Rankin Rainfall at 6.32 Inches in May

It's just an old wet country — rains all the time and gets cold.

Although that situation may not last, Rankin has enjoyed the benefits of some 6.32 inches of rainfall during the month of May, according to the figures kept by Mr. Fred Welling, official U. S. Weather Bureau recorder for Rankin.

Last Monday and Tuesday — with rain and drizzle for approximately a 12-hour period, a total of 1.25 inches was recorded.

Last Tuesday's high temperature reached 67 degrees with a low of 59 Wednesday morning — and the heaters were back on at the 1st of June. How about that?

Last Action by Voters Until November --

Voters Return to Polls Saturday

Saturday is election day. Voters across Texas will go to the polls and make their final decisions in several state Primary races — both Republican and Democratic.

Precinct 1 voters of Upton County will, at the same time, decide the final outcome of the Precinct's Commissioner race in which incumbent H. Wheeler faces challenger O. R. (Doc) Adams.

In the First Primary Election on May 6, a total of 468 voters marked ballots in this particular race with Wheeler leading the count at 122 while Adams polled 112. Interest in the race appears to still be going strong according to the absentee voting, a big majority of which has been in Precinct No. 1. However, traditionally, the runoff or Second Primary, sees a smaller turn-out of voters than does the First Primary.

On the state - wide ballot, the Democrats will have Barefoot Sappers opposing Ralph Yarborough for U. S. Senator; Dolph Briscoe opposed by Mrs. Frances

Absentee Votes

Reach 114 Total

Absentee voting closed on Tuesday at 5:00 o'clock with a total of 114 votes cast, according to the office of County Clerk Buena R. Coffee. This compared with a total of 214 in the first primary, held last June 6.

With Precinct No. 1 having the only local contested race, 94 of the current ballots were cast by voters from that precinct. Precinct No. 2 had 5, Precinct 3, 3, and Precinct 4, 12.

In the First Primary, a total of 136 absentee votes were cast in Precinct No. 1.

On the Republican ballot, only the race for governor is to be considered.

Polls are to open at 8:00 a.m. and voting will continue until 7:00 p.m. There will be no election board in operation Saturday night.

Voters in Precinct No. 1 will vote at the courthouse, those in Precinct 2, at the Rankin Park Building. The two McCamey boxes will be combined. Republicans may vote as they did in the First Primary.

Election judges for the Democrats will be the same as before and the same board will count the absentee ballots.

And with that, voters will wind up their duties until the big shoot out in November when the General Election is held.

All who are to be in the parade are requested to be at the Rankin Park Building by 5:30 Friday. The parade will begin there at 6, proceed west on 10th Street to Main, south to Highway 67 and west again to the area of the Dub Day 4-H Arena.

Rodeo performances will be at 8:00 p.m. nightly. Tickets may be purchased at the gate.

The horse show will be held on Saturday with the halter class at 9 a.m. and the performance class at 1 p.m. State 4H Rules will be in effect.

There is no admission charge for the Horse Show and the public is invited to attend.

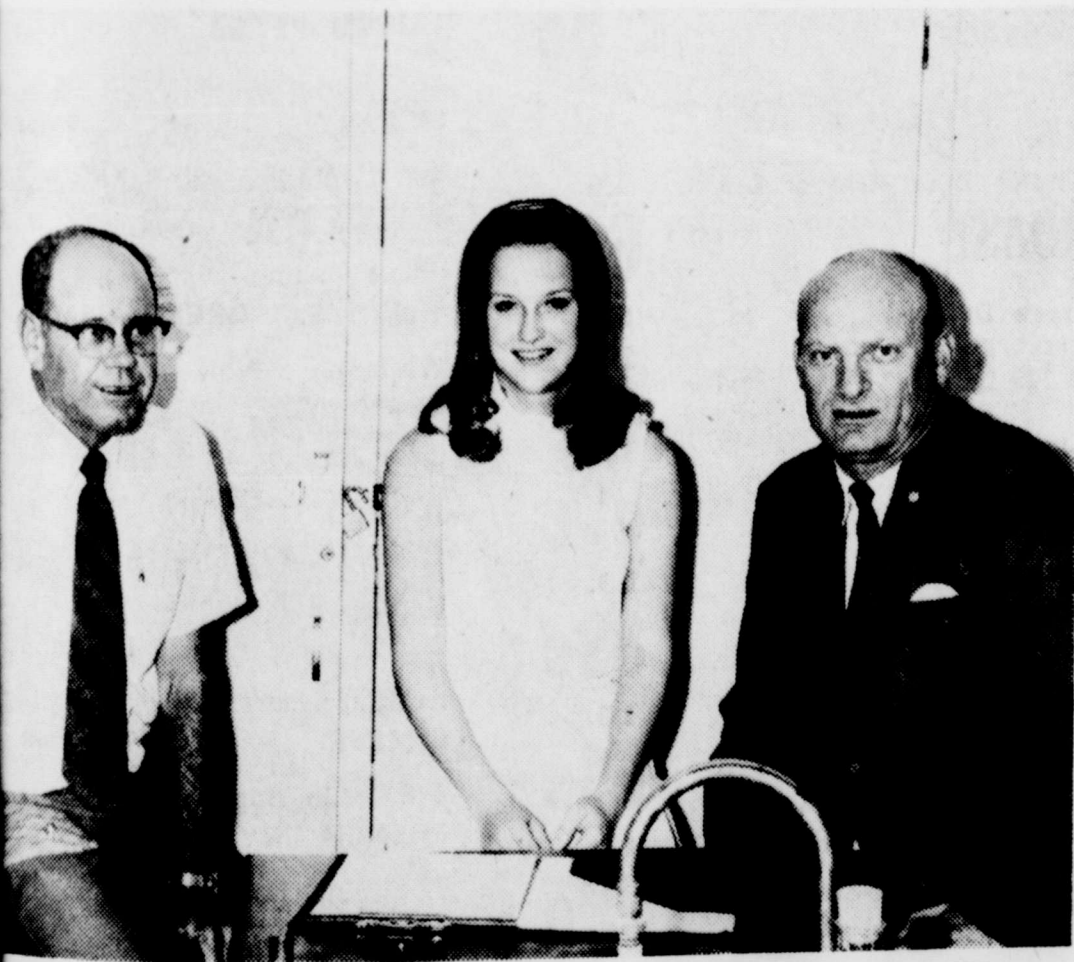

Yes, we have one at our house.

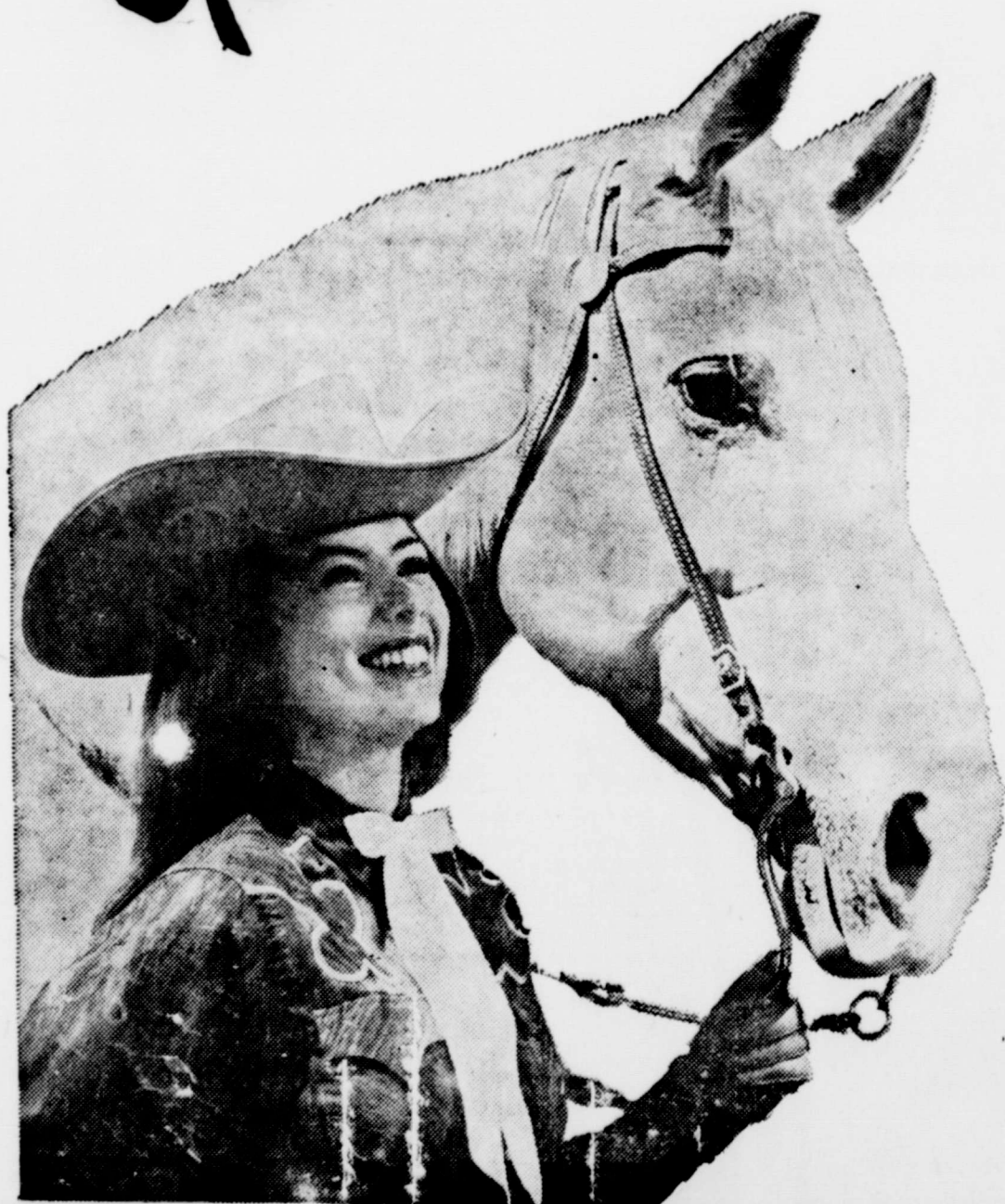

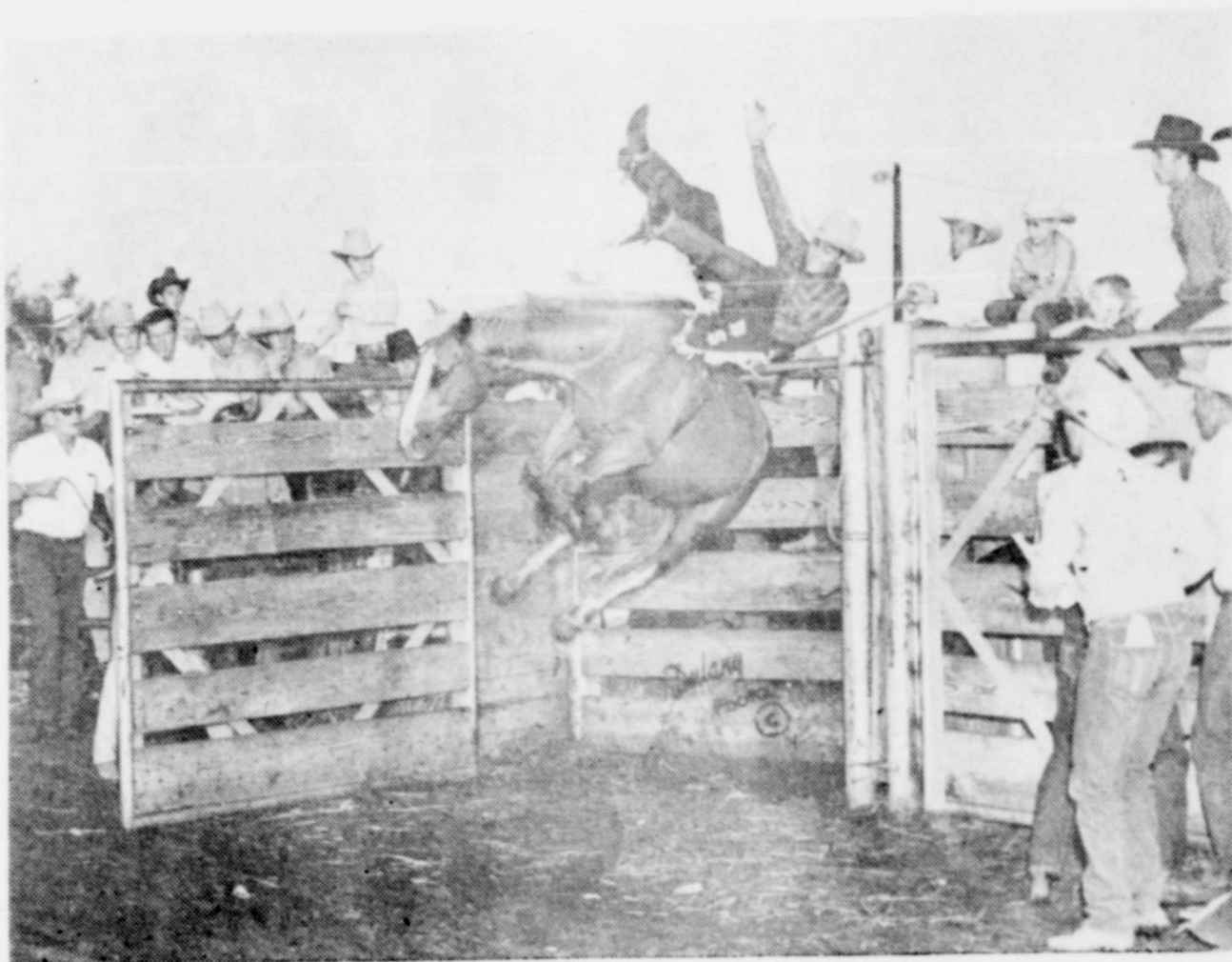

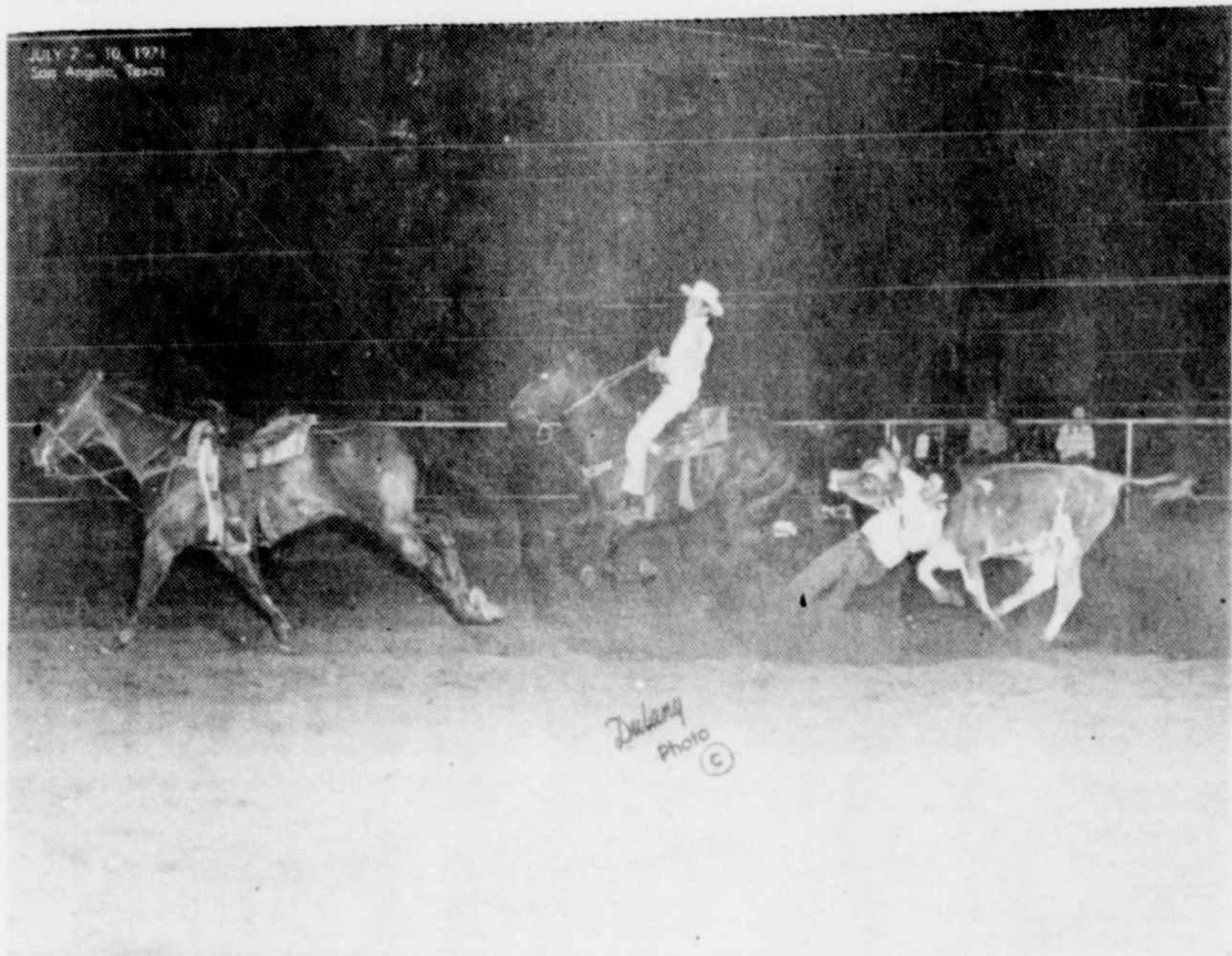

KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

EUONYMUS SCALE

CONTROL —

Now is the time to spray euonymus scale, says County Agricultural Agent Dub Day.

The insects are in what is termed the crawler stage and, therefore, are easier to control.

The scale may be controlled with one of the following insecticides: Malathion, Diazion or Dimethoate. Malathion may be mixed with a light summer oil to give it a better lasting quality.

CAUTION: Do not mix Dimethoate with a summer oil. If you do, it may cause the plant to shed

its leaves.

Use the above chemicals according to the directions on the label. Thorough and complete coverage is essential to obtain control since these insects do not move around on the plant once they insert their bill to suck the juices from that plant.

Because these insects, though they may be dead, will not drop from the plant, you might wash down the plant with a hose in about a week to check on the amount of control you have received.

Lt. McNair Sliver Flying


