Rankin Still Seeking First Win in Series --

Red Devils Once Again Face Old Foe Sonora in Friday Night Game

One of the big annual shoot-outs in West Texas Class A football will take place in Rankin Friday night when the undefeated Red Devils host the Number 2 Team in the state, Sonora. With a kickoff time set for 8:00 p.m., a full house is expected.

Sonora, a team that dropped a close contest last week to the Class AA Ozona Lions, has long been a thorn in the side of the Red Devils and even though the Rankin squad has led in the scoring of some past games—as much as 13-0 in a recent bi-district game — the Bronchos of Sutton County have always took the win. Last year they pulled it out of the fire in the last seconds of the game to win by a 21-20

B-Team, Junior in Tough Test Thurs.

Thursday afternoon will be a big test for three of Rankin's undefeated football teams. On that date, beginning at 4:30 p.m. with the 7th Grade game, the locals will be in McCamey for three games with strong Badger opponents.

It will be the first meeting of the Rankin and McCamey Juniors and B Team this year; however, they have played one common opponent, Stanton. Rankin teams won all their games from Stanton last week with the following results: 7th Grade, 12-6; 8th Grade, 22-0; B Team 27-0.

By comparison, the Badgers also did well against Stanton, winning two and tying one: 7th Grade, 12-12; 8th Grade, 26-0 and B Team, 26-6.

From these results, indications point to very close contests in all three games.

The Sonora squad, long a strong contender in Class A football, is not a team that puts much faith in fancy football. Local Draft Board Extends Eligibility Time by 90 Days

Local Board No. 121 Executive Secretary Mrs. Mae R. Williams announced today that random selection number 166 is the highest lottery selection number reached in 1970.

The board spokesman said that the remaining calls probably can be met without going above the current high random selection number due to the numbers of registrants entering the draft pool late in the year who have numbers below the "high" already reached by the board.

Mrs. Williams said that in compliance with the White House Executive Order announced recently, all registrants of Local Board No. 121 who hold the highest reached number of numbers below the highest reached number and who have not been issued orders for induction due to any circumstance; will be considered for carry-over into the extended priority selection group if they are classified I-A as of December 31, 1970. Such young men will have their liability for induction extended for the first three months of 1971.

The local board spokesman said that the Executive Order states that registrants who held numbers above the highest reached number of Board No. 121 and are classified I-A on December 31, will be placed in a lower draft priority group on January 1.

CAREFUL THERE—

Support is one thing that helps build winning football teams.

But, Rankin fans, bless their hearts, are also noted for being a little hot under the collar when it comes to officiating and unless a check is put on this sort of thing, we can be headed for trouble — again. We've had one suspension in the not too distant past.

At any football game, here or away, Rankin School are held responsible for Rankin fans, according to the Constitution and Contest Rules of the University Interscholastic League for 1970-71, and any official can easily get a suspension slapped on you.

Now how would you like to be the one responsible for getting the Red Devils suspended? Think about it. Where would we be then? Would that be fair to the boys on the teams and all the kids in school who have worked so hard? Certainly not.

There are official means of lodging a protest and having your say, as set out in the above mentioned rules and that's the only way it can be done. RHS Biology Class on Coast Field Trip

The Biology II Class of Rankin High School has returned from the coast with numerous marine specimens and a knowledge of marine ecology. The group, consisting of 16 students, was sponsored by 5 adults: Mr. Roy Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. Dub Day, Mrs. Son Jackson and Mr. Pete Beard. Traveling on the Continental Bus, they left Rankin after the McCamey football game. They traveled all night and arrived in Port Aransas around 8:00 Saturday morning.

During the four days at the coast, the group visited the jetties and several different beaches. At the jetties they collected menippe and blue crabs, several types

of fish, a small shark, a large sea turtle (which they could not bring home), and various other marine organisms.

Visiting the Gulf Beach at night they collected ghost crabs, lettered olives, scotch bonnets, and coquinas. Along the beach of one ship channel the group discovered some very large whelks, a few apple murex, and fiddler crabs.

At Mustang Beach, the group collected moon shells, Campeche angel wings, and razor clam shells. Along the open beaches by the jetties, they found a starfish, key-hole urchins, and pin shells.

The group also visited the marine museum of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Mr. Tom Heffernan, of that department, spoke to the class and took them on a tour of a marine research

trawler.

The football boys returned on Monday with Dub Day. The rest of the class returned to Rankin about 6:00 Wednesday evening. The group has expressed their thanks to the Rankin School Board for giving their permission for the class to go on such an interesting and educational venture. The class also expressed appreciation to the sponsors for the leadership and patience during the trip.

ONE MORE—

The Red Devils win again, in another pulse-stopper. But, as we say in golf: it's not how but how many. So far, they've had the right score on the board at the end of the game and that's how you keep an unbeaten record.

It's not unusual to hear someone put the question: "what was wrong with our boys . . . they didn't play their usual game?"

I expect that anyone who could put their finger on the answer to that question would unravel one of the really big questions in sport. Exactly why any given team—be they high schoolers or pros—turn in a bad performance once in awhile is something that has baffled coaches and teams themselves for the lifetime of sporting events.

And you can just about pick your reasons for they are probably numerous. I recall one of Rankin's past coaches saying that a team could look bad if one of

the boys had a spat with his girl friend. Well, that's as good an example as any.

Personally, in the case of the Red Devils, I suspect that it's not so much that they're having a bad night as it is the other boys feeling that they can beat us. In the case of Wink, the Widcats involved certainly didn't want to have the dubious honor of being the first Wink team to ever lose to Rankin. Stanton last week—if you look at their schedule—may well have felt that Rankin was their last chance to win.

In any case, fans and team alike should know by now that we are going to have to play these games a week at a time and cut out this business of looking ahead a week or two.

THIS WEEK—

This week will be a big one for all four Rankin ball clubs. The Juniors and B Team go to McCamey and the varsity hosts the Sonora Red Hosses. So far this season, the Rankin squads have won thirteen games straight with a total of 357 points while giving up 58. If that unbeaten record is to be maintained, all four teams are going to have to go great guns.

Despite the fact that Sonora lost last week, they're far from an easy mark. The Bronchos are a prideful bunch that doesn't like to lose—especially two in a row—and you can bet they'll have fire in their eyes Friday night. It ought to be one whale of a game for Rankin, too, will be ready. The Red Devils have made no bones about looking forward to this game after getting beat in the closing seconds last year.

Sonora probably has a better team than last year—if they ever have a poor one—but, Rankin is also stronger overall. Rankin has never won over Sonora and the odds are getting long in our favor. Friday night will be as good a time as any to pull off the big

win. As Rankin has discovered over the years that they have been doing battle with the Sonora Bronchos—and contrary to all circulated rumore — the Sutton lads can't actually walk on water. They are just young lads like our own and put their pants on one leg at a time—maybe with neatness and considerable skill but really nothing supernatural.

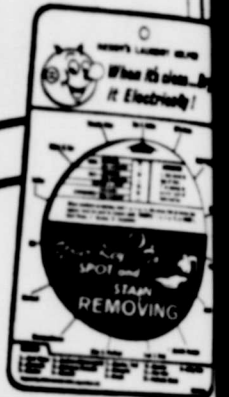

Attorney General John Mitchell's first report on Justice Department use of wire-tapping reveals that it has been an effective weapon against organized crime.

Altogether, 137 arrests were made from evidence gathered in 31 court-approved wire-taps. In Washington, D. C. alone, a wire-tap on a narcotics wholesaler picked up 5,594 incriminating calls in 39 days. These resulted in the arrest of 57 people, one of the largest dope-ring roundups on record.

Also in 1969, six wire-taps in Newark collared 55 persons, including many Cosa Nostra leaders. Between 1961 and 1966, the Government's war against organized crime minus wire-tapping showed markedly different results only 185 indictments against Cosa Nostra members during the five year period.

Despite the hue and cry protests of a misguided few, wire-tapping has not proven to be an "invasion of privacy" for law-abiding citizens. I am pleased to see Attorney General Mitchell and President Nixon being scrupulously careful in applying this most powerful anti-crime tool.
