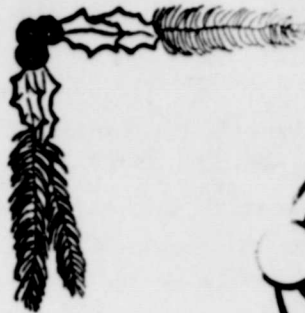

## Overseals Calls for Christmas Easier as New Lines Installed

Six additional overseas telephone circuits added during the past year make it easier for more servicemen to talk with their families in the United States this Christmas season.

John Zittle, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, said a total of 16 circuits are available to Vietnam.

He pointed out, however, that due to the volume of calls generated by holiday calling, persons wishing to reach servicemen in Vietnam should plan ahead for the rush.

"It is generally easier for a serviceman to call home than for his family to try reaching him in Vietnam," said Zittle. "This is because servicemen can call the U. S. from Saigon, Ton Son Nhut, Long Binh, Cam Rahn Bay, Nha Trang, Qui Nhon and Da Nang. Calls originating from the U. S. can be placed only to Saigon."

He added that it is more difficult to reach a serviceman in Saigon unless the caller knows the serviceman's unit, APO and telephone number where he can be reached.

"Although servicemen place calls from Vietnam on a first-come-first-served basis, it usually takes only a few minutes to reach the states once he gets access to a phone at one of the Vietnam telephone centers," Zittle said.

He also reminded residents of the 14-hour time difference between the U. S. and Saigon. For

example, when it is 11 a.m. on December 25 in Texas, it is 1:00 a.m. on December 26 in Saigon.

Calling rates to Vietnam will be the same as last year with the first three minutes of a station-to-station call costing \$9, while a person-to-person call for the same time costs \$12. Each additional minute for both kinds of calls costs \$3.

## Game Official Get 1,754 Oct. Violators

AUSTIN — Game management officers for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department obtained 1,754 convictions in October for violations of the state's game, fish and water safety laws.

Hunting violations led the list with 699 convictions followed by fishing convictions with 526.

Commercial fishing convictions totaled 47; water safety, 509; pollution, two; and trespassing, one.

The total revenue accrued to the state treasury amounted to \$40,278.

## Housing Authority Receives Audit by Federal Agency

Housing Authority of the City of Rankin this week received a report from the Federal Office of Audit Report, covering operations of the Rankin Low Rent Project from November 30, 1966 through September 30, 1970.

In reporting on the operating results of the project, the report states in part:

"Income from dwelling rental and other sources exceeded project operating expenses by \$1,899.68 during the period covered by our audit. Operating results were generally favorable, and this trend, if continued, will provide the LA (local authority) with sufficient income to defray operating expenses and to accumulate its normal maximum operating reserves. . . ."

The audit, however, did turn up one finding. It related to the payment of fees to the architectural firm of Pierce, Norris Pace & Associates for secretarial services during the construction phase in the amount of \$909.22. The auditor maintained that the firm did not properly account for charges to the LA and that it was not in the contract to pay these charges.

A letter from the Dallas office of HUD, which was included in the audit report, requested that the LA initiate necessary action to recover the expenditure.

In complying with the request, the LA was in the process of contacting the architectural firm, located in Midland.

In other recent actions of the Housing Authority, it was decided not to let a contract on yard maintenance since all bids rece-

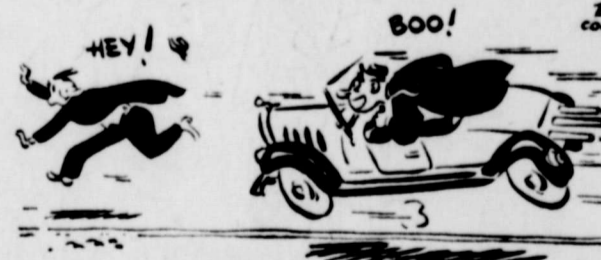

Every memorial gift is acknowledged with a dignified white card naming the person in whose honor the gift is made. This card is sent to the person designated by the donor. It does not state the amount of the gift.
