H. E. "Gene" Eckols Sumbits Resignation--

S. O. "Sid" Langford Named Sheriff

In a brief ceremony held last Sunday, October 1 in the office of County Judge Allen Moore, S. O.

"Sid" Langford was sworn in as Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector of Upton County. A group of friends and relatives were present for the occasion.

Langford, the Democratic nominee for the position, was appointed to the post in a special session of the Upton County Commissioner's Court, held last Friday at which time H. E. "Gene" Eckols submitted his resignation. Langford's name will appear on the November General Election ballot where he will be seeking a full four year term of office. He is unopposed.

Eckols, who has served as the Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector of Upton County for over 25 years, did not seek re-election. He has taken a job with the State of Texas and will work in vending machine licenses inspection. His new job is to take effect November

1. In his letter of resignation to the Court, Eckols pointed out that he was taking the step at this time in order that the current tax collection process of the County could be simplified. Tax collections start each year on October 1 for counties.

In his letter, Eckols said in part:

"I herewith submit my resignation as Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector of Upton (County) effective September 30, 1972.

"I appreciate very much the fine co-operation and courtesy shown me the past 25 years and 10 months by the Court, the other County Officials, the very loyal employees of Upton County. I especially want to express my appreciation to the loyal employees who have worked for me and who, at all times, have done an excellent job . . ."

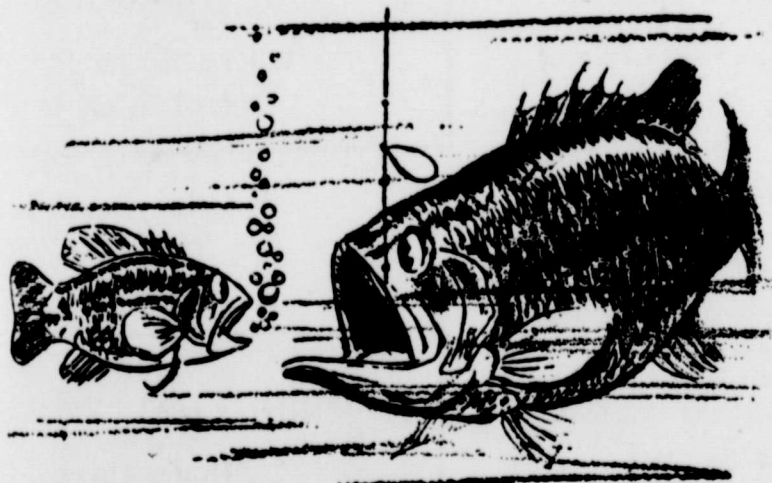

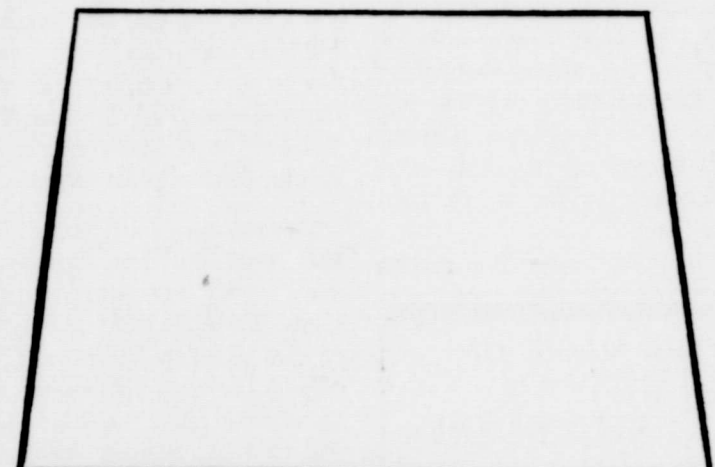

will forever indicate that the Red Devils came out of the tilt with a 4-0 record and Stanton was 3-1; and that situation would have been no different had the score been 40 to zip. As Coach Hefferman commented Saturday morning, "We'll take 'em any way we can get 'em." You bet.

Everybody likes to win big and few are entirely satisfied with a 3-0 score; however, keep in mind that in the last three games against some good AA competition, the Devils have allowed only 6 points against them and, friends, that is winning big. Last Friday may well have been one of our biggest wins. When a defense can hold a team like the Buffalso to a zero, they're giving it one heck of an effort.

Stanton may or may not be that good but last Friday they were very probably the best team we will look at regardless of how far we advance in play-offs—if we do. They truly felt they could and would beat us and it took a gut performance by the Red Devils to make three points stand up.

Fans, coaches nor footballers need not make excuses for that game.

WHO'S NUMBER 1—

Again, this column is written before the ratings are out and a lot of fans are saying that the Red Devils, by virtue of their win

and Sonora's loss, will get the Number 1 spot on the Harris Power Rating — and no mention whatever in the AP Sportswriters Poll. I am not so sure. According to Harris, we were supposed to beat Stanton by 11 points and we fell a few short. Just what effect this will have on who gets No. 1 will have to come out when the listings are released.

I think we deserve it but don't be too surprised if we fail to make it. And if we do make the top, that's no sign we will keep it for ole Sonora plays a much harder district schedule than the Red Devils will face and may be right back—if they're dropped out this week.

As for those AP polls, I told you at the start of the season that they wouldn't pick Rankin very high, if at all. An AP poll is conducted among sportswriters whose newspapers are members of the Associated Press. It would be impossible for any one of these sportswriters to know the merits of every football team in Class A in the state. Generally, they will vote for teams from their area —, partly because of "politics" in the newspaper business— and partly because they know a little something about a particular team. Since there are more sportswriters in the Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston area than all the rest of Texans, it's natural that teams from that area are going to be their choices.

They stick with Sonora because the Bronchos made monkeys out of them for several years in the past and they don't want to get burned again. By overlooking the Red Devils, that's exactly what is happening. Most of the teams the AP is high on couldn't carry water for a dozen or so West Texas squads. They get into the state playoffs simply because of their location. Compare the Harris rating, that uses the same system on all teams and you will see how many West Texas units are in the top 20 — and Harris has an accuracy rating of something like 840 percent. That's a lot better than anything the AP can come up with.

THIS WEEK—

Most folk have felt that if the Red Devils could get through the non-district games with an undefeated record, they could take the district without a loss. We got through non-district without a loss so here's our chance.

The Devils can do it but they are not going to do it in a walk. Every team from now on is going to be out to beat Rankin any way they can. Several have the stuff to pull off an upset.

In the years we've played the Wink Wildcats, I can recall —as can many of you—times when it was in the bag. And the bag ripped, big. The Red Devils should win Friday night easily. That doesn't mean they will— not unless they go all out which is the only way for a championship team to play.
