Lowery Honored for 45 Years at First State Bank

Thursday, February 1, Dunnery, president of the First Bank of Rankin, marked his 45th anniversary with the firm. He began working on February 1, 1928 as a clerk when assets at the bank were less than a half million dollars. At the close of their last annual statement, Dec. 31, 1972, assets were over \$6 million. The occasion was marked with a "birthday" party with representatives from the First Bank of San Angelo. Mr. Ream and Richard Edwards, who were present when the bank opened at Rankin last Thursday. They are pictured above, properly decorated with dates marking the anniversary of Lowery's connection with the local bank. Lowery first began his banking career at the Alamo National in Antonio on January 1, 1924. He moved to Fort Stockton and worked with the old First State Bank there. He was in Rankin when the first oil boom started in the Yates Field. He came to Rankin — he got to Rankin by open-

ing time—there were six employees working. There are now ten, despite many modern banking machines that "speed up" work. In addition to banking, Lowery owns two insurance agencies in Rankin. He is a coin collector of some note, and is an avid golfer, time permitting. Local bank employees joined in extending their congratulations and a number of friends and customers dropped in throughout the day to sample the cake. Mrs. Lowery and Edith James served.

Evaluation Team to Scan Rankin School System

Rankin Public Schools will be hosting a visiting committee of area educators who will make an evaluation of the total program of grades kindergarten through twelve. This committee is representing the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Each school accredited by this association is required to have a broad based local evaluation followed by a visiting committee evaluation at least every ten years in order to maintain accreditation status in the association.

During the past school year, members of the faculty and the administration of Rankin Public Schools have accomplished the local evaluation. Copies of this self evaluation have been compiled, bound and will be presented to the visiting committee.

The evaluation team of fifteen members will be headed by and

coordinated by Dr. C. W. Tarter, a former Superintendent of Lamesa Public Schools, presently serving as Professor of Education at McMurry College at Abilene and Dr. Vally Johnson, Professor of Education at Sul Ross State University at Alpine.

Other team members are George Beene and Iva Lou Ashley, both of Big Spring, who serves the Texas Education Agency as area supervisors. Dr. Vernon Stokes and Bill Whitfield, consultant specialists with the West Texas Education Center located at Midland - Odessa Air Terminal;

All three elections, as required by law, will be held on the first Saturday in April, being April 7. Filing deadline is March 7.

Seats to be filled on the City Council are those presently held by Aldermen David Binkley, Bo Rose and Tommy Latham. All are

Must Beat Balmorhea Friday Night—

Red Devils in Reach of Another 6-A Championship

Taking the old saw literally that says, "if you want a thing done right, do it yourself," the Rankin Red Devils have had to go down to the wire in their quest for the District 6-A basketball crown by defeating all the opposition themselves in the second half of play. Yet to be settled is the question that will arise here Friday night when the RHS squad hosts the Balmorhea Bears in an A and B encounter starting at 6 p.m.

In their last two outings the Red Devils have won big, hammering Imperial in a non-district affair by a 73-52 mark and putting the Marfa Shorthorns down to the tune of 71-48 last Tuesday.

It is the last regularly scheduled game, and if Rankin wins, the title will be theirs. Having already won the football championship, this would give them a sweep of the two major sports, something that has not been pulled off by Rankin teams within the past twenty years.

If they lose, and the Bears are given a chance for an upset, it will mean an almost certain tie with Clint and a playoff to determine the district winner. The Clint Lions, the only team to defeat Rankin in district action, has only Wink remaining on their schedule and Wink has not, as yet, won a district game.

the San Antonio Stock Show, things.

A particular release said one of the attractions at the show would be a Mike Walker, weighing nearly as much as any of the prize winning steers—1,180 pounds.

Mike, who once weighed in at a mere 190 when he was in the Air Force, has been the way up to 1,180 pounds. Now he's on a diet, losing an average of 25 lbs. per week.

"Mike blames his enormous weight to the illegal use of drugs. While stationed in Korea . . . he started experimenting with drugs. Not only did the drugs—he was on opium—have a tremendous psychological effect on him, they also stimulated his appetite.

"Four years ago he was up to 700 lbs. and lost the ability to walk. By May, 1972 weighing in at 1,180 lbs, he was put on a 1,500 calorie per day diet.

"Mike now lives in a 15 x 45 trailer home, almost motionless on a special bed. The trailer has a window through which, for a fee, spectators can view him. He will be one of the attractions at the Alamo Exposition Show's carnival midway during the show."

Now that, friends, is a sad

situation, but then when it comes to drug use, what isn't?

IT IS IMPORTANT--

A news item in this issue of the News tells of an upcoming visit to Rankin Schools by an evaluation team of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary schools. Those of you who have been residents of the district for the past ten years or so will recall that Rankin Schools went to considerable expense and time to win full accreditation in the Association. At the time the local elementary system was approved, it was our last unit to be so designated, Rankin was one of only a handful—less than half a dozen, if my memory is correct, of all the schools in Texas to be approved "from top to bottom."

This high standard has been maintained since it was granted back in the 60's, and there's no reason to believe it will be taken away when the current inspection is completed. Now it may well be that we have some folk who don't give a hoot one way or another about Rankin being fully accredited with the Southern Association; but it is important that we are and that we keep that accreditation, for several reasons.

For one thing, despite the big kick that all of us get out of supporting our athletic program—in its principal purpose the RISD is not an athletic proving ground for students. It is supposed to at least start their education, and, if the standards set by the Southern Association are met and maintained, we know that we're reasonably keeping within the general area of the purpose of public schooling.

Perhaps equally, if not more important, is the fact that by maintaining accreditation, Rankin is one of the shining examples that you don't have to be a big school to be a good one. And, friends, if you think the people who are constantly pulling for more and more consolidation, for doing away with the small school

such as ours, are letting up even a little—then you're very misinformed. I doubt that the "centralizers" will ever be satisfied—until not only all schools, but all governing bodies are lumped into one big glob.

Right at the moment, centralization is not very popular at any level and the last big push toward school consolidation was put down—as you will recall—about

three or four years ago. But, in that instance, only a battle was won, not the war. You can bet that somewhere there are plotters who are mapping their next move to expand centralization. We will hear from them again and it could be at any time.

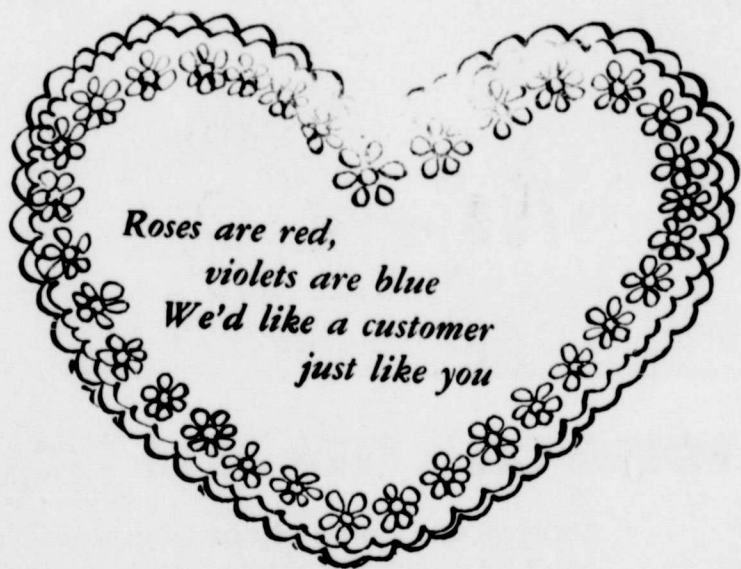

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AUSTIN REPORT

Two of the reform measures that have been introduced in the Texas House since the session opened a few weeks ago passed almost unanimously last week. H. B. 5 would restrict the authority of conference committees and tax bills. The proposals establish specific guidelines for the limitation of the committee composed of members of the House . . . The conference committee . . . has been criticized in the past for abusing their responsibility.

The bill which has been sent to the Senate for their consideration

places the following restrictions on future conference committees for appropriations and tax bills:

Conference Committee is limited in the changes it can make in the amounts of appropriations and can make changes only if there is disagreement between the two Houses.

Conference committees for tax bills are strictly limited in making changes regarding tax items in that they can only act on matters which have not been agreed upon by the Houses.

Any Conference committees that violate these rules shall have their report ruled out of order by the presiding officer of each of the two houses.

The second reform measure passed by the House and referred to the Senate is the bill dubbed the "open meetings" bill.

The present law requires that meetings of governmental bodies be open to the public, but does not specifically include all meetings of legislative bodies. The purpose of this bill is to prohibit secret meetings of the Legislature its committees and any other bodies associated with the Legislature.

In general the bill provides that every regular, special, or called meeting or session of governmental bodies shall be open to the public, and that no closed meetings shall be authorized unless the

governmental body has first been convened in open meeting for which notice has been given. The bill has strengthened regulations on what kind of notice must be given, and specifies particular subjects that can be considered in a closed or executive session.

There are certain types of meetings which are better held in closed sessions, and, as a re-

two-year terms. Latham has filed for re-election while Binkley and Rose have indicated that they will not seek another term.

Anyone wishing to have their name on the ballot may file in writing with City Secretary Vacie Workman at the City Hall, any time prior to the March 7 deadline.

In other matters, the Council heard a report by J. B. Hutchens, representing the Housing Authority of the City of Rankin, in which it was revealed that the Local Authority lost \$186.24 in their operations of the low rent project for the fiscal year closing Dec. 31, 1972. Principal cause of the loss—the first since the project began operations, was due to a large increase in insurance costs which rose from \$323 to \$995.99.

Insurance on the low rent units is placed each three years by bid and a Fort Worth firm is current-

ly insuring the project.

In an effort to keep the project from going into the red again in '73, the council voted to waive all sewer and trash hauling fees for the units. Although all construction cost bond payments are made by the Federal government through HUD, the City of Rankin is considered to be the owners of the project which is supposed to pay its own operation costs.

Scheduled to be paid out in 40 years, full title to the units—plus any accumulated operating reserves—is to be turned over to the City. Currently the Authority has \$1,200 in operating reserves in an interest account. The Authority is also in a position to pay \$269.71 to the City in lieu of taxes for the 1972 operations.
