## 83rd Grand Jury Returns 10 Indictments --

# Pipe Theft Ring "Busted" in Upton County

With the indictment last Monday of three Odessa men by the 83rd District Court Grand Jury, Aubrey Edwards, District Attorney in the 83rd, said that he felt that the law enforcement officials in Upton County, working in cooper- ation with Texas Rangers, had broken one of the largest pipe stealing rings in West Texas.

For some time now, quantities of oilfield pipe has been stolen in West Texas area, particularly in Upton County. It is believed that the pipe, and other oilfield equip- ment, has been sold in Oklahoma. Upton Sheriff S. O. "Sjd" Lang- ford said Tuesday that his de- partment would make a trip this week to Oklahoma to check fur- ther into the matter.

Indicted Monday by the Grand Jury were Elzie Joseph Rain- water, Johny Ben Koenig and Jimmy Greenway, all listed with Odessa addresses. They were spe- cifically charged with the theft of tubing and sucker rods from a Humble Oil Company lease in Upton County. Rainwater, the only one of the three presently in custody, was placed under a bond

of \$10,000 by District Judge Bill Earney of Marfa. On Tuesday, he was taken to Kermit where law officers there wanted to question him about pipe theft in that area.

In addition to the above, the 83rd Grand Jury returned seven other indictments including one for fondling of a female under the age of 14, two worthless check charges, two for breaking and entering and two for possession of marijuana.

There's still another side to it, as pointed out by a local rancher: "when beef was 25-cents a pound, wages were \$5 a day." That just about says it all for we Americans have never been too prone to haggle over prices if we had the money and wanted the product.

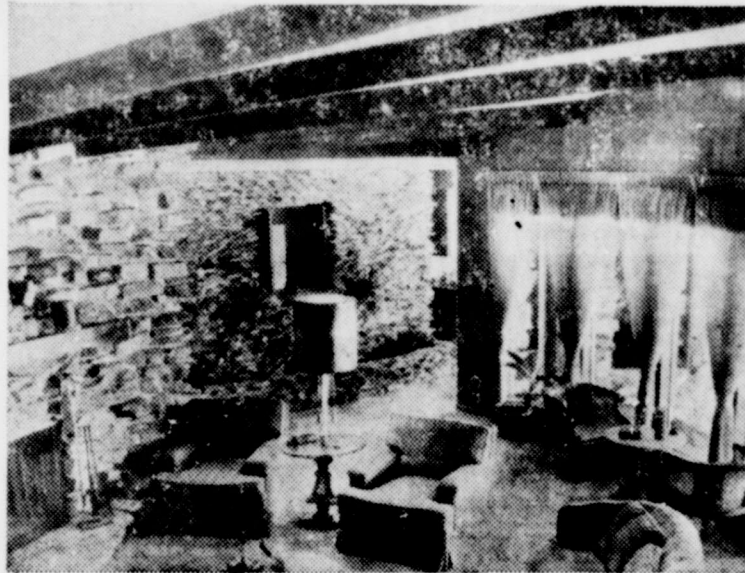
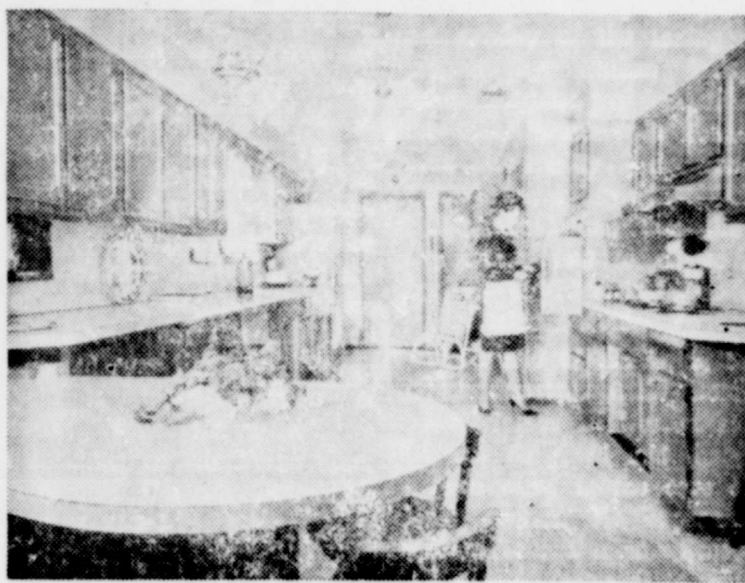
The bride-elect is a 1972 gradu-

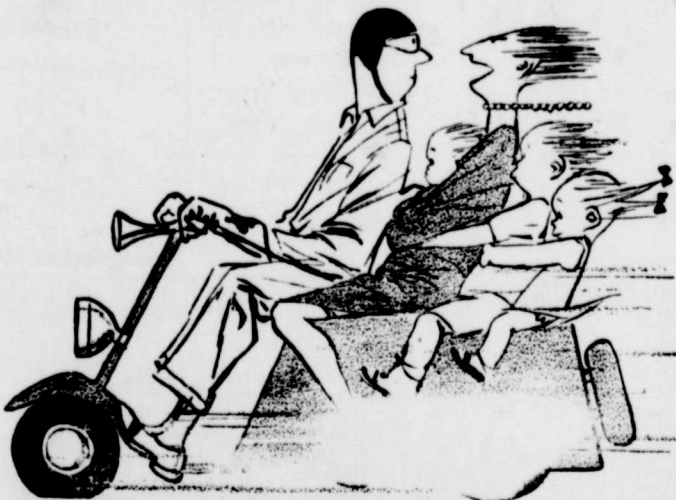

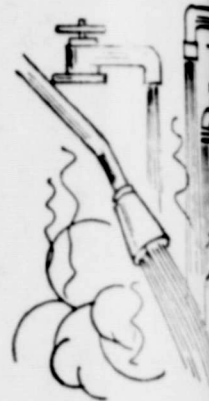

Again this week, the most significant legislation to be passed by the House of Representatives was one of the reform bills. This latest one which deals with the election of the Speaker of the House prevents a speaker from succeeding himself. The bill further stipulates that no speaker or member acting in his behalf shall solicit or accept promises or pledges for the speaker's reelection in the future.

Neither shall he solicit or accept promises or pledges for any other member as his successor. Persons who violate or attempt to violate the bill would be subject to discipline deemed appropriate by the House. This punishment could be forfeiture of office and removal by a majority of the House followed a hearing before the House meeting as a Committee of the whole.

Before the bill was passed, it was amended to allow persons to serve as speaker more than one

term, but not successively.

I supported this bill because I feel that it will help put an end to the stranglehold the House speaker has always had over the affairs of this chamber.

Another important decision to Texas came this week from the U. S. Supreme Court. Their decision that tax inequities in school finances do not constitute a violation of constitutional rights means that the Texas Legislature will not be charged with finding other means of financing the public schools.

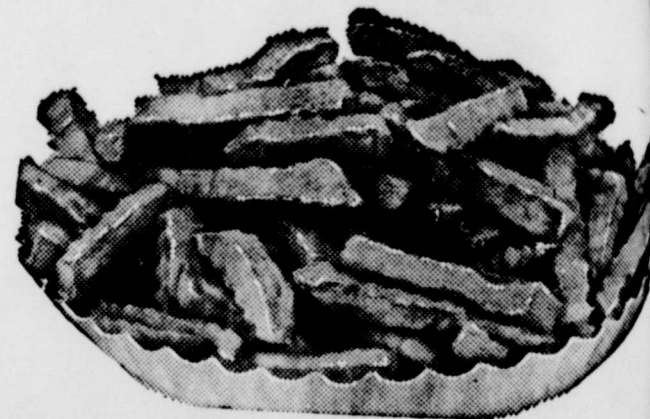

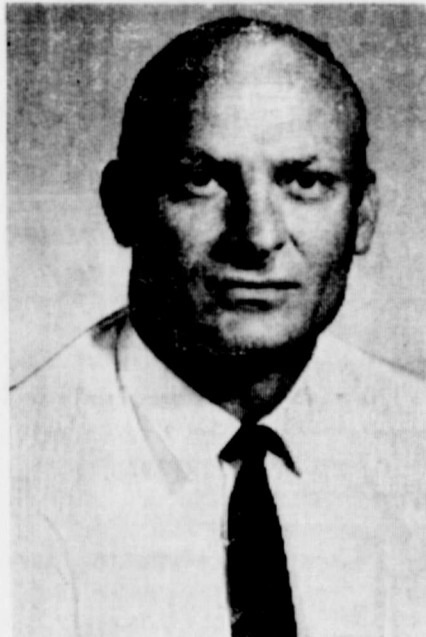
