present cable hook-up, there has been more than a smattering of complaints covering just about everything from installation cost to the quality of reception. Some of the latter complaints can, no doubt, be traced to the owner's set and certainly are not the responsibility of the cable people—although there have been times when the cable itself has been at fault. Generally, however, these have been remedied with reasonable promptness and the local people working for the cable firm have done a good job trying to keep everyone satisfied.

As to installation costs, some report one thing, some another. For example, a price of \$60 is being asked to put in one connection in the elementary school — with the cable already in operation just across the street. Most installations cost something like \$18 and it would seem, indeed, that a \$60 fee for the school is a bit hefty.

Across the track, it is said that they have no service at all and that none is apparently forthcoming.

So what is the answer to these problems? Well, maybe there's not a lot that can be done since the cable is a privately owned concern and as such can give

the kind of service they see fit—take it or leave it. But what about the City Council, you say? Since they grant the franchise to the cable operator, can't they put on some pressure? Well, yes and no. They have no control over the type of service given. They can grant a franchise to others who might be interested in coming into Rankin and they can refuse to renew the current opera-

tor's permit when it expires. Another alternative is for the individual to put up his own antenna; however, that's not very satisfactory in this area.

The best bet of the lot lies with the refusal of the city council to renew the franchise and, although this is a good way down the line in our case, it would be effective if the council would buck up and let it be known that they mean

business. Otherwise our service is going to be no better than the word of the cable owner and right now that has left some questions unanswered.

Since the agreement was to furnish cable service to the City of Rankin, the council should insist that that promise be carried out—fairly—or the whole deal be junked.

THUD—

That noise you heard last Friday night down Iraan way was the sound of the Braves scalping the Red Devils. We went down expecting to have a romp and got a good country busting from a team that wanted badly to win.

For what it's worth, 4th & 10 can point to what has been said in this column a number of times this year: watch out for Iraan. I don't think they can beat Van Horn; for one thing, they will be alerted after their victory over Rankin. But after watching my eighteenth game between Rankin and Iraan, I'm thoroughly convinced that the Braves put us down each year as one of the games they'd most like to win.

I say good luck to them. If we can't beat Van Horn, then I'd rather see it go to the Braves simply because they're our neighbors.

One other thing might be noted about the game. I've yet to hear anyone say that Rankin did not do the right thing in going for the two points instead of a tie. Fans and team alike wanted either to win it or go down to defeat trying and that's the way it came out.

A LOSS?—

If you had only seen and talked to the boys on the B team, you would have got the feeling that Stanton put it on they last week. Such were their feelings about the six points that ruined their unscored-on season record.

And I think most of us can understand their feelings. They had a rare opportunity within reach & had worked hard and played hard to reach it when Lady Luck took a hand in the game and thumbed her nose at the Rankin squad.

For those who were not there, it came about thusly: Stanton was in possession at about mid-field.

Their quarterback, on a roll-out pass pattern, was being hotly pursued by two Rankin defenders and rather than take a big loss, he threw the ball far down field and toward the sideline. In the vicinity were three Rankin defensive men and one or two of the Stanton lads. Everyone went up for the ball and two—maybe three Rankin players got a hand on it. Coming up to try and stop what looked like a sure Red Devil interception was one Stanton man and the ball eventually popped out into his hands—he faced toward to goal line and Rankin's men turned the opposite direction. Six points for Stanton and the end of an unscored-on record.

Needless to say, Stanton did not convert the extra points and a comment made by the Stanton coach: "Gosh, I hope that didn't make them mad" pretty well described the remainder of the game.

It did make them mad. Score: 54-6.
