## Red Devils Winners of Last Three Matches

# Upton County Championship goes to Winner of Friday Nite's Shoot-out

With a kickoff time scheduled for 8:00 p.m. Friday night, the annual Upton County Super Bowl will be played here this year. It will pit the sharp claws of the McCamey Badgers against the red hot pitchfork of the Red Devils and when the dust settles some two hours later, the eventual winner will be entitled to wear the Upton Championship Crown for a year.

A standing - room - only attendance is expected.

This will mark the 11th meeting of the two clubs in the current series which began in 1962. Although the Badgers are well out in front in points and wins, their best efforts came in the earlier years of the series as they took

four of the first five games played

Of the last five outings, Rankin has won three, McCamey one and there has been one 0-0 tie. And it is this latter situation that — according to information received in Rankin, has the Badgers and their supporters coming over with the full intent of reversing the losing streak.

And it would appear that they may well have one of their better teams in recent years. Last Friday, opening with their new wishbone offense, and new coaching staff, they had little trouble spanking the Iraan Braves 38-0. Along the way they rolled up something like 300 yards rushing.

A roster of the McCamey Badgers appears on an inside page of this issue of the News.

However the Red Devils are not exactly defenseless against their bigger opponents. They, too, showed power on the ground and a fair passing game last week in an important win over a good Eldorado ball club, Ranked No. 5 in Class A in Texas on the Harris Power rating system, their substantial victory over the Eagles gave them a slight rise in their points — from 112.3 to 115 — in this week's listing.

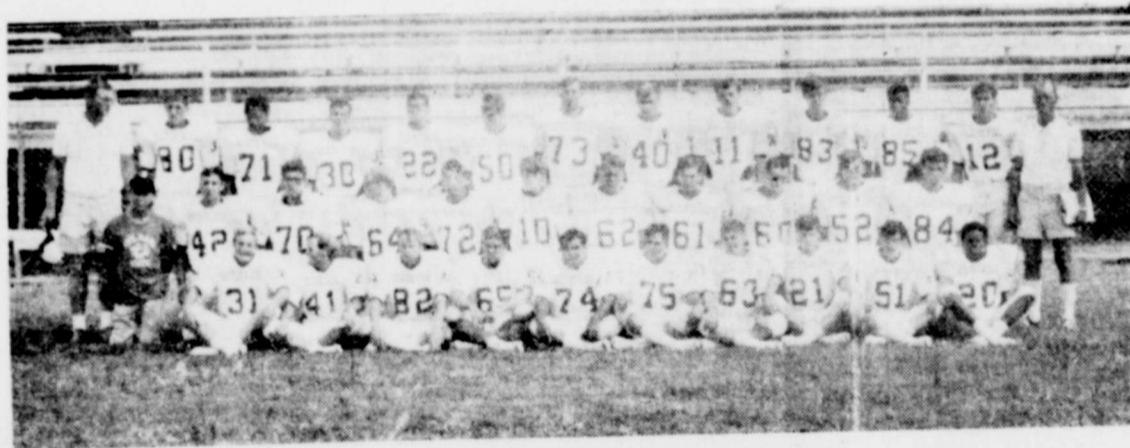
For the McCamey Badgers, put at 97.6 prior to their opening. Harris was much impressed with their efforts last Friday and advanced them to 108.1 on his scale of Ratings. Going into last week's game, Eldorado had been marked at 99.9 by Harris. This would indicate that the Badgers will be tougher than the Eagles were.

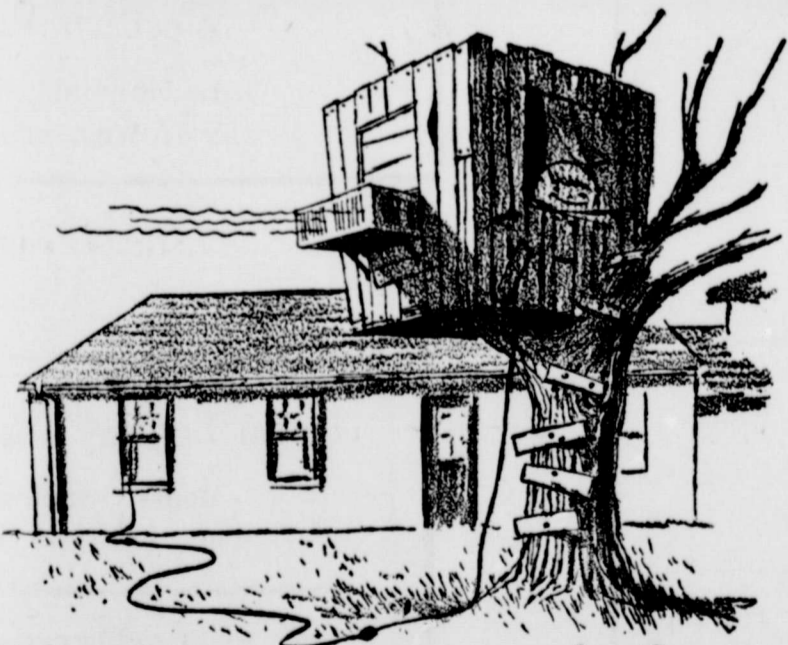

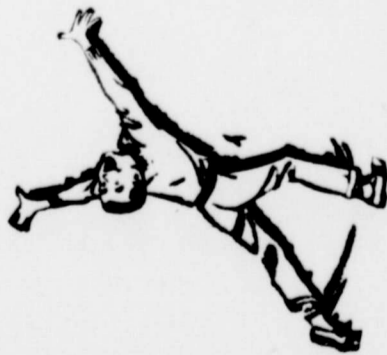

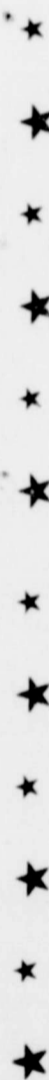

## Commissioners in Regular Session

Meeting in their regular session last Monday, the Upton County

Commissioners Court was made up of Commissioner Tommy Workman serving as Judge Pro Tem in the absence of County Judge Allen Moore who was out of the county, and Commissioners Ken-

neth LaQuey and Charles Fletcher. Commissioner H. Wheeler was also absent.

Others present were Sheriff H. E. Eckols, County Clerk Buena R. Coffee, and, sitting in as an
