## Upton Voters Strong on Republicans in Tuesday Vote

Total vote of 1538, Upton voters showed considerably more to split the ticket than in previous years. Strong support for Republicans in several races, and just as strong for Democrats in others.

In Precinct 2, McGovern polled 20 to 118 for Nixon, Sanders had 40 and Tower 97, Fisher won over Harlan 96-40, Briscoe lost again to Grover 53-84 and it was Du-

### Road Tax Axed

by Upton Voters

Upton County voters apparently did not agree with their Commissioners Court, the one who had called a Farm to Market and Lateral Roads Tax election, and, as a result, defeated the proposition by an overall vote of 285 for and 911 against. A simple majority was necessary for passage.

Actually, votes were cast in the election in two different categories, property owners and non property owners. In both cases, it suffered the same fate, going down 257 to 750 for the property owner vote, and 128-161 for non-property owners.

Precinct 1 property owners voted 94 for and 125 against; non-property owners, 40 for and 24 against.

In Precinct 2, it was 37 for and 47 against for property owners; and 22 for and 16 against in the non-property owner bracket.

# Red Devils Gun for District Crown

It's Super Bowl 1 for the Rankin Red Devils as they prepare to host the Iraan Braves with a 7:30 p.m. kickoff Friday night.

With a season record of 8-0 and a clean slate in district play, the hometowners can wrap up the 6-A title with a win.

Rankin and Iraan have done battle without interruption for the past 19 years, the Red Devils having won twelve and the Braves seven, two of these coming in the last 2 outings. Rankin will be a heavy favorite in most quarters to get back into the win column with Friday's encounter.

Despite this, the Braves and the Devils usually put on quite an exhibition with several of the matches being decided in the final minutes. Twice the Braves have been shut out by Rankin and one time the Braves put the goose egg on Rankin.

Another sidelight of the game is its similarity to last year's in that, then, too, the winner emerged at the top of the district race. An outmanned Red Devil team gave it a good go but fell by a 6-17 mark. Iraan reached Regional before being dropped last year.

Listed as playing for Rankin was Sartin and (Micky) McDon-

ald, ends; (M. O.) Price and (W. F.) Hale, tackles; (Pat) Henley and Cannada, guards; Hemphill, center; Elliott, quarterback; Waddell and Boyd, halfbacks; and (Gene) Holmes, fullback. Rankin had two substitutes, Gilbert, a tackle, and Frazier, an end.

In the news item, it says that Rankin Red Devil back Waddell was tackled for a safety and 2 points and that Butch Smith, a McCamey halfback, picked off a Rankin pass that set up the Badgers on the one yard line from where Dave Jones went in for the 6 points.

Gosh, I didn't know it had been that long since McCamey beat Rankin.

In the same sports section was a headliner that Midland beat the Wink Wildcats 27-12 to snap a 27-game winning streak for Wink. It was their first defeat since 1936—which also came at the hand of Midland.

Also, it says that Conroe beat Mexico City 13-0. Now you don't suppose there was once a place in Texas named Mexico City or was it really Mexico City, Mexico? Danged if I know.

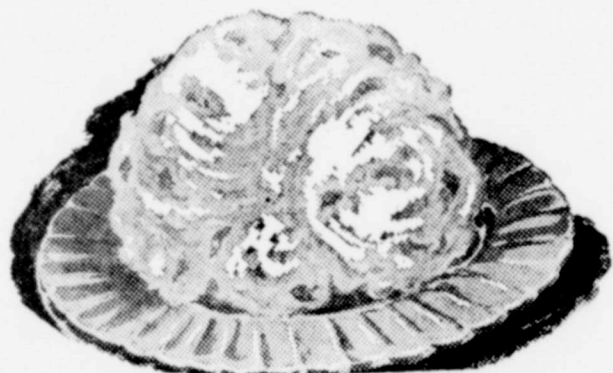

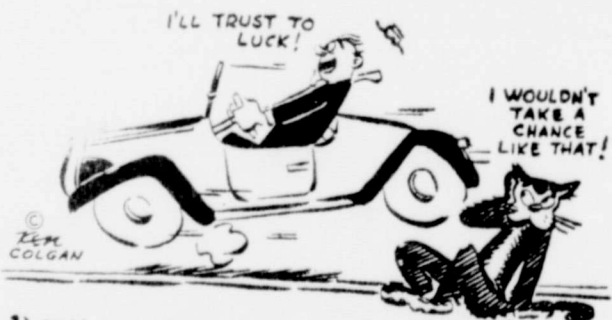

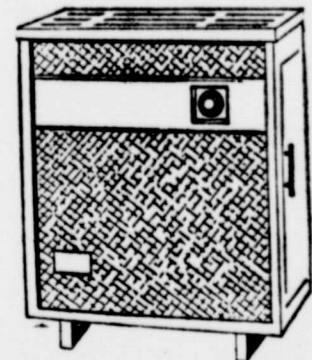
