

Schools Added -- Two Moved Up --

District 6-A has New Alignment

District 6-A has grown in size and possibly in size. It is believed to be one of the largest districts in area in the state. It will now reach from the east to El Paso in the west; from Sander- son of Marfa and Bal- morhea to the south to Wink on the north.

Seven teams, Rankin, Sander- son, Iraan, Wink, Clint, Marfa and Balmorhea will now make up the district; Van Horn and Socorro having been moved up to Class AA. This alignment will apply to all UIL sponsored athletic and literary functions. For basketball, the district may be divided into east and west zones

although this is yet to be de- cided.

In a meeting Monday, October 18 in Balmorhea, officials of all seven schools met and worked out the district football schedule for 1971-72 and made several other arrangements. Among these was the establishing of the admission price for next year's football

games at \$1.50 for adults and 50c for students; home team to wear dark jerseys; home team to keep their gate receipts.

High school enrollments for the schools of the district currently stand at: Marfa, 212; Clint, 188; Rankin, 177; Iraan, 167; Wink, 162; Balmorhea, 138; and Sander- son, 127.

In drawing for district football play next year, Rankin's schedu- le turned out as follows:

- Oct. 13, Clint, there
- Oct. 20, Sanderson, here
- Oct. 27, Open

- Nov. 3, Marfa, there
- Nov. 10, Iraan, here
- Nov. 17, Balmorhea, there

In their non-conference schedu- le for next year, the Red Devils were having some trouble lining up four games. Eldorado and Mc- Camey have already agreed to play while questions have devel- oped with Stanton and Sonora.

As of Wednesday morning Coach Turner was still trying to work out arrangements. Should Sonora and Stanton drop out, there is some speculation that Robert Lee and Seagraves might be interest- ed in games with Rankin.

Red Devils Host Clint Lions Friday

Gunning for their second win in district action, the Rankin Red Devils will be on the look-out for sharp lions' teeth when they host Clint Friday. Kickoff time will be at 7:30 p.m.

Last Friday in Socorro, the Red Devils, playing a team that was not supposed to be too much, found that the Bulldog's bite was worse than his bark and had to come from behind in the second half to win. This week in Clint they again face a team that is

not rated to give them too much trouble, but they won't likely pay much attention to ratings this time.

Thus far in the season Clint has lost only two ball games, a 28-8 affair to Alamogordo JV and last week's 39-0 loss to the powerful Iraan Braves. The Lions beat Dell City 12-7, won over Balmorhea 9-6, tied Fabens at 6-6 and walloper Fort Hancock 43-0.

On paper, at least, they are a much improved team over last year's squad.

Rankin and Clint have met on three previous occasions with the Rankin squad having won all the encounters. In doing so, they have amassed a total of 143 points to Clint's three. It will be remem- bered that up until last week, So- corro had never scored on Ran- kin in three games.

Previous results are: 1968, Ran- kin 60, Clint 0; 1969, Rankin 55, Clint 3; 1970, Rankin 28, Clint 0.

All fans are invited to attend the Thursday games at no charge.

Hit by injuries most of the season, the Red Devils got the news this week that the largest player on the squad, 190 - pound center Kenneth Boyd was out for the season. Boyd had a knee op- eration this week.

Replacing the junior starter at the center slot is sophomore Asa Rhodes at 153 pounds. Rhodes made his first start last week at Socorro and is doing a good job for the team.

All the remainder of the Red Devils are expected to be ready for action Friday with the possi- ble exception of Jimmy Eggeme- yer, a sophomore guard who has a gimp knee but is improving.

Thursday Games

Other football action for local fans will include a pair of games at Red Devil Stadium Thursday afternoon and night when Rankin hosts the Iraan B Team and 8th Grade. Iraan does not field a 7th Grade football team.

Action will open at 3:30 p.m. in the 8th Grade match, followed by the B game. Rankin lost the first 8th Grade encounter earlier in the year but won the B Game; however, Iraan is said to have added a number of boys to their B squad and they have been go- ing great guns.

It has been said before in this
column and is said again—bunk!
Most of this confusion is caused
by people wanting to make their
job look important or to draw at-
tention to themselves.

One of the primer movers in
this direction—as has been point-
ed out by more than one news-
paper editor—is the tax supported
Food and Drug Administration.
This outfit is so overstaffed and
pushes so hard to make their
jobs look important that they will
take a shot at anything that
moves, often with little or no ef-
fort to scientifically pin down the
facts in the case. It was this
bunch that stirred up all the guff
about cyclamates, about mercury

in fish, about DDT and on and
on.

True, the FDA does some good
in keeping harmful products off
the market but they should not
use a shotgun when they fire for
quite often they're hitting some
innocent people and products and
when this happens, jobs are often
lost, industries literally go broke
and much unnecessary confusion

is spewed about.

All of these Congressmen we
have up in Washington love to in-
vestigate this or that—some even
go as far as Paris to make in-
vestigations on behalf of taxpay-
ers. It might be well if they
could find time to investigate
the U. S. Food and Drug Admin-
istration and see who is putting
out all the crud.

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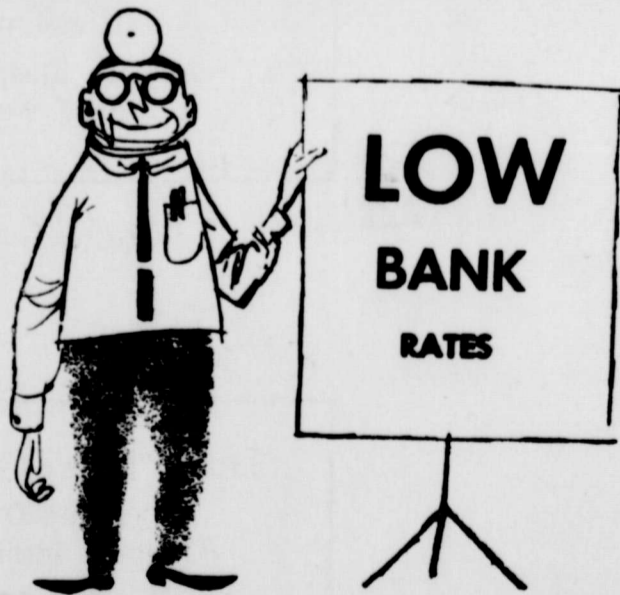

have nothing to lose—if they get beat, so what—while on the other hand, Rankin has to win. A loss to Clint coming prior to the final three games would almost certainly kill all chances for the Red Devils to win district.

It is interesting to note that out in Van Horn they are speculating that the district winner may well lose one game during the race—assuming that the loss is among the Rankin, Van Horn, Iraan, Sanderson contenders. For

either of the four to lose to Clint or Socorro would almost finish them this year.

As for the eventual winner of the district not getting through without a loss well, it's more than possible; in which case we would probably have a tie of some sorts for the crown and the representative being chosen on the basis of who won what game, etc.

It promises to be a grand race, provided Clint or Socorro cooperate and don't upend anyone.

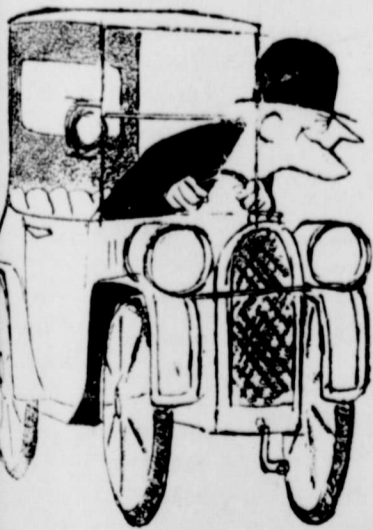

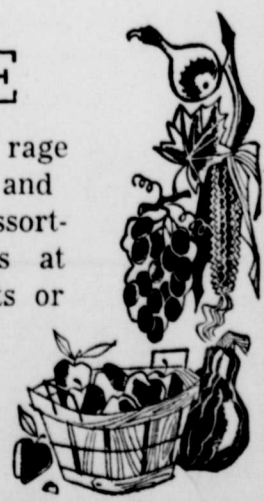
