All is Ready for Big AJRA Rodeo

It's going to be some rodeo—at least, that's the indications so far as Rankin Lions Club put the finishing touches on preparations for the three-day celebration that starts Friday. Some 200 entries

have been received in the rodeo and Les McFadden, AJRA secretary-manager and official advisor on rodeo matters for the Lions, said that Friday night they would be "working slack" until 2 or 3

o'clock in the morning. Otherwise, he said that he felt that the rodeo had an ideal number of entries to enable the best performance and entertainment.

With a starting time announced for 7:30 on Friday and Saturday nights, the rodeo proper is expected to be over each night by not later than 11:00 p.m. Sunday's show gets under way at 2:00 in the afternoon.

Officials of the rodeo will include John Kearney of Marfa as announcer; Jake Shipp, arena director; Grimm Taylor, timer; Tommy Owens and Charlie McFadden, judges; Lottie Jo Bloxom and Edra Owens, bookkeepers and Bob Burns, clown.

OTHER EVENTS

A number of "side" events are planned over the week-end with one of the main attractions being the noon barbecue, Sat., July 3 at the Swimming Pool Park. To be sponsored by the local chapters of Beta Sigma Phi, they will offer a catered barbecue—all you can eat for \$1.75.

Still another event that promises to draw considerable attention will be a Western Dance at the Rankin Park Building from 9 'til 1 on Saturday night. Sponsored by the Lions Club, admission is to be \$3 couple, \$1.50 stag.

In operation at the rodeo will be a large concession stand offering the usual assortment of cold drinks, candy and snacks, plus such goodies as sandwiches and barbecue on a bun. Also to be in arena area for the young—and the old—will be the Beta Sigma Phi cotton candy machine that is always a popular attraction.

And the parade promises to be a highlight of the three-day Independence Day observance — at least, that's the aim of chairman of the affair, H. G. Adams.

"If he keeps on signing up people to be in the parade, there's not going to be anyone left to watch it," commented A. B. McGill at last Monday night's Lions Club meeting where final plans were laid out.

All rodeo contestants are requested to ride in the event which is billed as a mile long. In addition, Adams has arranged for a flyover of what he terms "the Rankin Air Force", and in addition, he has secured a pledge from Red Weatherbee, president of the Rankin Country Club to have a large contingent of golf carts entered—and that has to be a first.

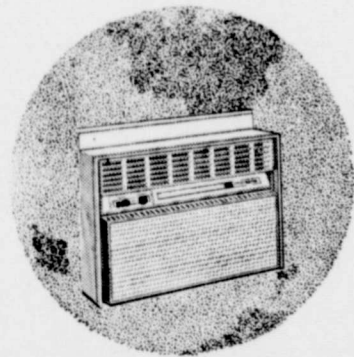
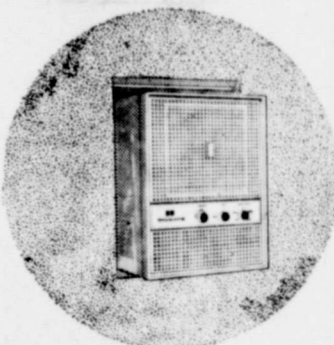
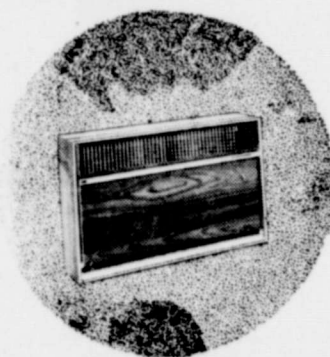
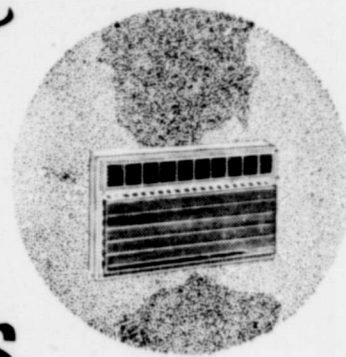
it's played out of town—always if played here.

BUYING CANNED FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

Up to 20 percent can be saved on most canned fruits and vegetables by buying according to intended use and read labels.

Saving food dollars means to shop comparatively among different brands. House brands, or items carried by one particular chain or group of stores, and brands in regional distribution may cost less than brands in national distribution. Also, many packers and distributors sell merchandise under several different labels, ranging from first to fourth and even fifth grade quality products.

When you find one particular brand you like, write down the name for repeat purchases.

Assorted and irregular - piece canned fruits and vegetables are marked with lower prices, and can be used satisfactorily when appearance is not an important factor. For example it's a waste of money to use fancy pack canned tomatoes for chili when the tomatoes completely lose their identity during cooking. A lower grade tomato, then, will serve equally well at less cost.

Unopened cans of fruits and vegetables should be store in a moderately cool place away from heat. Avoid storage near steam pipes, furnaces, kitchen ranges and refrigerator condensers.

Canned foods will keep as long as nothing happens to the container to make it leak. Extremely long periods of storage at high temperatures may result in some loss in color, flavor, appearance and nutritive value, but the food will remain wholesome. A regular turnover about once a year, however, is best.

Unused portions of canned foods can be stored in the refrigerator in the can. Acid foods, such as grapefruit juice, may dissolve a little iron from the can if they stand in the refrigerator for a long time. This is not harmful, but does produce an unpleasant taste. So if you aren't going to use an acid product within a short time, it's best to empty the contents into some other container.

As new fruit and vegetable crops are harvested and processed storage space in the supermarket is in demand. As a result, processed foods are often offered

at special prices. This saving is offered to the consumer in order to make room for the new crop. So take advantage of these specials as they fit your food budget and menu plans.

Legal Notice NOTICE TO ALL STOCK OWNERS:

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter I of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 3. The importance of this legislation and the crowded conditions of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

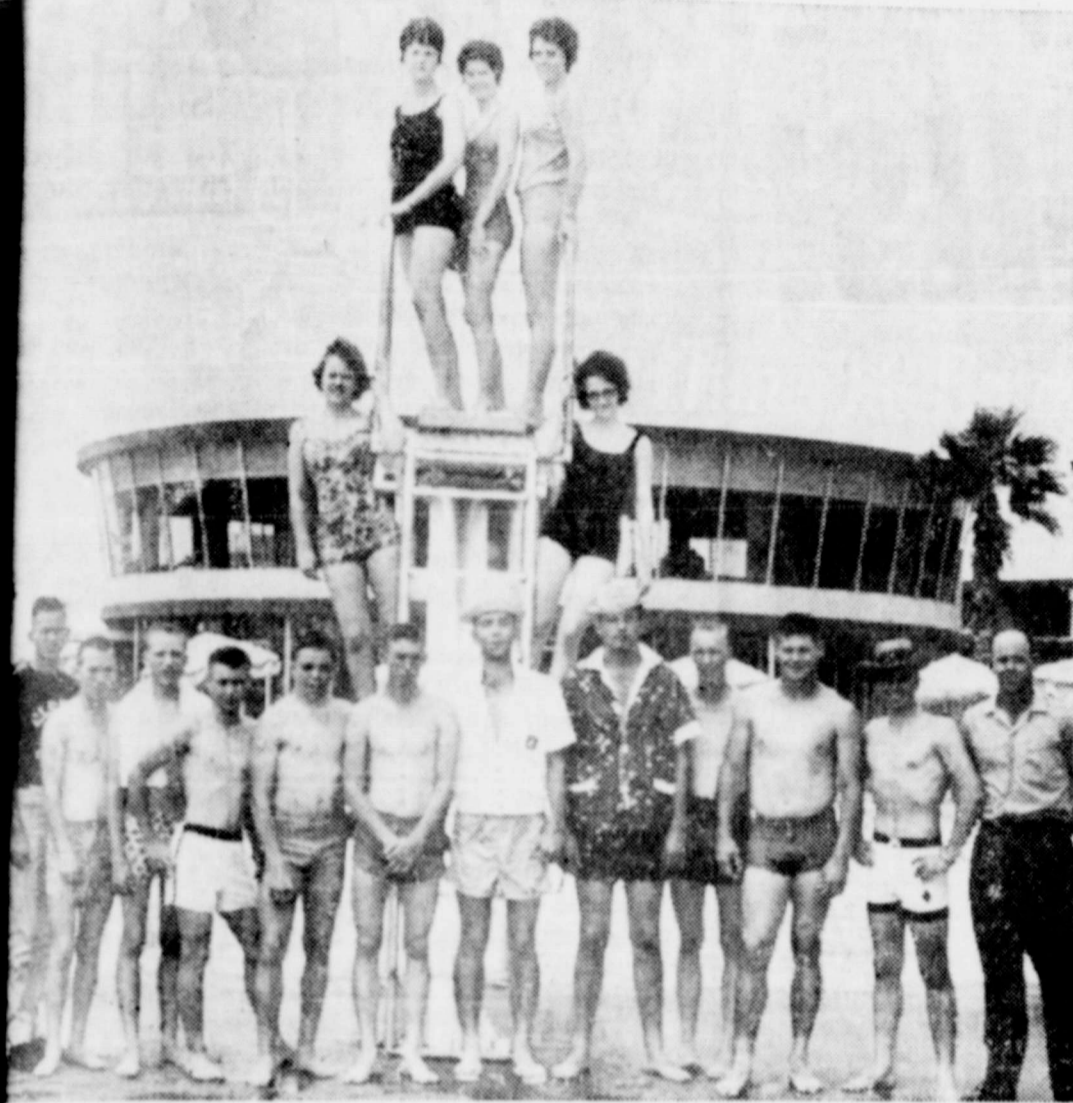

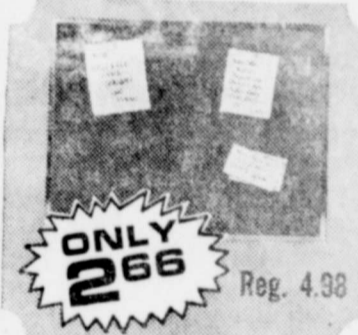
