Devil Band Its Thing

7:30 P. M. Kickoff at Walton Field, Kermit-

Rankin-Plains Bi-District Shoot-Out is Friday

Already holding the record of being the first RHS eleven - man ball team to win 10 in a row, the Rankin Red Devils will be out to take their first step in the State playoffs when they go against the Plains Cowboys in Kermit Friday night. Kermit was picked as a neutral site and is approxima-

tely half way between Rankin and Plains. The Cowboys will be the host team.

Along with their undefeated record, the Red Devils closed their regular play by outscoring the opposition 357-46. For the Cowboys with an 8-1-1 record, the scoring is very similar as they bested

the opposition 299-57 and have lost only to strong Class AA Lubbock Cooper. They were tied by district foe Anton.

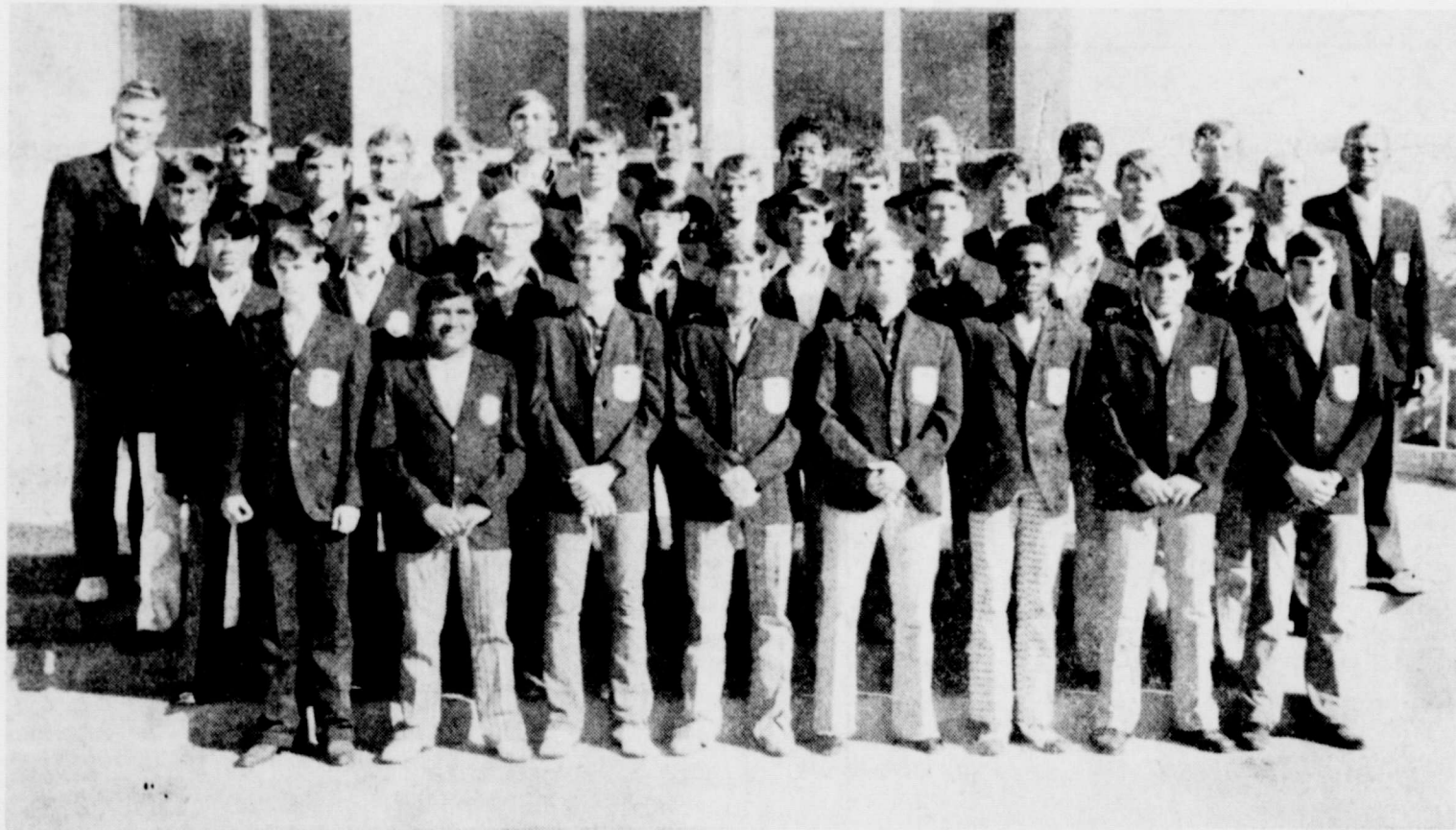
The Cowboys, rated 111 in the Harris Power Poll, are said to be a big, hard hitting team with a very talented quarterback. They like to run the ball and, as the

above scores indicate, have a very good offense to go with a stout defense. Plains also won their district last year and fell to Iraan in the first round playoff.

For Rankin, playing as a slight favorite, it will be their first outing into state playoffs since 1968

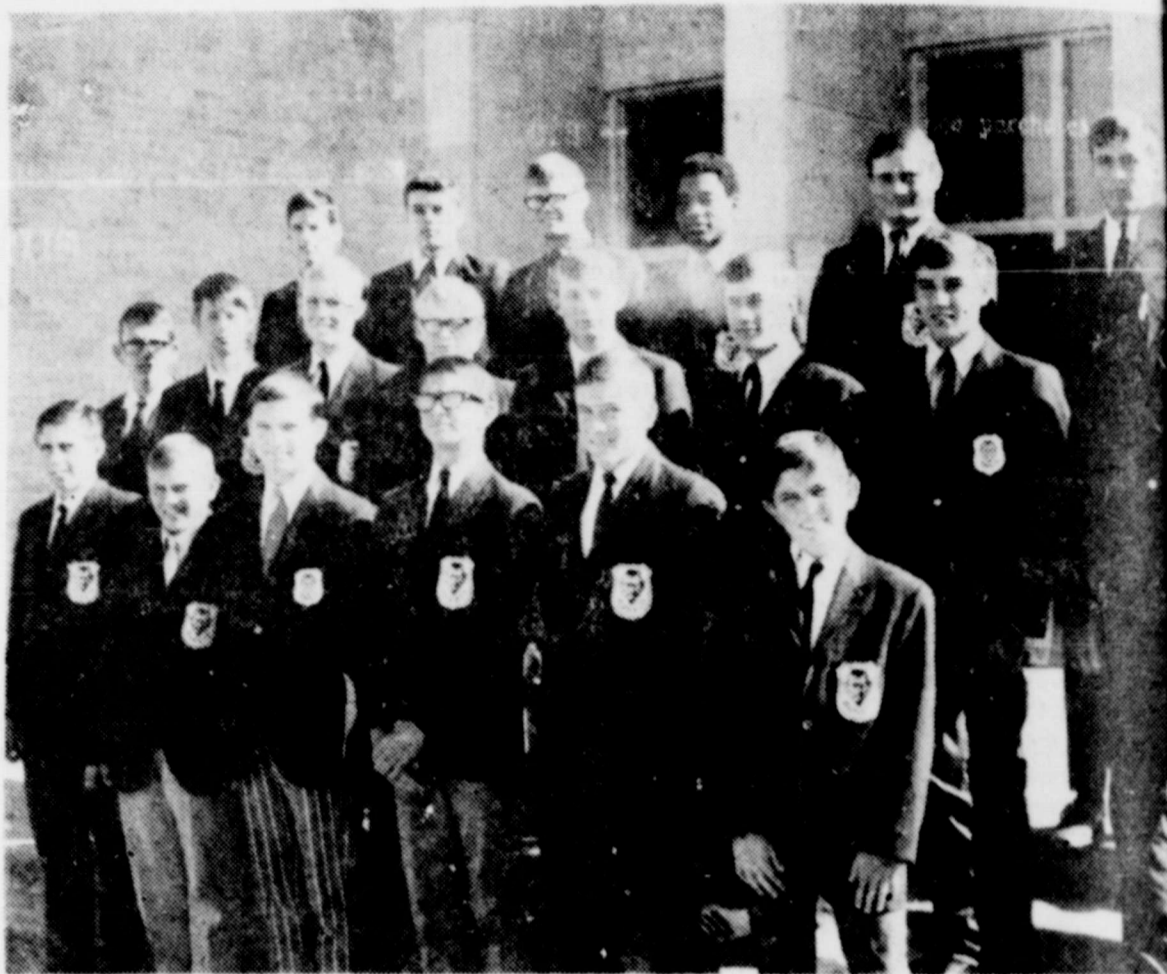

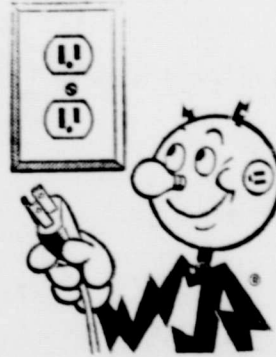

Rankin School Board met in a regular session Tuesday, November 14. Items on the agenda were mostly of a routine nature. They did, however, instruct Superintendent H. G. Adams to contact several architectural firms and at their next meeting they propose to employ one to draw the plans for the new gym.

- Adopted, as required by law, the new Quarter System for the 1973-74 school year;

Explanation Given on Quarter System for School District

Beginning with the 1973-74 term all schools in Texas will be required to adopt the Quarter System as opposed to the present semester system in use by many districts, including Rankin.

Implementation of the quarter

system will require some changes in school procedure for Rankin. However, many aspects of the school's operations will remain the same. Following are some policies that will not be effected:

The eligible age at which the child may enter school for the first time remains the same.

The number of days a student may be counted as eligible for state aid is 180 days.

The requirements for teacher certification will not be changed.

The length of service required of teachers will not be changed. A teacher may not be required to teach more than 180 days plus 10 days for inservice education.

Local districts will make all contract agreements as to length of service for employment of all school personnel.

Summer school will be operated by the same procedures as before.

Local districts will decide options of the quarter system will be implemented in their schools.

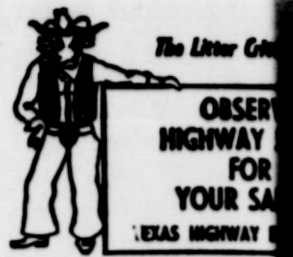
