Contract Let For New Heating Units in Upton County Jail

In the last meeting of the Upton County Commissioners Court, held January 22, among matters attended to was a motion by Commissioner Adams, seconded by Commissioner Workman and approved by unanimous vote of the court, that a contract be approved with Darville Company of Odessa, for heating improvements to the count jail. Total amount of the contract is \$1,720.

Included in the work is to be the installation of controls, vents and gas piping and two 50 thousand BTU/HR Unit Heaters and one 75 thousand BTU/HR Unit Heater. Also to be furnished in the contract are all hangers for the heating units.

Other matters reflected in the court minutes of the January 22 session were of a routine nature. Their next regular meeting has been set for Monday, February 12 at 10 a.m.

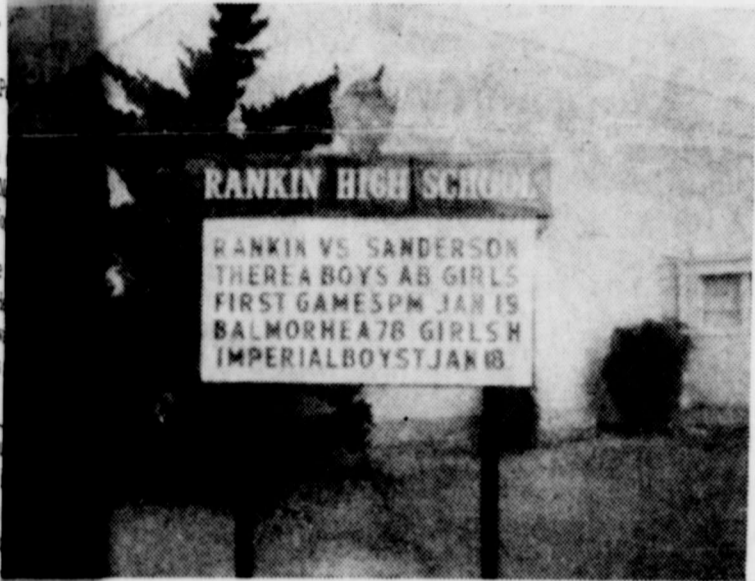

THE SCOOP by Scoop

IS IT OVER—

A good bit of comment has appeared in the press and on television concerning the more or less mild manner in which Americans have greeted the Vietnam cease-fire. Generally, there has been little in the way of celebration and more than a little lack of interest in the entire proceedings.

Some of the big press and the TV commentators profess to be somewhat surprised by this attitude. Well, I'm certainly no authority but it would seem to me that a good deal of the lack of enthusiasm stems from the way the big press and the TV people have handled the entire war.

People just don't have a whole lot of faith in what they read and hear anymore and a good bit of the credit for that goes right to the doorstep of the "biggies" in the news business. They have fed the public a line so long that a good many folk don't have confidence in their "telling it like it is." On the contrary, the sensationalism angle has been put on for so long that it's hard to take seriously any report — even as to the weather.

Add to that the feeling among many that our own government sometimes speaks with forked tongue and it's no big thing that a lot of us have come to the point of not believing there will

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be any peace in Vietnam — nor that we won't be involved in some way until enough time has passed to prove the point.

One interesting little note does come to mind: where are all the protestors? They always seemed to be on hand, demanding that we get out of Vietnam any way

Have you checked your mail
 lately to see how it's moving —
 or rather, not moving? I have.

Last Sunday's mail, for instan-
 ce, and Sunday mail isn't much.
 The News received 13 letters and
 a newspaper. Of the 13 letters,
 3 were important to me and had
 been more or less requested—a
 bill, a check and an invoice. Five
 were press releases from state
 and federal offices—two from one
 department— and most certainly
 not requested. The others were
 also "news" from assorted organi-
 zations. All but the three for the
 office went into the trash.

And how long did it take? Odd
 you should ask. Two from the
 "Feds" had no postmarks. All
 that came from Austin made it
 here in two days. —as did the
 junkers—except one from Abilene
 and the stamp on it wasn't even
 cancelled.

Now as for the "goodies", one
 was mailed Monday evening in
 Gulfport, Miss., and only took 7
 days to get here. One from Fort
 Worth made it in 3 days and we
 had one "whizzer" that came all
 the way from Midland in only 2
 days—that's something like 27
 miles a day, give or take a few
 blocks to and from the post of-
 fice.

Pictures taken and mailed on
 the 18th, for use in promoting last
 Saturday's stock show which was
 on the 27, came in on the 26th —
 and the paper's printed on the

24th. Stuff like that's nice, but
 then this newspaper and others
 have editorialized against poor
 postal service for years, and it
 hasn't all been for naught.

It's got worse.

And may I add once again, I do
 not lay the blame on our local
 people. They just follow orders
 and they can't put it up if it's not
 here. As a whole, they do a good

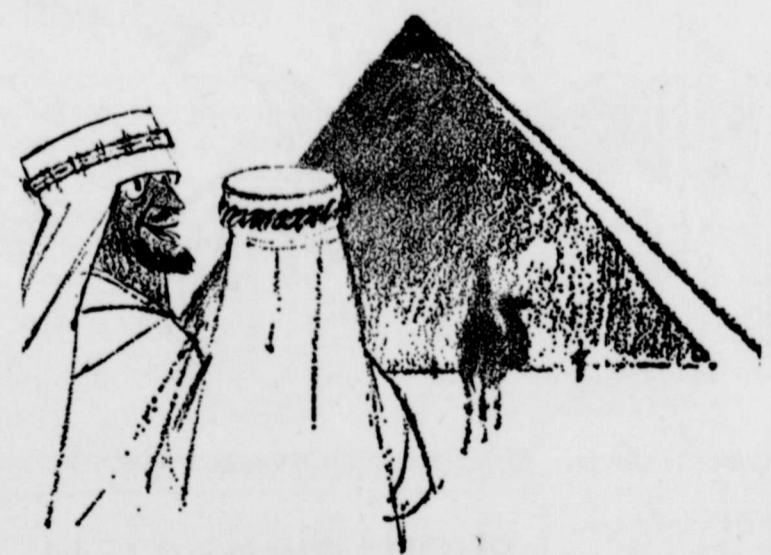
job and are accommodating to the

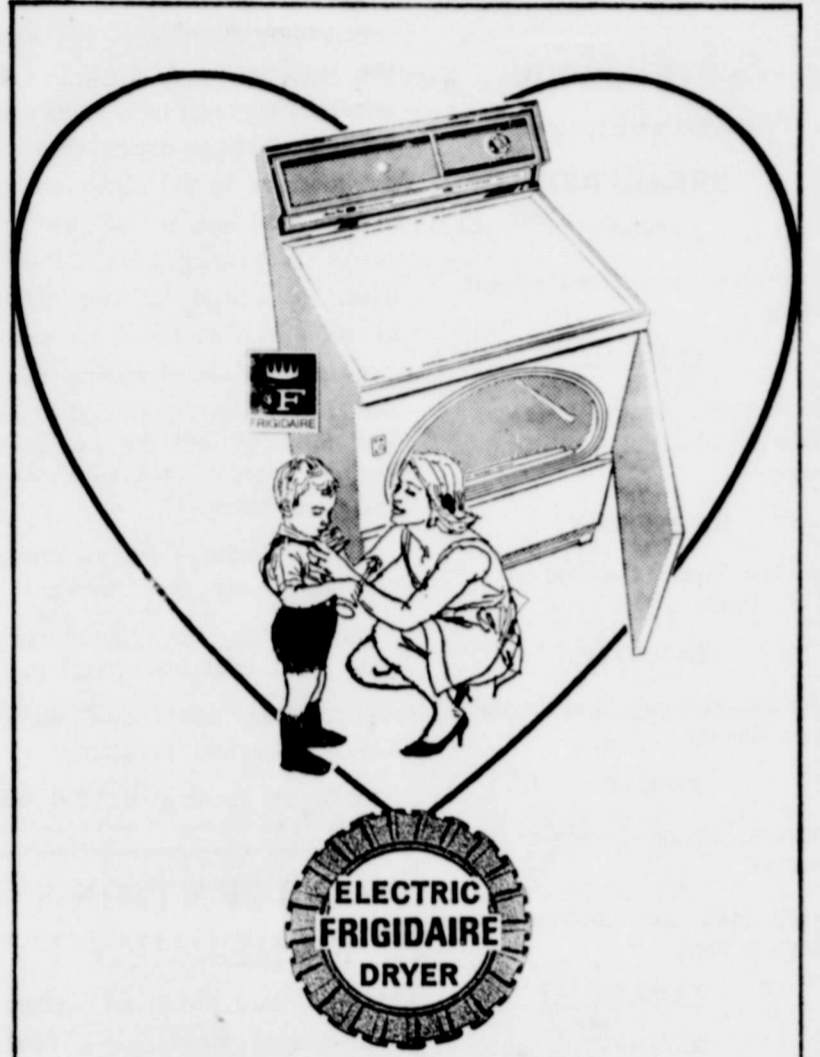

branches of Texas government also took Thursday, Jan. 25, as a day of mourning for Texas' first and only Presidential native son, Lyndon Baines Johnson.

Beginning Monday of this week, the legislature was back in full swing. The governor's office was hard at work preparing the budget message to the legislature expected sometime in the next few weeks. Outgoing Gov. Preston Smith performed his constitutional duty to recommend an executive budget before leaving office, and Gov. Briscoe promised to take both Smith's and the Legislative Budget Board's recommendations under advisement.

Among Smith's budget recommendations are the following:

\$10.2 million for initiating a state adult education program,

\$6.4 million for a new State bilingual education program,

Additional funding of \$15.9 mil-

lion for expanding and improved vocational - technical education

streamline the Penal Code, reducing it from 1600 sections to 250 sections.

In later newsletters, I will devote more time to the specific legislation as introduced in the House, particularly those dealing with the budget or which have special interest to our district.

\$61.5 million to continue developing six new senior colleges and universities.

\$28 million for local community mental health and mental retardation centers.

\$1.1 million increased funding for establishing three additional public health regions, and

\$2.7 million increased funds for air pollution control programs. Smith strongly urged consideration of the total budget which he said could be financed within anticipated revenues, leaving unobligated just over \$300 million.

In his first address to the legislature, Gov. Briscoe confirmed his earlier conviction that no new taxes would be necessary to finance the budget that he will soon recommend to the legislature. He called for strengthening the disclosure provisions of the Lobby Registration Act of 1957. A bill has already been introduced in the House to regulate the activities of lobbyists and create a State Ethics Commission. The governor also voiced his support of proposals for structuring the new Constitutional Revision Commission based on recommendations made by the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. The proposal mentioned is drawn to permit the members of the commission the greatest freedom in the structuring of a new constitution. With such structure, as Briscoe pointed out, the product of the studies and deliberations of the commission will bear the prestige of the persons appointed to the commission. Whatever the product of the commission, it must receive the approval of the legislature and the people of Texas before it becomes law.

In the area of law enforcement, Briscoe asked the legislature to
