That first one seems always to be the hardest. Rankin High has fielded a golf team for more than ten years now and up until the McCamey event two weeks ago, had never won a 1st. But I guess that if the "media" can keep the fire stoked long enough, they may get something really big going there yet — and, as a rule something big means a good riot, lots of shooting and people getting beat up or killed.

One sidelight on the big time news coverage: a number of the returning POW's say that they feel the war protestors kept them in prison for an extra year or so by giving false hope to the Communists that the American public was on the side of Hanoi It's a sad thing to contemplate, but if the POW's are correct, and I. for one think they are-a good bit of the blame must also be laid at the feet of our news gatherers. They made little or no effort to show the war protestors to be what they really were namely, a very small minority composed of Communists and their sympathizers, and a few people who sincerely thought they were doing the right thing. The POW's paid a whale of a price in order that the newscasters might have something "big" to write and talk about.

ONCE MORE-

We're all familiar with the old G. I. expression. "if it moves, salute it; if it doesn't, paint it." Down in Austin, we have a group apparently dedicated to the proposition, "if it's there, regulate it."

I think it was during their last regular session some two years ago that a big push was made in Austin to set up a commission to regulate the telephone business in Texas. At that time it was defeated; but the regulators are not ones to give up all that easy.

They're back again this year—again with the wish to regulate the telephone company, and as is always their excuse, "Texas is one of the few states without a commission, and small towns are

not equipped to deal with biggies such as telephone companies."

So Texas doesn't have a commission to regulate the telephone business. Good for Texas. That makes us a little unique and it's pretty well established historically that Texans don't care too much for regulations or regulators in the first place. As for the small places not being able to deal with big companies, we here in Rankin have just completed a "deal" with Southwestern Bell in which everything was handled pretty much to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Southwestern Bell was not out to apply pressure to anyone—they made a request for a rate increase which, considering the length of time since their last one and our current inflaton, was not out of line. They applied no pressure and we (Rankin) got something we wanted out of the deal, a firm, written agreement for installation of Direct Dialing. I have seen this agreement and it says "no later than the end of 1974."

Assuming that there had been a commission in Austin. "looking after our interests", I wonder if they would have bothered to see that the DD commitment would have been included or if even the mention of Rankin 'would have been made.

The thing that really scares me about a state commission results from the nightmare we've had in the insurance business — which is state regulated. Phone rates in Rankin have gone up, maybe three times in the 20 years I have been in Rankin. Each time it has been with the City Council and the telephone peole — and all of them I know are just folk— like you and me—sitting down and working it out.

Contrast that with the insurance rates in Rankin that are "adjusted" every time you turn around and we in Rankin are never asked to sit in—just told to pay up. We are lumped in with large areas and — for example — on ex-

tended coverage, Rankin is included in an area all the way to Amarillo—the big hail and wind art of the state; while Iraan, 30 miles south of us, is in what is known as the Central Area and their costs are said to be about half of ours.

That's state regulation for you and I say we can do nicely without any more of same. Hopefully,

our State Senator and Representative feel the same and will be among those who, one more time, will stand up against those who want to regulate—either because it's there or they want another political plum to hand out as in the case of appointments to the Insurance Commission.

We don't have time nor space to go into that.

AUSTIN REPORT

The Texas Legislature has two kinds of bills on which to deliberate — local and general, Local bills pertain to particular communities only. General bills have statewide application.

Last week in Austin I introduced in the Texas House two general legislation bills. On Monday I entered a bill that would allow single homeowners the same \$3000 tax exemption given to married persons. It is my feeling that an unmarried persons pays just as much to maintain his homestead as a married person. For this reason, it is only fair that he be allowed the same ad valorem tax exemption.

Later in the week, I introduced a bill to require all state owned aircraft to be pooled under the supervision of the Department of Public Safety. In 1964 the State of Texas owned ten aircraft. These aircraft were operated by five state departments and one univer-

sity. At that time a bill was introduced in the legislature to pool the state's aircraft. The bill failed.

In less than ten years, the number of aircraft has increased to 33 operated by twelve state departments and one each for the University of Texas System and the Texas A & M System. The operating expenses for these aircraft are greater than three quarters of a million dollars yearly.

With the number of aircraft we now have and the operating costs involved. I feel it would be in the best interests of Texas to have all the aircraft under the control of one agency. Not only would this provide for a more efficient means of handling and maintaining the aircraft but it would allow more state branches to take advantage of air travel without using commercial airlines or requesting their own planes from the legislature.

The bill I have introduced would give access to state-owned aircraft to any institution, board, commission, department or agency of the State of Texas through the Department of Public Safety. I believe that this bill would help us get the greatest benefit from our tax dollars.
