Dear J. B.:
Most Texas newspapers and unfortunately large numbers of our citizens reacted to our position on the wage-price freeze, as it atfects State employees and teachers, on the basis of emotion, without realizing that there were very good, logical and legal reasons for our position-reasons which
several projects that would be of benefit to the system but so far have decided not to put any of them into effect. Their judgment may be well taken. However, the point I would make is that we should not now sit on our hands, afraid of any new expansion, simply so we can remain debt free. The system, as it stands today, was not attained without the borrowing of funds.
By the same token, simply because we are free of debt, ill advised ventures are not in order just to be "doing something." Since it is a new experience for all of us, it may well be a time for close attention to all future expenditures.
Not many of us have ever had the experience of being debtfree. It could take some getting used to.

RINGS A BELL-
In football, we are all familiar with the expressions of "wide receiver" and "split end". And yet, in the more daily vernacular and using these same expressions, I somehow get a picture of a tax payer who has just had a closed session with the income tax peop-
compelled us to take that position
The issue is not, as has been suggested by many, that we or the State of Texas oppose any reasonable means of curbing inflation Nor is it that we want special treatment for our State, its employees or teachers.
It is simply a question of whether Texas will be treated in a manner consistent with other States, almost all of which have already had pay raises go into effect for their employees in the past year, whether the Governor is supposed to protect and defend the Constitution and laws of his State, or simply forget his oath of office, and whether the Cong ress actually could authorize, or did authorize, the President to void State laws.

Indeed, we in Texas have been in the vanguard of the fight a gainst inflation and ;ecession. We operate under a spend-as-you-go budget, unlike the federal govern ment's inflationary policy of deficit spending, which put this nation more than $\$ 20$ billion in the red last year.
We have cut spendng wherever possible and event vetoed the entire second year of the biennal appropriations bill so that we could reduce spending to more sensible levels. We have prevented the enactment of unnecessary
