County Voters Failing to Register

"Where is everybody?" would be the proper question to ask in relation to voter registration in Upton County, and the answer to the query has folks at the tax office scratching their heads.

"I just don't understand it — this being a presidential election year," said Edith Windham, chief office deputy.

As of last Tuesday, only 1840 prospective voters could definitely be counted in all of Upton County as compared with 2005 that were

on the voter list last year — an "off year" in which registrations usually slump.

Of the 1840 who have qualified to vote thus far, 656 are listed as having signed up in the Rankin-Midkiff area and 1194 in the two McCamey Precincts. It should be noted; however, that a portion of the Rankin-Midkiff number will vote in McCamey also. They merely registered at the courthouse while in Rankin on business or otherwise. These figures compare with 673 actual votes in the Rankin - Midkiff Precincts last year and 1332 for McCamey.

One group of voters who have come forward in good numbers, according to the office deputy, is the 18-21 age group; voting for their first time in a full scale election from city hall to the White House. Although their number is no longer kept separately from the older-age voters, it is estimated that they have "just about all registered."

Last year, when they could vote only in federal elections—of which there were none—132 of the youthful voters registered in Upton County.

Still, the quest goes on. Voter registration no longer closes on January 31 and there may yet be more register in the county. However, drawing from past experience, officials are putting these

GED Tests to be Given in Rankin

General Educational Development (GED) tests will be administered in the high school guidance office Thursday and Friday, February 3 and 4, according to Melvin Wimberley, counselor for Rankin Schools. The tests are to begin at 8:00 a.m. each morning, ending at 3 o'clock Thursday and at noon Friday. A total of five two-hour tests will be given.

The tests are administered primarily for persons who have attended Adult Basic Education Classes, but may also be given to other interested applicants who meet the following requirements: one must be a resident of Texas; one must have reached his or her 17th birthday; one must not have been enrolled in high school for the past year prior to taking the tests.

The cost of the tests is \$7.50.

A high school equivalency certificate is issued by the State of Texas to those qualifying for such.

to us this week by a reader. It has to do with the long hair bit and told of a school district in Central Texas that had fired a teacher who refused to get his hair cut and suspended 37 high school students because they protested against the school's rules against long hair.

A similar incident occurred in a north Texas school and the teacher took the matter to State Education Commissioner Edgar in Austin. Edgar ruled that the school board was within its rights in firing the teacher and then he made the comment that went something like this: "it's about time for school boards to stop concerning themselves so much with dress codes and get on with the business of education."

It is reported — but not confirmed—that one Odessa school has dropped all such codes.

So far, in Rankin, we have been a little more civil in our approach and have not had to fire anyone or take other drastic actions. Hopefully, this approach can be maintained by all concerned. I don't see how any school can operate without some sort of codes or rules and it would seem to me that reasonable students would go along with reasonable rules. I think we have both.

A good bit of comment has been made to me about the letter of two weeks ago—both pro and con—and it would seem that the subject has been pretty well covered. Maybe we, too, should get on with the business of education, and as far as I'm concerned, this closes the subject for the Scoop column.

SOMETHING NEW, YET--

It may well be that there's nothing new under the sun but every once in a while, something comes along that's new to me. One of the latest of these is the horizontal water well — the hole is drilled sideways into the earth rather than in the normal vertical style.

This method is reported to have been developed in California and is said to now be in use in parts of Arizona and New Mexico, both like West Texas—not overly blessed with water in any direction.

It's an interesting idea and, if it will work in these parts, might be something to think about in the area of municipal water supply for towns such as Rankin.

Anything that will get us a bigger water supply is worth talking about.

**WTU to Sponsor
Nuclear Science Trip**

West Texas Utilities Company will sponsor an outstanding student from Rankin High School to the 12th Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools to be held in Austin June 5-8, according to Local Manager Burl Pringle.

Held on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin, the four-day symposium is co-sponsored by the university and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. West Texas Utilities Company and nine other investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas compose the foundation. The foundation is sup-

porting research at the university in seeking a future source of energy for generation of electric power by controlled nuclear fusion reactions.

A number of noted speakers from science, industry and education will address the delegates to the symposium. Two afternoons will be spent touring the science laboratories at the university. The company also will sponsor

a teacher to accompany the student. Both the student and teacher will be selected by the high school. Some 550 delegates from throughout Texas will attend.

"This is an unusual opportunity for those attending to participate in a most educational, interesting and eventful experience," Mr. Pringle said. "We are pleased that we can make it available to each of them."

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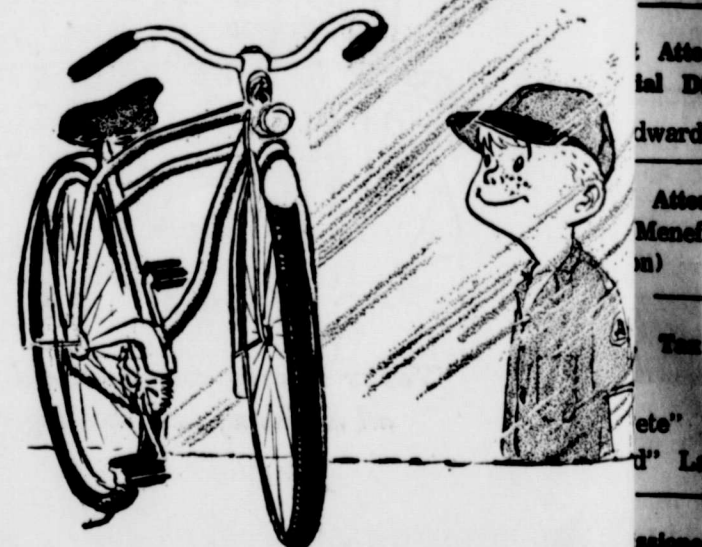
