Tuesday night. Work is to start as soon as the present school term is completed and is expected to take 90 days—making the completion date just prior to the opening of school this fall. Lennox equipment is to be used throughout the installation.

With the new equipment, all the present heating and cooling that

is used will be retired with the exception of steam heat in the gymnasiums and auditoriums.

A total of four bids was considered by the board. Western Air Conditioning of San Angelo bid a total of \$114,075, Jerry's Sheet Metal of Midland bid \$118,530, and C. A. Gray Co. of Midland had a bid of 111,350. One area school

that recently installed air conditioning and heating is reported to have paid approximately \$160,000 for the work.

In other matters, the Board set a tentative budget figure for the 1972-73 school term at \$684,587, up some \$16,663 over the current operating budget. A public hearing on the proposed budget is to be held at 9 a.m., Thursday, June 1 at the high school auditorium. The public is invited to attend this hearing and comment on the budget.

In still other matters, the board

employed the firm of Jack McCreary of Austin on a three-year contract to collect delinquent taxes owed the district, signed teacher contracts, purchased a new 72-passenger school bus and adopted a change in school policy that requires teachers to retire at age 65, rather than the present 68.

The new retirement policy will not go into effect, however, until the beginning of the 1973-74 term.

Other matters coming before the board were mostly of a routine nature, such as reports, etc.

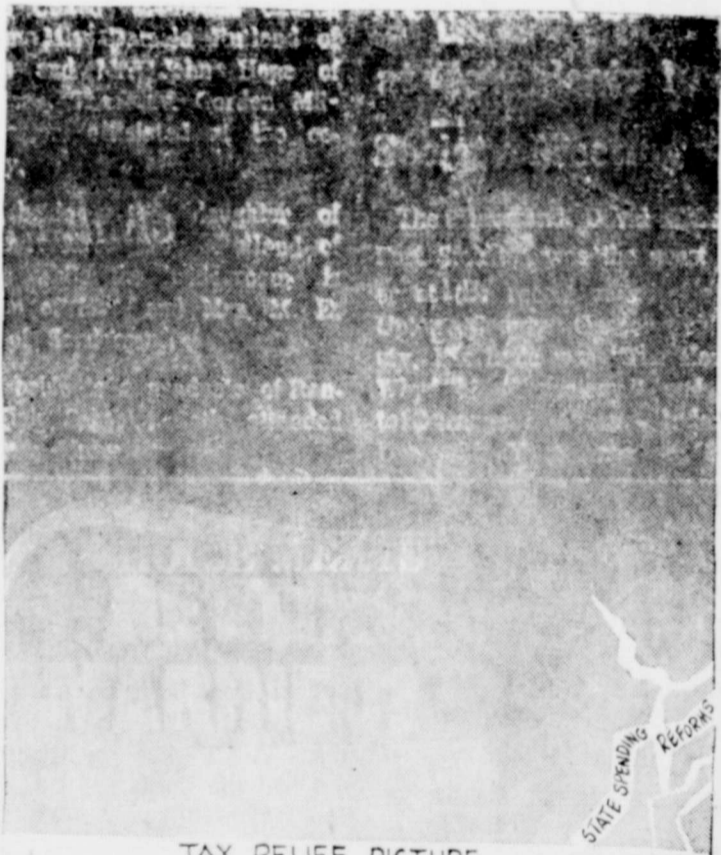
will no longer be "school kids" in Rankin, they will still be "our kids" and that we who remain will follow them and their fortunes and will continue to root for them in whatever they undertake.

Rankin. Again this year — as we did last year — we will host two rodeos and both are big ones.

The granddaddy of all the "Kid Rodeos" will be first; the 4-H All Kid Rodeo June 2 and 3. This will be the 23rd year in a row for this one and it's well known and established in West Texas. There is every reason to believe the 23rd presentation will be just as big a success of all those that have gone before.

In the latter part of June and the 1st of July, we will have the Lion-sponsored AJRA Rodeo. More about it later. For now — just start thinking "rodeo". It's that time again.

GEORGE WALLACE—

It seems as if every three or four years we in America go through what has now become a pattern: that of expressing shock and dismay at the shooting of a public figure. Many speeches are made, some more senseless laws are passed and we Americans, in general, give ourselves a good talking to — then go right back to our old ways.

Now it's George Wallace who has been shot.

Frankly I doubt that this generation is any worse than many of those who have gone before for we've always had gunplay in our political history; and even throughout the life of the Nation. We came into being through an armed conflict, have done battle many times to defend our rights — even to the point of Civil War. Raised on a frontier that was armed and aggressive, we are not so far advanced from our ancestors that the gun has—or will in the immediate future—be put aside as a means of reaching the final answer to questions that confront and confuse us.

True, any man who shoots a George Wallace, a Kennedy or a King is a nut of some kind, still, we know we have such people and we know how they are going to react. The question is: how much longer are we going to carry on this business we call a political

campaign? Why is it necessary for any candidate to have to go about the country exposing himself to the very real dangers of assassination? If he went about the country every day for a year and shook hands for ten hours a day, he could actually meet only a very small percentage of the people who would vote for or against him in an election.

All of the people charged with protection of candidates have said that it's impossible to keep them from being shot. The case of George Wallace proves it. How many more are going to have to be gunned down before we make some changes; other than wringing our hands each time it happens and saying, "What's this country coming to?"

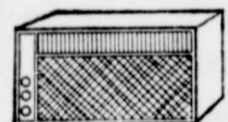
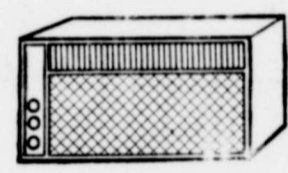
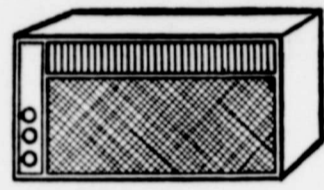
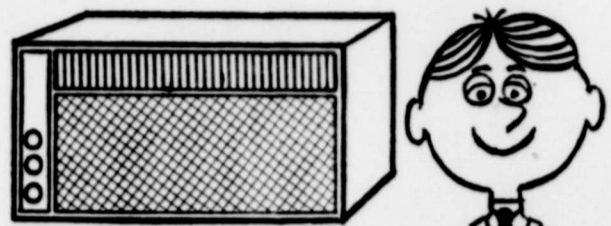
