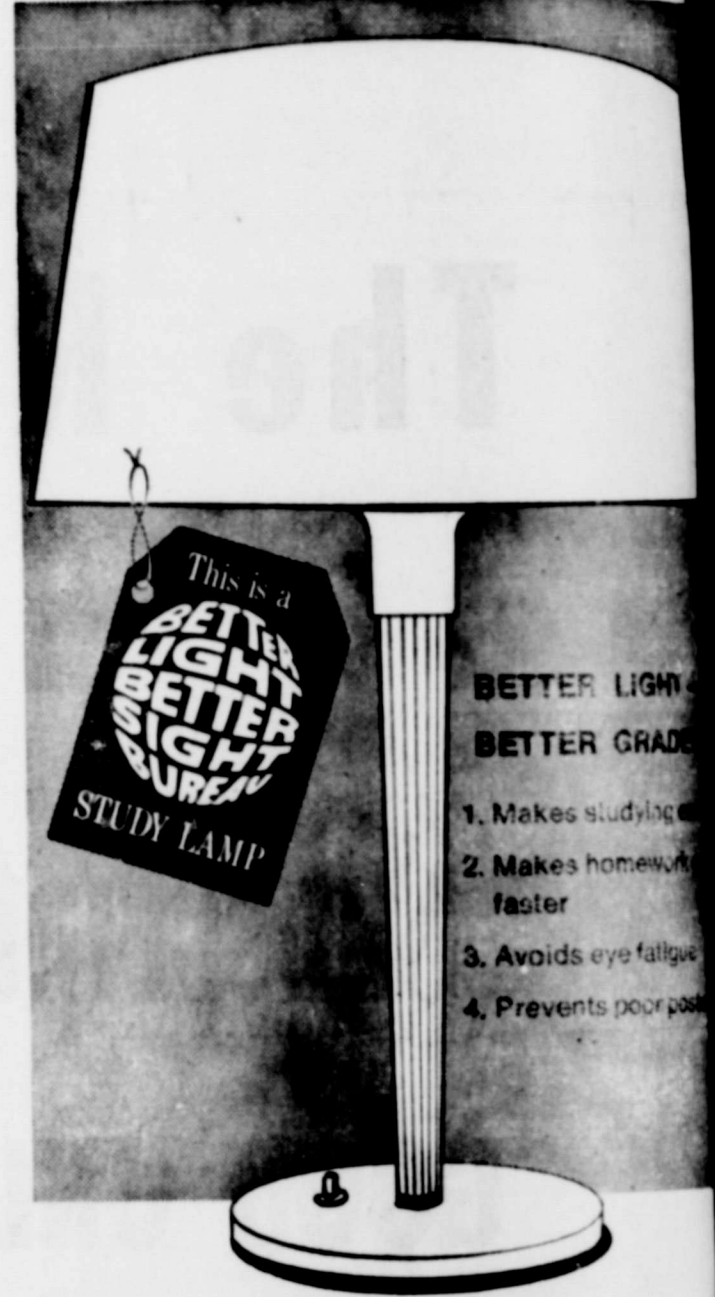
