Red Devils to Jal Friday Night

Last Friday night the Rankin Red Devils got up a little cook-out. They served hot, buttered wishbones, marinated with tifts of Badger fur. During the process they also retained their Upton County Championship crown to the tune of 26-0. Fans and supporters of the Red Devils were honored guests and a good time was reported by one and all.

This week a big part of the eastern sector of Upton County will be deserted on Friday afternoon when the Devils and their supporters head west for Jal, New Mexico for an encounter with the Panthers. An added incentive for the Rankin team to make a good showing will be the fact that they will represent the first football team ever from RHS to do their thing outside the state.

Jal, located just across the New Mexico state line, west of Kermit, is approximately 125 from Rankin. Kickoff time is to be 7:30 p.m., Mountain Standard Time. This would be 8:30 Rankin time and Rankin fans are reminded to take note of the difference and arrange their departures accordingly.

Jal is an unknown factor to the

Red Devils, this being the first meeting of the teams. They are a Class A team under the New Mexico classifications, this being equal to Texas AA classification. Their past record is an impressive one, having been the state champions in their class for the past two years. They also have the services of several outstanding ball players, including All-Staters.

Thus far in the season, they have played three games, have yet to win but are apparently getting stronger each week. Last Friday they dropped a close contest in the 4th quarter to Tulorosa, a school that would be classed AAA in Texas. With the Red Devils, they will be meeting the smallest school in enrollment they have encountered so far this year.

Also, the game will be played under New Mexico rules, which are only slightly different from those of Texas. The major differ-

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little improvement.

However, it's rather doubtful that they will do much if anything. Most of the Legislators who have commented on insurance have been vague in their statements. One even went so far as to propose that the session be adjourned immediately after it was opened. The insurance interests are very, very strong in Texas and most elective officials walk softly when the subject is mentioned.

Even our own State Representative, Tom Craddick of Midland, although a favorite of mine in the Legislature, said in a tv interview as late as last Sunday, that he was "going to wait and see" what Gov. Smith proposed. I can understand his not buying Smith's deal sight unseen; however, we've known for some time that a special call on insurance was possible in Texas and I'm somewhat surprised that a man of Tom Craddick's ability did not have proposals of his own ready for this occasion.

The people of Texas are being

raked over the coals by insurance and we need some help. This special session could be the start of reforms, provided there are those who will face up to the big insurance interests that have this hold on state affairs.

Oddly enough, if one voter out of ten would take the time to write a note to his representative or senator, saying that some

positive steps must be taken to control insurance in Texas, the problem would be cleared up in short order. Lawmakers are responsive to public opinion — if they are convinced that it is public opinion and not the rantings of some soreheaded newspaper editor who will be the first to admit that he has no love whatsoever for insurance companies.

And that one out of ten will work, no matter what the question before the house. As it is, I'd venture to say that not one voter out of a thousand ever expresses his views on any subject to his lawmakers. It's amazing that most of them do the job as well as they do considering they more or less are working in the dark about true public opinion.

Rankinite's Husband Winner of Navy's "Paul Revereman of the Month" Award

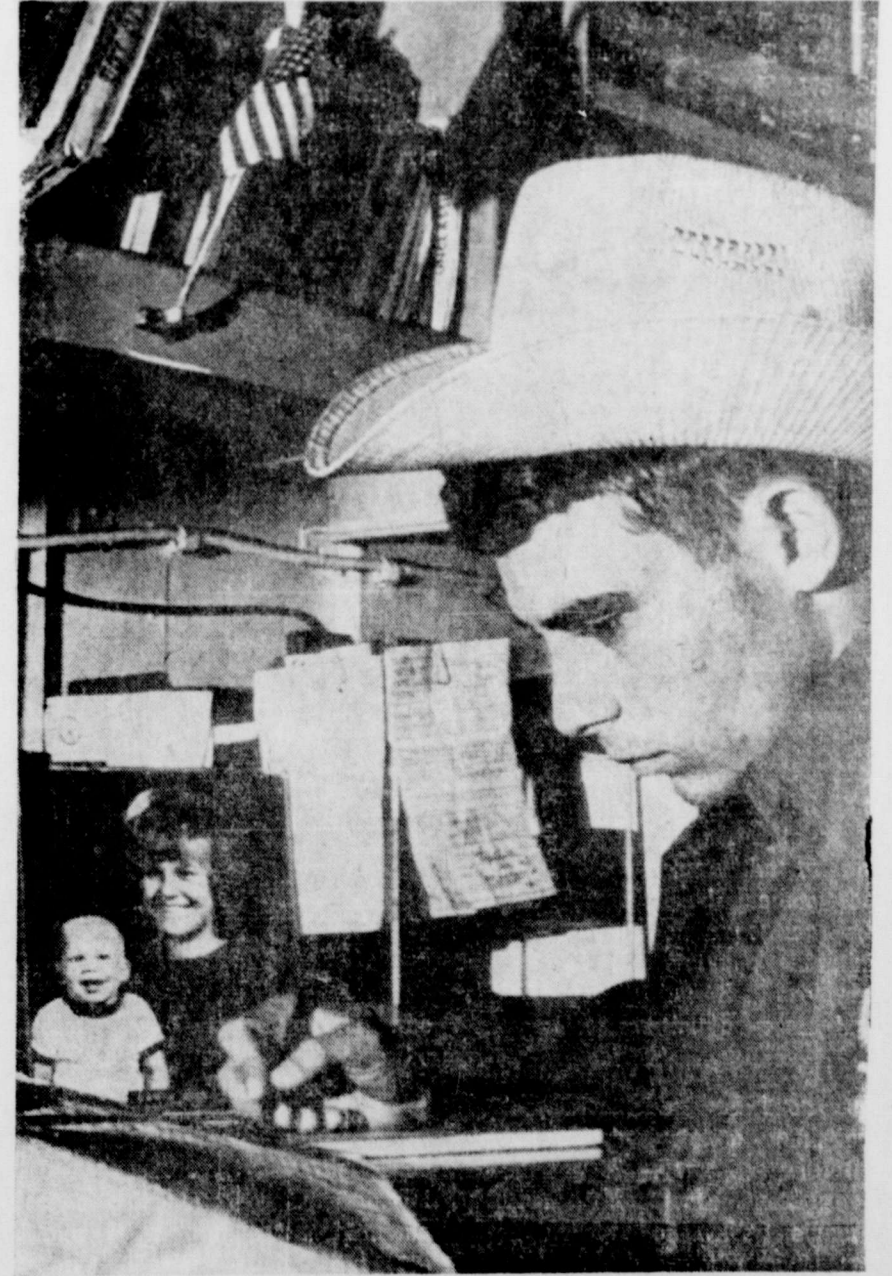
