Ante Voting Opens General, Tax Election

Ante voting in both the general election and the farm-to-market and tax election opens at 8 a.m. on Friday, November 3, at the Rankin County Clerk's office in Rankin during regular hours, 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. through Friday. Voting will be closed from noon on Friday.

Ante Voters Meet Tonight

Ante voting of Rankin Cub Scouts is scheduled at the Rankin Building next Tuesday night. Time will be at 7:30 p.m. An organizational meeting is open to all boys 10 years of age, and their parents are to accompany them to this meeting.

Ante voting in the county but presently living outside the county, such as persons in the Armed Services college students, etc.

Voting will be open to all registered, qualified voters 18 years of age and older. In the case of the Road Tax election, both property owners and non-property owners, who are qualified voters, may cast ballots.

In the General Election, a total of four parties and a write-in column will be offered. These are the Democratic Party, the Republican Party, the Socialist Workers, and Raza Unida Party. Only the Democrats are offering a full slate of candidates. Republicans have candidates for President and Vice-President, U. S. Senator, U. S. Representative, Governor, State Treasurer and State Representative, 68th District.

For the Socialists, the candidates are for the top nine offices with the exception of U. S. Representative and State Treasurer. Raza Unida has candidates for U. S. Senator, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, State Treasurer and Railroad Commissioner.

Sanderson Eagles to be Opponent

Red Devils to try for Seven in a Row

None of the band, none of the pep squad, none of the twirlers and cheerleaders and none of the players who will be involved in Friday night's football game were born when Rankin and Sanderson teed up the ball for their first game of the current series back on Friday, October 3, 1952. That one was won by Sanderson, 7-6 and broke a 23-game winning streak for the Red Devils. The previous week, in 1952, Rankin had hammered Clint 50-7.

Another sidelight of the upcoming Friday night game, which will mark the 19th meeting of the two teams—they did not play in 1954-1955 — is that several of the students involved — probably on both teams—will have parents

who have participated in the series.

When the series was started, both teams were in Class B, the Red Devils playing their first year of eleven-man ball after having dominated area six-man for several seasons. Of the eighteen previous meetings, Rankin has won 16 and the Eagles, 2; however, the last three encounters have all been thrillers with Rankin having won two and the Eagles, one. Pointwise, it has been very close, the Devils having put 58 points on the board in the last three games to 50 for Sanderson.

Friday's game is expected to be something of a repeater of the last three. Rankin will be in the favorites role but the Eagles are thoroughly capable of pulling off the upset.

For the season, Rankin stands at 6-0, has scored 205 points and given up only 40. For district action, the Devils are 2-0, with 99 points scored to 13 for the opposition.

Seasonwise, Sanderson stands at 3 wins and two losses. They have marked up 97 points to their opponents 75. In district, they are 1-0 with a 28-0 win over Clint two weeks ago. They have had an off week in which to get ready for their match with Rankin—a game in which they always seem to do well.

School Board holds October Meeting

Rankin School Board met in a regular session October 10 and attended mostly to routine matters. A report was given by Ray Barrett, board member, who had attended the Texas Association of School Boards Convention in San Antonio. Also, a report was made by Board members who had visited the Forsan School to inspect their new gym.

In connection with the new gym presently under consideration by the Board, they heard a Stran-Steel representative present gym plans and discuss costs.

In other matters, the Board approved a wage increase for cafeteria workers from \$1.84 to \$2 an hour. They also accepted a settlement in the amount of \$1,245 for insurance covering damage to a carpet in the school library in the elementary building.

\$8,400. There are all kinds of
pros and cons on this but it would
seem that \$4,800 isn't much pay
anymore and a raise is in order.

No. 2 gets an O. K. It is a
local matter in Lamar County
where a hospital district wishes
to be dissolved.

No. 3 would require all J. P's
to be paid a salary and not have
to make a living off fines—mostly
speeding tickets. This should get
a "For" vote.

No. 4 would establish a consti-
tional commission which would
make recommendations to the 63rd
Legislature no later than Nov 1,
1973. This all depends on whet-
her or not you favor rewriting
the Texas Constitution. I don't.
If we can live with the U. S.

Constitution as it was written, we
should be able to do the same
with the Texas constitution.

No. 5 would exempt certain
property owned by disabled veter-
ans from taxation. Since all veter-
ans would be treated alike, I
don't care for it. Some disabled
veterans are perfectly able to pay
their share of taxes. Exemption
below a certain income would
make sense.

No. 6 is another tax exemption
thing—for elderly this time and
again "Against" seems proper for
again, some elderly could buy
half of Texas and should be able
to pay. An income limit is need-
ed.

No. 7 is a women's lib propos-
al. Men may vote "Against" but
I'd advise you not to let your wife
find it out. No further comment.

No. 8 would provide for four-
year terms for most high state
office holders including the Gov-
ernor. I vote "Against". We ought
to have six months terms instead
of making them four years. That
is about how long it's going to
take everyone to get good and
sick of Dolph Briscoe.

No. 9 would permit directors of
soil and water conservation dis-
tricts to hold dual offices and re-
ceive dual compensation. I may
be wrong but I think we already
have some holding dual offices.
But it's no big thing—why not?

No. 10 has to do with publica-
tion of the amendments and be-
ing a party to this action, I make
no comment.

No. 11 would raise the salary of
the Lieutenant Governor and the
speaker of the House to \$22,500 a
year. These are reasonably im-
portant—almost full-time — offices
and it would seem reasonable to
pay their holders as much— at
least—as the average high school
football coach gets. (Right, there,
Coach?)

No. 12 would allow state em-
ployees to serve on more than
one governing body such as the

school board, city council, etc. I
see no harm in this for some of
the people who work for the state
can do a good job.

No. 13 would increase the in-
terest rate for certain bonds is-
sued by the state. It will get an
"Against" since the state already
sells more than they can pay for
and only those with big money to

invest would gain from increased
interest rates.

No. 14 has to do with certain
counties and permanent school
funds. We're not involved and in
any case, all school funding is
up in the air right now and more
than likely will be greatly chang-
ed soon. It doesn't matter much
on this one.

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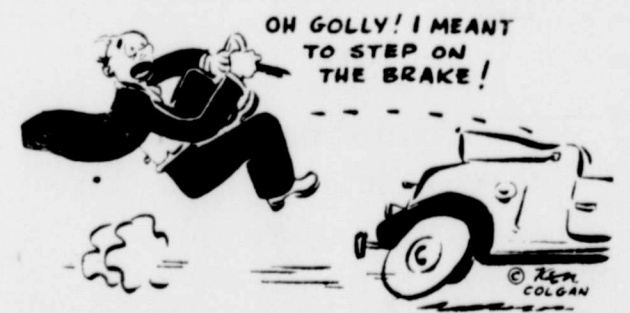

THE RATINGS—

We've even been receiving one or two 1st place votes if you can imagine that.

All this rating business is a bit weird anyway. The only true indicator of who is Number 1 will come later on down the line when one team will stand alone as the Class A State Champion of Texas. With that title in hand, there can be no further arguments, no more missed scores, no questions as to who is the best.

The Red Devils are thoroughly capable of standing in that spot when this season is over. They just may well pull it off.

Now if somebody will just get in touch with the Standard-Times and tell them the Red Devils are 6-0 for the season — I'm not on speaking terms with them or I'd do it.

THIS WEEK—

This week will be a big one in West Texas football. One of the grandest encounters will be the Big Lake-Ozona affair. One of the most important for Rankin will be the visit by the Sanderson Eagles and it won't be another Wink or Clint affair.
