Awright You People - Where'd You All Go

In the first census figures released last summer, Rankin was credited with 1800-plus residents. In what is called the final release—as appearing in area daily newspapers, that figure had dropped to a mere 1100-plus. Instead of a 50 percent gain as first indicated, the latest marks put Rankin down for a 9.4 loss in population over the past ten years.

Although the releases have not

created any big stir among the local citizenry, it has been a topic for comment and most are of the opinion that Rankin neither had as many as 1800 last summer or as few as 1100 at the current time.

Still, the last figure will probably be the one that will peg the city's size for the next ten years and will mark it as being at its lowest level in over twenty years.



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much longer without at least a promise of more modern service in the near future.

Hopefully the day is not too far distant.

HEAD COUNT—

Somewhere between last June and this past week Rankin seems to have misplaced about 700 of her citizens. At least, that according to what is called the latest census figures.

Last June in the first census count totals to be released, Rankin was credited with 1,854 people. Now, as printed in several area daily newspapers, that mark is something like 1,100 and instead of a 52.87 percent increase as indicated in the first releases we are credited with a 9.4 percent loss.

All of which is a bit confusing if you bother to think about it. For one thing, how did we have a 9.4 drop in population in the past ten years when meter connections at City Hall showed an

increase from 377 meters for water to 436 for the same period? And how did telephone connections increase 43 percent while we were losing 9.4 percent in population? How is it that a number of new houses are now on what were vacant lots in 1960?

Well I'll tell you, I don't know how you explain it but on the other hand it probably isn't any great thing for if you live in Rankin, you are here and if you don't live in Rankin, you're some place else and that's your hard luck.

In talking to Mrs. Sam Bean, who was in charge of the local census, she said that she too was amazed at the difference in the two sets of figures reported. She said that she could not give out the figures as they were compiled locally—that all information had been sent in to area district headquarters.

I sorta got the felling from talking to her—although she didn't say so—that she didn't believe these last figures.

So there you have it. Two sets


of figures supposedly released by the Census Bureau and something like a 50 percent or more discrepancy. Take your pick as to which you want but keep in mind that if you go with the latest set, that Ft. Davis is bigger than Rankin. How's that grab you?

Of course, I guess that's entirely possible since the federal government says it's so and we

all know the feds never get anything wrong, but when I was in Ft. Davis last summer, you could stand on the corner and count almost every building in town and there wasn't 1100 fence posts in the place, much less that many people.

But the government has a creditability gap, you say. Now who would believe a thing like that?



KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER



Shade trees should be pruned during the dormant season to put them in the best possible form for next summer.

Bare limbs let you see where to prune and how much. Tangles and low hanging branches should be reshaped and for that matter, the shape of trees or shrubs can be changed through a careful pruning program.

Most trees need thinning as they approach maturity, but corrective pruning is essential when the tree is young. During the period of rapid growth, branches which have started growing in the wrong position or direction should be removed.

Pruning consists primarily of training cuts, but gradually involves more and more thinning out of weak and finally dead wood as the tree matures.

It's good to remember the old adage—"As the branch is bent, so will the tree grow." Make sure the branches or limbs taken off by pruning should come off for they will not grow back. Thus, the pruning done on young dormant shade trees, to a large measure, determines their beauty and health in later years.

Information is available at my office on pruning methods as well as on treating pruning wounds.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III,
Section 51-a, of the Texas
Constitution, be amended to
read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons;

"(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

Rep. Joe Golman of Dallas car-
ried a measure to give Texas
peace officers the same weapons
now available to federal branches
in the so-called field of wire-tap-
ping, or electronic interception.
The measure, which tracks the
new federal law, is sought by of-
ficer groups, especially in the
major cities and at state level, to
help development evidence against
organized groups in these lucra-
tive fields. Careful safeguards are
provided to protect the rights of
ordinary citizens against what
could be a dangerous invasion of
privacy. Only designated officers
can obtain court orders from dis-
trict judges to use the wire-tap,
and only then for rigidly specifi-
ed purposes and for limited time
periods.

Another interesting hearing devel-
oped Tuesday night before the
Reclamation & Conservation Com-
mittee involving the question of
solid waste disposal by the land-
fill method. This treatment prob-
lem for the big cities is beginning
to affect surrounding counties, with
the city of Houston now planning
to use a landfill area in Brazoria
county, outside the county of o-
gin of the wastes.

Brazoria County seeks relief from
a law which has been interpret-
ed to remove its control over
solid wastes originating in another
county. Dallas county officials op-
pose the measure, along with
Harris County, on grounds that as
cities grow, so do their landfill

see the proposed bill as a tool by
which adjacent counties would
completely prevent any type of
landfill from a neighboring city
The rights of private landowners
also are involved.

Truly the metropolitan areas
have problems which most of us
in the wide-open spaces of West
Texas find hard to comprehend.
As the flow of legislation begins
to pick up, I will welcome ex-

pressions from citizens of the
66th district on any question. It
always helps when writing or
to cite a bill number, the author,
and reasons for support or oppo-
sition.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17)
Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III
of the Constitution of the
State of Texas be amended
by adding thereto a new Sec-
tion 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) The
Texas Water Development
Board shall upon direction of
the Texas Water Quality
Board or any successor
agency designated by the
Legislature issue additional
Texas Water Development
Bonds up to an additional ag-
gregate principal amount of
One Hundred Million Dollars
(\$100,000,000) to provide
grants, loans or any combina-
tion of grants and loans for
water quality enhancement
purposes as established by the
Legislature. The Texas Water
Quality Board or any suc-
cessor agency designated by
the Legislature may make
such grants and loans to
political subdivisions or bodies
politic and corporate of the
State of Texas, including
municipal corporations, river
authorities, conservation and
reclamation districts, and dis-
tricts created or organized or
authorized to be created or
organized under Article XVI,
Section 59, or Article III,
Section 52 of this Constitu-

tion, State agencies, and inter-
state agencies and compact
commissions to which the
State of Texas is a party, and
upon such terms and conditions
as the Legislature may au-
thorize by general law. The
bonds shall be issued for such
terms n such denominations,
form and installments, and
upon such conditions as the
Legislature may authorize.

"(b) The proceeds from the
sale of such bonds shall be
deposited in the Texas Water
Development Fund to be in-
vested and administered as
prescribed by law.

"(c) The bonds authorized
in this Section 49-d-1 and all
bonds authorized by Sections
49-c and 49-d of Article III
shall bear interest at not more
than 6% per annum and
mature as the Texas Water
Development Board shall pre-
scribe, subject to the limita-
tions as may be imposed by
the Legislature.


"(d) The Texas Water De-
velopment Fund shall be used
for the purposes heretofore
permitted by, and subject to
the limitations in Sections
49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided,
however, that the financial as-
sistance may be made pur-
suant to the provisions of
Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1
subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard
to the provisions in Section
49-c that such financial as-
sistance shall terminate after
December 31, 1982.


"(e) Texas Water Develop-
ment Bonds are secured by
the general credit of the State
and shall after approval by
the Attorney General, regis-
tration by the Comptroller of
Public Accounts of the State
of Texas, and delivery to the
purchasers, be incontestable
and shall constitute general
obligations of the State of
Texas under the Constitution
of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature
enact enabling laws in antici-
pation of the adoption of this
amendment, such Acts shall
not be void by reason of their
anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing con-
stitutional amendment shall
be submitted to a vote of the
qualified electors of this State
at an election to be held on

If the silhouette stands away
from the body in a bouffant or
flared shape, the fabric used must
have enough body or stiffness to
repeat this shape. But if the
silhouette clings to the body, con-
forming to its natural shape, the
fabric should be soft and limp
enough to fall against the body.

Between the two extremes —
bouffant and clinging shapes —
there is a straight tailored silhou-
ette requiring a fabric with both
flexibility and body. Such a fab-
ric must hold the shape into
which it has been molded.

The design of a garment, then,
is not created simply by the way
it is cut, but also by the way the
fabric interprets the lines and the
shapes of the dress design.

Materials fall into four main
types: stiff and wiry, crisp and
firm, thick and bulky, and limp
and clinging.

Taffeta, organdy, gaberdine and
some wash and wear materials
are examples of stiff, wiry fab-
rics, which are best suited to
bouffant or flared designs.

Crisp, firm materials including
linen, chintz, muslin and gingham
make good selections for tailored
garments.

Thick, bulky fabrics, like velvet,
terry cloth, fleece and suede, in-
crease the apparent size of the
wearer.

Chiffons, batiste, voile and some
knitted materials are clinging
limp fabrics which hug the body
and reveal the figure.
