Homecoming Schedule has A Variety of Offerings

A portion of homecoming activities will kick-off with a bon-fire and pep rally following the Junior B Team football games. The games will be held in the area just west of the high school building, every student is invited to join the student bon-fire and rally.

Authorities this week are asking for a call for scrap for the bon-fire—no old tires accepted. Anyone with suitable materials to donate should call the high school office and a detail of students will be sent out to load the scrap.

Activities call for the homecoming to begin the tradition of the homecoming at 1:30 a.m. and continue ramping up to kickoff time at 5 p.m.

On Friday, students will march down 8th Street and on to the 1st Street across from the First Bank where a public pep assembly will be held. On hand will be the Red Devil football team, the Pep Squad and the Pep Band.

Star Attraction for Homecoming 1970 --

Red Devils Host Socorro Bulldogs in Opening District 6-A Activity

With a number of players favoring a variety of minor injuries and sore spots, the Rankin Red Devils, with four wins and one loss in non-conference play, will host the Socorro Bulldogs before a homecoming crowd Friday for the district opener for both teams. Kick-off time will come thirty minutes earlier, at 7:30 p. m.

Socorro, only one game off the Rankin non-conference record, has

won three and lost two. Last week they shut out Fabens 20-0 while the Red Devils lost their first game of the year to Sonora 20-40. Despite this, Rankin will likely be favored over the Bulldogs, due partly to homecoming and partly to the past records of the two schools. They have met only twice previously with the Devils taking both matches; 33-0 in 1968 and 49-0 last year.

However, it could well be another of those long nights for the Rankin team and their supporters. On at least two previous occasions this year, Rankin was a heavy favorite and had to scrap hard to get a win. Socorro, with a front four tipping the scales at 225, 230, 190 and 195—for a 210 average—on defense, will far outweigh the light Red Devils. In addition to size, the Bulldogs also have experience with ten seniors and ten juniors on the starting units. From this group, five are three-year lettermen and ten are two-year lettermen.

"It looks to me like they are going to be real tough," Coach Turner said this week as he added up the weights and scanned the experience roster. Also of concern to Turner will be his starting line-up where injuries have taken their toll of the thin maroon and white line-up. As late as Wednesday, Turner was still unable to determine who would be available for service on Friday night.

Authority Seeks Yard, Maintenance Bids

The Housing Authority of the City of Rankin is holding a special session Thursday, October 15, to put out bids for yard and maintenance work at the Rankin Low Rent Housing on a yearly bid basis. At this time, tenants are responsible for yard maintenance and work is done on a part-time basis.

Bids will be taken either on the yard or on maintenance—tenants may bid on both. The Housing Authority of Rankin is eligible to bid with parents or guardians and to sign for minors who

might be interested in the yard work.

Bids must be in writing, sealed and delivered to the Housing Authority not later than November 15. Forms for bidding and detailed information as to requirements may be obtained from J. B. Hutchens at the News Office during regular office hours, 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday thru Friday, beginning Monday, Oct. 19.

The Authority has said that they reserve the right to reject any or all bids.

office have not effectively
solved the problems.

any politician who has
served for one or more terms
has a record that looks
good—partly conservative,
partly liberal. Records are made
intentionally. To me, the
record is reflected in the
actions of this state and na-
tion right now, it's not good.
We can speak our
minds at the ballot box. We can
say we're willing to go
along with more of the same or
say: enough. We want a
change and if the new bunch
won't do it, turn them out the
door and keep on
going until those in
office decide to take con-
sideration.

Finally, I don't see how—
without the fact that there are
people and freely roaming
around calling for revolution—
can any longer put
those in public office who
are incapable of deal-

ing with the situation. If the de-
mocratic process is to be preserv-
ed, it would seem to me that we
are going to have to take some
drastic actions and the only way
that can be done—peaceably—is at
the ballot box.

Does it matter to you? It does
to me.

MAIL SERVICE—

How's your mail service been
lately? Are you satisfied? Well, if
you are, you're pretty well in a
class by yourself for it's a little
past the joking stage as this col-
umn pointed out a few weeks ago.

Over in Congressional District
16, to the west of us and contain-
ing U. S. Representative Richard
White of El Paso, they're getting
an investigation of the poor mail
service. Congressman White and
others are asking some pretty
tough questions of the postal de-
partment and I'd venture to say
that some good will come of their
efforts.

And this brings to mind the
question: where's our Represent-
ative, Mr. O. C. Fisher? Why
hasn't he joined in this effort for
our mail service is fully as bad

as it is in District 16. Could it
be that he's so busy trying to
perpetuate himself in office that
he has no time to worry about
such matters?

In fact, aside of being on hand
to get the big raise voted for
congressmen a year or so ago,
where has Mr. Fisher been for,
well, these many years that he has
held office? How many times
have you seen him in Rankin—
or seen him anywhere, for that
matter, in the district?

To put it another way, Cong-
ressman Fisher is a perfect ex-
ample of the kind of office holder
—in office for many, many
years, who has not been able to
deal with any of the current
problems be they postal service,
crime, inflation, unrest or any-
thing else—except keeping him-
self in office. I just can't see

where that's helped us much.

I don't know much about his
opponent, Dick Gill, but I know
all about Fisher that I want to
know. I think, if we're going to
make any changes for the better
in the trends of today, we're go-
ing to have to take some chances
on men of unknown quantities.
Those we now have in office
simply have not been effective.

I don't say that this is the so-
lution for sure. I only say that,
as it is, we're not headed in the

right direction and we, the vot-
ers, have a responsibility to see
that changes are made.

And to prove that this is not
merely a pitch for a Republican,
I think we've had all we can
take from John Tower and I will
oppose his reelection the next
time around, unless he picks up
his feet and shows some concrete
results between now and then.

Now is certainly no time to
play party policies. Too much is
at stake.

For something like two thousand years the people of Jewish faith had a saying: "Next year in Jerusalem." Hopefully, it won't take us that long but: "Next year in Sonora!"

Personally I'm getting a little tired of Rankin having one of the better Class A teams in the state and never getting out of West Texas with it simply because the Sonora Bronchoes are always the best—or close to it—in Texas. If we have to get to the point where the title is decided right here in this area, so be it. We'll just have to get good enough to take them out at least once in a while. And we can and I believe—given a bit of time and sticking with one coach with his system—we will.

One or two things are worthy of note about last week's loss to the Bronchos. No. 1. I've yet to hear a single Red Devil fan say that he or she was dissatisfied with the Rankin effort. Sure, we'd all have liked it better had we won but there's much to be said in favor of giving it your best even when you're outgunned and that's what the Red Devils did.

No. 2. We moved the ball and against the Sonora club, that was a pretty fair accomplishment in itself. Posting 20 points against them should be a considerable mark in our favor. And No. 3. we forced them to do most of their scoring on the bomb situation — which is fine if it works but had we been at full strength, it may not have been quite so effective. That goal line stand made by the Red Devils apparently convin-

ced the Bronchos that their best bet was to go to their air—something they won't do if they can stay on the ground and move the ball in to score.

We lost it, but with honor.

DISTRICT PLAY—

Comes now the ones that count and what looked like a race between Rankin and Van Horn has

now turned into something else entirely. It may very well still be a race between us and Van Horn but it's going to be a hard one at best with two and possibly three teams that—as things now stand—definitely will contend on any given Friday night.

Sanderson, with one of the best backs in Class A, will certainly be a team to consider. Clint is still unbeaten but is a question mark

due to the weak schedule they have been playing, still, they must have something going for them. The team that I personally expect to be dangerous is Iraan because they have put points on the board against some mighty strong competition.

After this week, we ought to be able to tell something.

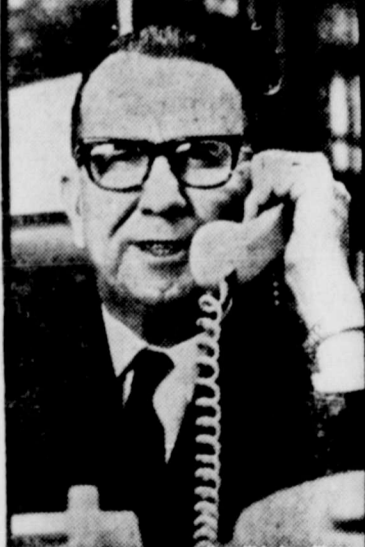

One of the major points of President Nixon's war against crime is his efforts to reform the Bail Reform Act. The Bail Reform Act of 1966 requires that federal judges cannot consider a criminal suspect's dangerousness in setting bail.

Recently, U. S. District Judge George L. Hart told a Senate committee that the Bail Reform Act has permitted rapes, armed robberies and attempts at murder that otherwise could have been prevented. And, according to Washington D. C. Chief of Police Jerry Wilson, criminals in Washington, frequently get out on bond under the Bail Reform Act to commit more crimes.

The Nixon Administration asked Congress to act quickly on its anti-crime legislation; Congress has dithered. The Democrats are playing politics with the public's safety by sitting on the Nixon Administration's crime package, and O. C. Fisher — who voted for the Bail Reform Act of 1966 must share part of the blame for this intolerable state of affairs.

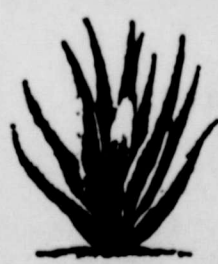
