Farm to Market and Lateral Roads Tax --

Court Calls November 7 Election

Meeting in their regular session last Monday, the members of the Upton County Commissioners Court voted to put a Farm to Market and Lateral Roads Tax

proposition before the voters. The election is to be held in connection with the November General Election. The same set of election judges will be used in both

instances. The proposal, which would authorize the Court to levy an ad valorem tax up to 30c on the \$100 valuation, will on a separate ballot from the General Election, Absentee balloting in both the Tax Election and the General Election is to open at the County Clerk's office Wednesday, October 18.

With a simple majority necessary for passage of the tax proposition, voting will be open to all registered, qualified voters residing in Upton County, regardless of whether or not they are property owners. The requirement in effect for many years that only property owners could vote on bond and tax questions was recently clouded by a Supreme Court decision that would seem to indicate that non property owners are entitled to vote in these elections. However, the vote count will be kept in two separate categories, property owners and non-property owners, and the two will be combined for total results.

Should the tax proposition be passed at the polls, the first \$3,000 valuation on homesteads would be exempt from the tax.

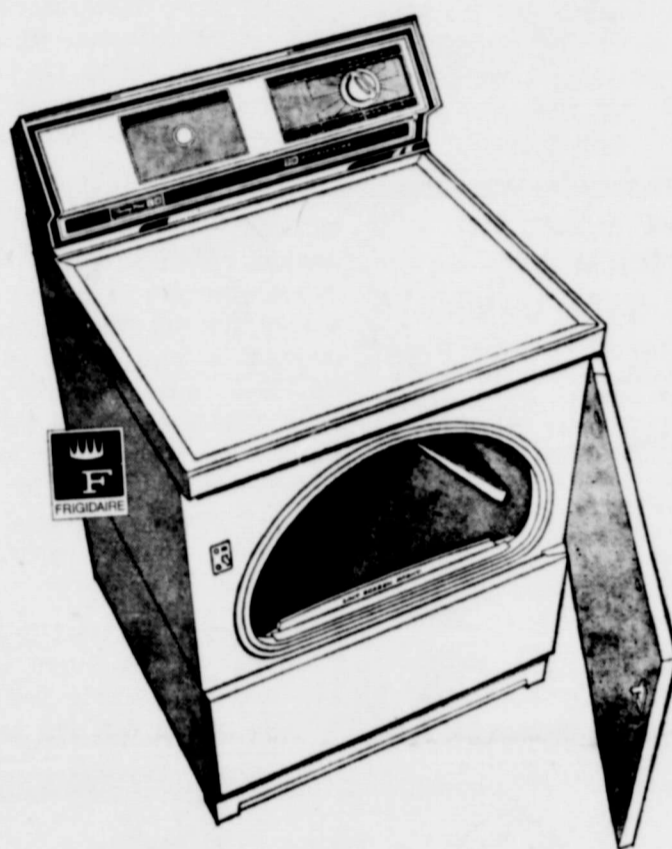
