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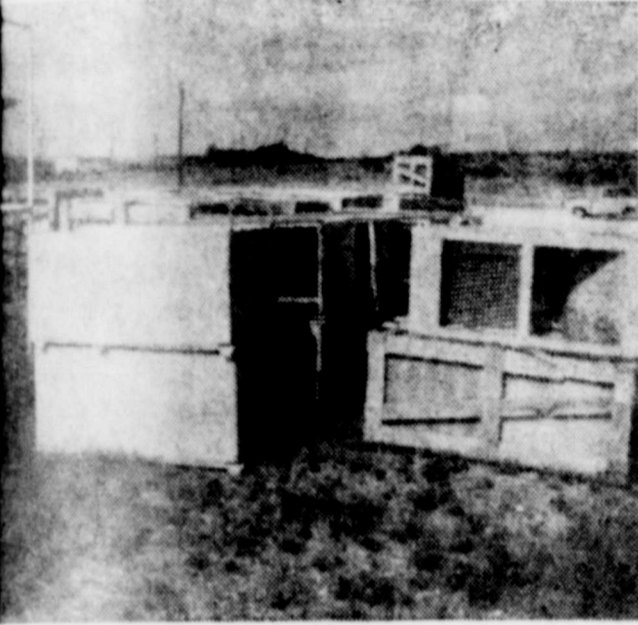

Streets, Lighting, Air Conditioning Work --

Three Projects are "Go" in Rankin

Following what some were saying was one of Rankin's best late springs ever, moisture and temperature-wise, the first days of summer appeared to be for real here this week. Thermometers were nudging past the 100 degree mark—in the high 90's in the shade—and the showers that had been frequent over the past month appeared to have departed.

But it wasn't all bad news for Rankin. Supposedly taking advantage of the old saw of "making hay while the sun shines", two major projects were underway in Rankin this week and another is said to be on the verge of getting started.

Actually having started work last week, County road crews, with some added assistance from extra hands hired especially for the work being performed, were busy with the county-owned slurry machine, retopping streets in Rankin.

Working primarily on the ones running north and south — the up and down hill streets that take the most damage when it rains—some 12-15 blocks have already received the new topping applica-

tion.

Materials for the work casts approximately \$200 per block and a total of about 40 blocks are to be involved.

The second undertaking and one that will add considerably to the night-time visibility in Rankin, involves the installation of new and larger mercury vapor lights in the residential area, along Main Street and on Highway 67. The new residential lights, of which there will be 64, are 10,000 watt bulbs as compared with the old 2,500 watt bulbs. Those to go on the Highway and Main Street are 21,500 size. There is to be 73 of these.

All installation work and bulbs and new equipment is furnished by West Texas Utilities Company. The city pays a monthly fee of \$2.75 for the 10,000 size and a rate of \$3.50 for the larger lights. All replacement costs will be paid by the city.

On the verge of getting underway at Rankin Schools is the installation of the new air conditioning and electric heating system. Equipment has now arrived and electricians were to have started work Wednesday.

When the full crews arrive for the installation work, some sixteen men are said to be called for. The contractor is to have all the work done by mid-August. School personnel will return to the buildings August 15 for orientation work, etc. and students are to go back to classes Aug. 21.

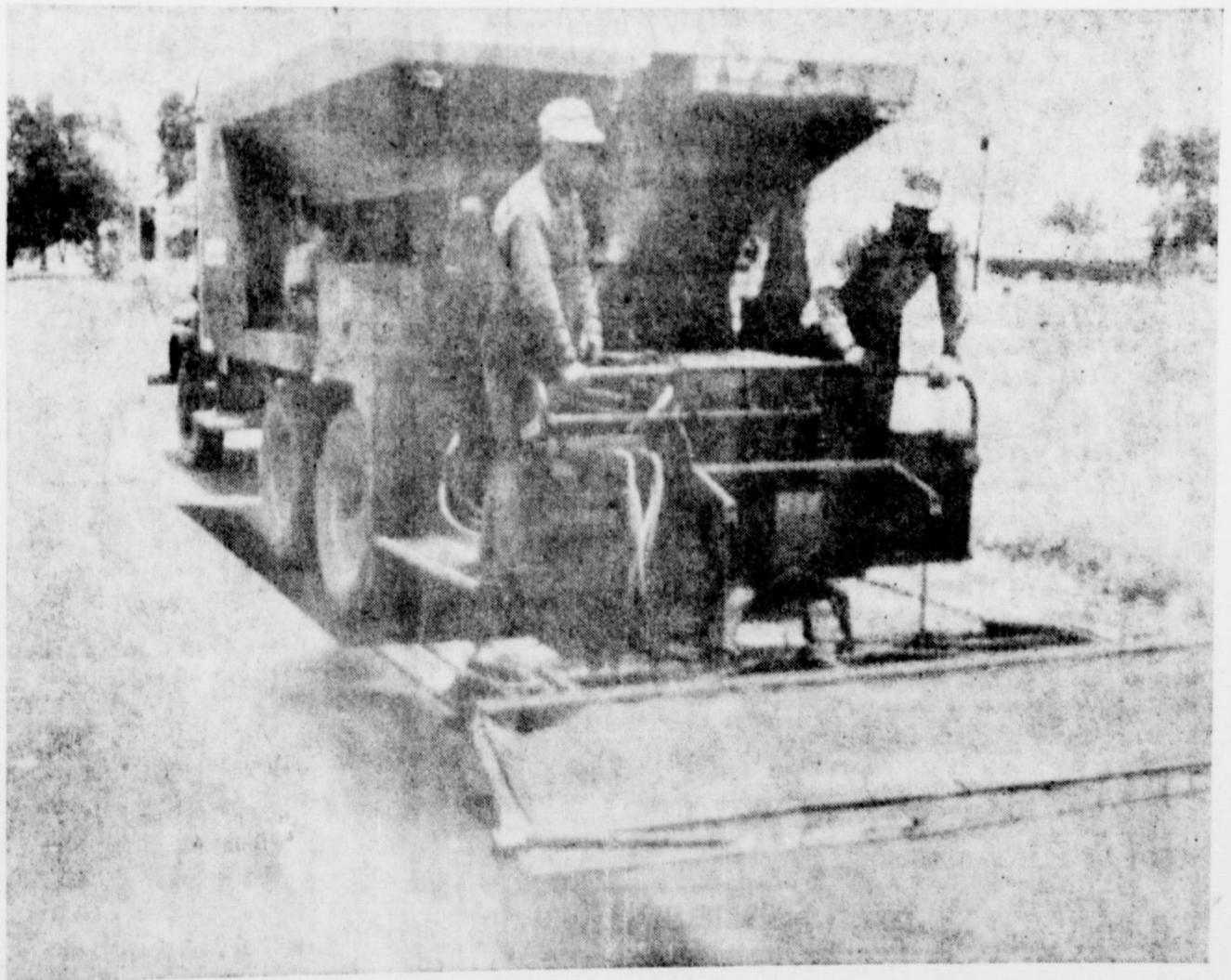

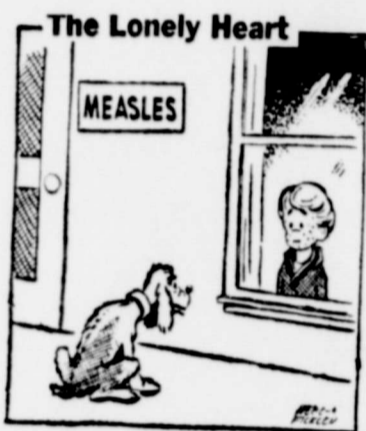

Nixon said he would end the war and he's been trying but it still goes on.

But to get back to the game plans, Sen. George McGovern has come up with one he calls original — that of income sharing. Now I wonder where in the world the Senator has been all these years?

Anyone fifty and under has been sharing his income all his working life — with the Federal government, the state government and local governments. If we do much more sharing somebody is going to have to get off the gravy train and go to work.

Of course what the Senator has in mind, as best can be understood, is to take more money

from all who earn over \$12,000 a year and give it to those who make less than that figure at the rate of \$1,000 per person per year.

Now there's a real dandy idea. They say that 80 percent of the people in the U. S. would be eligible for the handout. Naturally, the Senator figures that 80 percent of the people are going to vote for him because of this idea and thus he's a sure bet to be elected. Could be he's right for the "something for nothing" game plan has won quite a few political matches over the past years.

There is one thing; however, on which the Senator should take note: namely, that all the wealth in the U. S. could be divided equally among all the people and in less than eighteen months, it would be back in the hands of about the same folk who now control the money.

To begin with, the women would get most of the men's share, then somebody would throw a gigantic garage sale and that would be the

end of equal wealth.

But I don't know why I should worry. I don't make \$12,000 so I'm going to be in line to get one of those handouts and even if the wife does get it — well, I won't be any worse off than I am now.

Some of us get accustomed to poverty. We adjust, and man, as any headshrinker will tell you, it's those of us who are able to adjust who are doing all the good.

A LETTER—

Last week the News had a letter from a reader that raised a legitimate question: why do the trash barrels go so long on Main Street without being emptied? I made the rounds Monday and had chats at City Hall and with a councilman or two and — as usual — there seems to be two sides to the matter.

The trash truck is not used for this purpose on a regular basis because of the schedule on which it picks up trash in residential areas. By the time this work is completed, cars are parked up and down Main Street and the large trash truck would be quite unhandy and a traffic obstruction if used up in the day for this purpose.

For that reason, the pickup belonging to the city has been used to empty the barrels on Main St. However, for the past month or so, this unit — which is also used as a work truck on the water, gas and sewer system, has been more than a little busy and there has not been enough time nor help to empty that particular trash on a regular basis.

A further note is that the City Council will likely give this matter some further study at their next Council meeting.

All of which proves that when someone has an idea that will be of benefit, they should come forth with it. City Hall does listen.

Hopefully, we will always be able

to bring up questions and find the answers. There's something sad about the folk in McCamey—and I'm quick to say I'm not trying to butt in or take sides—having to close their hospital, apparently because they could not agree on its operation. Perhaps they can yet work it out for certainly there is a need for a hospital in any town if at all possible.

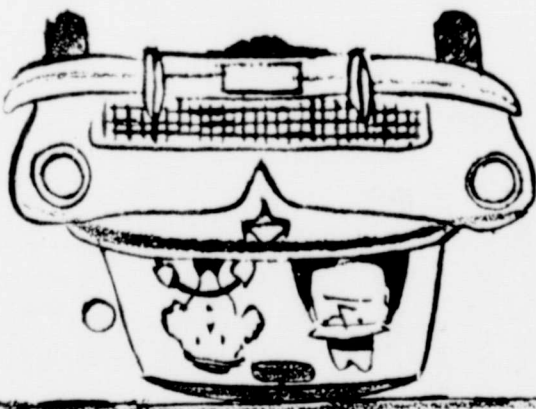
