With well over 100 entries in the

350 visitors were estimated to  
have viewed the exhibits by 4:30  
Tuesday evening. For the Queen

contest, beginning at 7:30, it was  
a capacity crowd with almost 300  
seats filled and standing room at  
a premium.

With twenty contestants vieing  
for the title, Miss Kathy Smith of  
McCamey was named Queen of  
the 1970 Pecan Show. Runners-up

Pippen of Rankin. Miss Smith, the

## Thanksgiving Day Closings Slated for Rankin Firms

Thursday is turkey day and a  
general one-day shut down of lo-

## Commissioners OK Insurance Pay-off

In their last regular session, on  
November 9, the Upton Commis-  
sioners Court approved several  
motions.

The first of these, by Commis-  
sioner Kenneth LeQuey, second-  
ed by Commissioner Workman,  
was to the effect that the county  
accept the damage loss figure of  
\$3,000 on the motors of the air  
conditioning system on the court  
house, as offered by the insur-  
ance company. The motion was  
approved unanimously.

It will now be interesting to see what comes out of Austin when the legislature meets next year. County by county, liquor by the drink took a pretty good thumping just as it did here in Upton County and it's doubtful that the representatives and congressmen from areas that voted "dry" are going to be too excited about rushing to open the first swinging doors. The big city vote in a half dozen counties accounted for the overall approval.

Certainly, on a local option basis, a big portion of Texas will not—at this time—approve the opening of bars for hard stuff drinkers.

The thing that comes to my mind is—if a law is written in Austin, and it will be sooner or later—what effect will it have on places where liquor by the drink is now being sold? And it is being so dispensed and on a fairly large basis.

One example that comes to mind in our immediate area is in a neighboring county—which, incidentally, is dry—where a good sized operation is being carried out by a country club. Similar operations are scattered all over

the state and I'd guess that you could find fifty in a radius of 200 miles of Rankin—maybe more.

If the new law is written with teeth, and a high permit fee, it may turn out that many of these places will be put out of business. But then, on the other hand, they are against the law now and have been for a long time and I've yet to hear of one being closed.

It will be interesting, true, but probably not much will be changed.

#### THANKSGIVING—

Thursday is turkey day and although times have changed since that first one at Plymouth Rock or wherever it was held, the 1970 version may not be a whole lot different. If I recall my history lesson correctly, it is said that on the first Thanksgiving, the Pilgrims asked the Indians over for dinner and after the feasting they played a few games of sport—probably a little foot racing, a little wrestling—stuff like that.

Well, I don't know exactly what is on tap for Thanksgiving but you can bet that along with the meals and the ceremonies of giving thanks, there will be some fun and games involving foot races and wrestling only we now call it football. It might even be possible that the Redskins will be playing the Patriots. I do not know the Aggie and Steers meet and Dallas goes on the field with Green Bay.

Fun and games we're going to have.




