body else could get it in such a mess—I've stashed by golf sticks and caught up some on reading.

One little item I ran across is called the "New Red Riding Hood Story." It's a wee bit long in its original form for this column so I'll try to give you a condensed version. Here 'tis:

It seems there was this little chick name of Red Riding Hood. Her grandma, who lived across the street from the park, was laid up in bed for the day (probably a big party the night before) so Riding Hood gets this groovy idea of taking her some goodies to eat—tv dinners, frozen foods, pep pills—stuff like that.

Well, she started out by way of going thru the park and there she ran into this Wolf guy who was hanging around. She laid the story on Wolfie boy and he got a bright idea. He split for grandma's house, got there ahead of the Riding Hood bird, and ate up grandma.

He then took two Alka-Selsers, jumped into grandma's bed and was there when Riding Hood showed up. But Hood was no dumbbunny. She saw right off that something wasn't right here because the character in grand-

ma's bed didn't have the red out of his eyes, his teeth had no sex appeal and he hadn't used a mouthwash.

Red Riding Hood put on a big screeching act and ran out the door. Now out in the park was this guy with an ax cutting down trees for a freeway. He got the drift of the situation, ran in and chopped up the Wolf into very small pieces.

His picture was on the tube and in the papers and everyone said he was a hero—or at least, that was the original version of the story. But this is 1971.

Comes now the Civil Liberties Union and demands an inquest at which several facts emerged.

One year from the date of the incident at grandma's, her house was made a shrine for the wolf who had bled and died there. All the town officials spoke at the dedication, but it was Riding Hood who gave the most touching tribute.

She said that while she had

been selfishly grateful for the guy with the ax when he intervened, she now realized that she had blew her cool and overreacted. As she knelt and placed a wreath in honor of the brave wolf, there wasn't a dry eye in the whole town.

The moral of this little story: thing just ain't what they used to be.

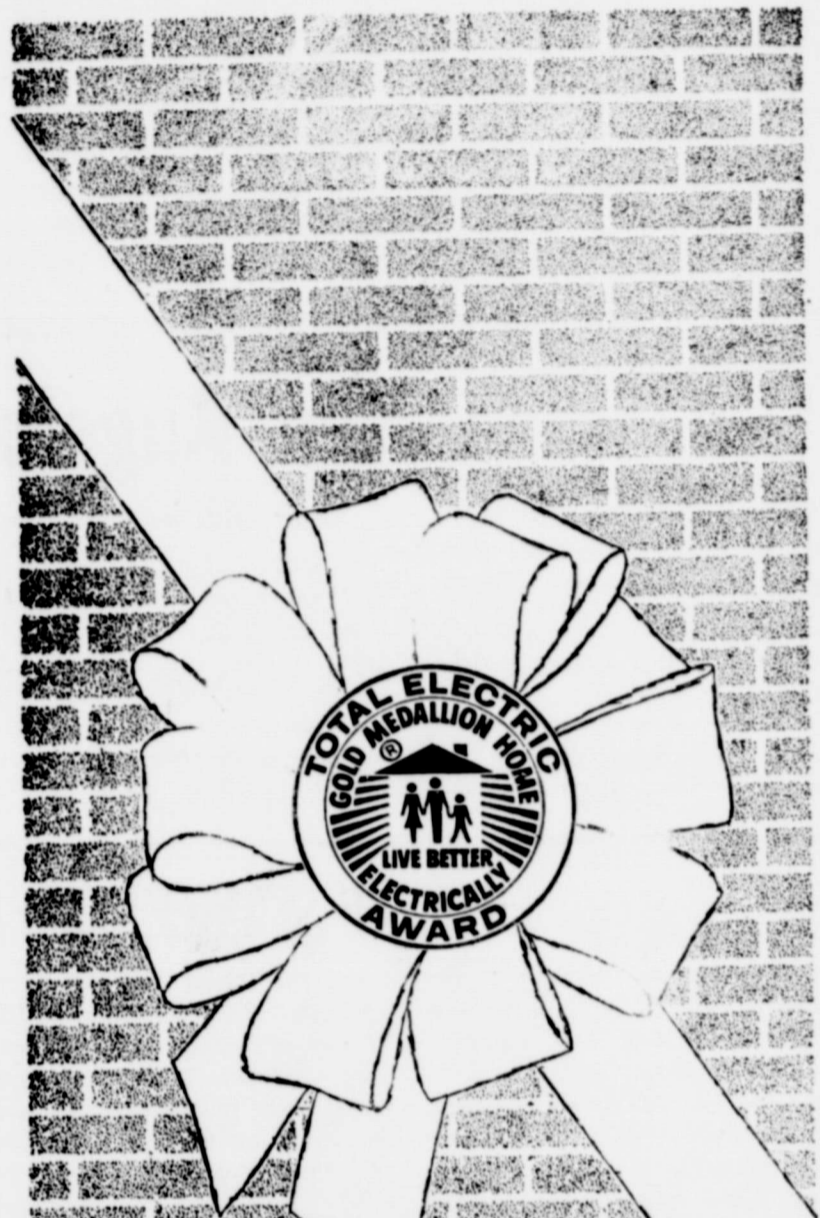

Testing 1st Grade Reveals Worth of Kindergarten

Last year marked the first full year of Kindergarten operations in Rankin Schools. Began with state requirements, the need and advisability of such a program in a small school raised several questions in the minds of local educators; namely, was Kindergarten necessary and needed?

As a result of tests administered to First Graders over the years in the local system, some definite conclusions can now be drawn concerning the local Kindergarten program. These results were presented to the Rankin School Board at a recent meeting in the form of a comparison chart taken from 1964 to the present.

Since reading, or the ability to

learn to read, is the basis of all learning, the 1971 First Graders were tested on their ability to learn reading. The testing was divided into six zones with Zone 1 being: Superior readiness characterized by high interest and eagerness. In this zone, only 15% were so graded in 1964. In 1971, after one year of Kindergarten work, this figure had risen to 57%.

Zones 2: Should learn to read with considerable ease and speed, was at about the same percentage, 39 in 1964 and 35 presently.

Zone 3: Upper average. Learning rate should be satisfactory if not "pushed" beyond interest. In '664, it was found that 26% were in this area. Currently the percentage figure had dropped to 8.

Zone 4: Lower average. Learning can be accomplished by slow, patient effort. In 1964, the figure was 9 as compared to the present 0.

Zone 5: Harm could result from persistent effort to teach reading. Child could be alienated from

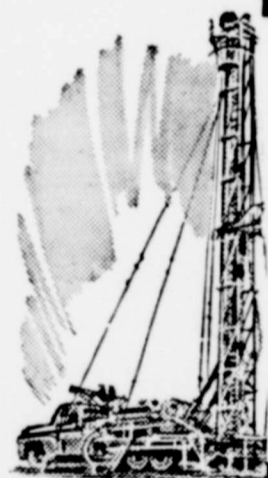

**January 1 is Shot
Deadline in School**

Rankin Schools this week re-
minded parents of school age
children that January 1, 1972 is
the deadline for having immuni-
zation shots. A new state law is
now in effect on this matter.

Following is a statement releas-
ed Wednesday:

"The regulation issued by the
Board of Health allows up to
January 1, 1972 for unprotected
children to start their immuniza-
tion against Polio, Diphtheria, Tet-
anus, Pertussis Measles and Ru-
bella.

"In future school years, new
enrollees must have started im-
munization prior to school entry.
Immunization should be complet-
ed as soon as medically feasible.

"Begining June 1, 1972, certifi-
ed copies of immunization rec-
ords will be required.

The shot regulation applies to
all students, from Kindergarten
through college.

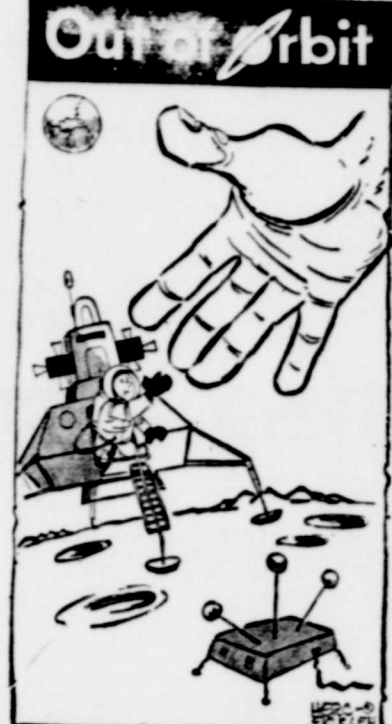
