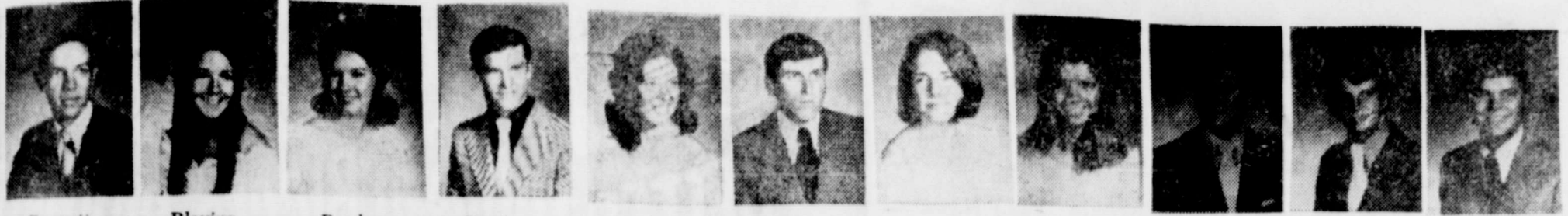

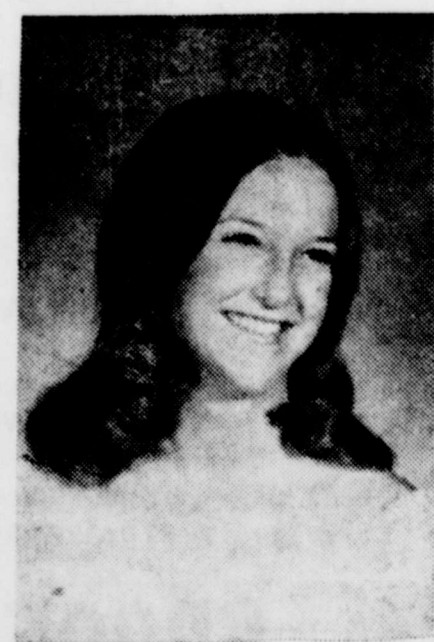

are scheduled for 8 p.m. at the High School Auditorium.

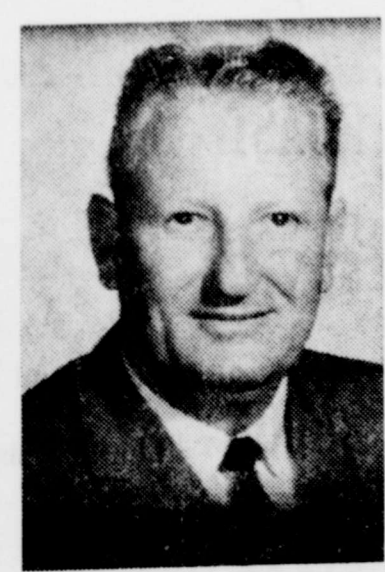
All friends of the graduates are cordially invited to attend. A program of the ceremony is printed elsewhere in this issue of the news.

H. G. Adams has accepted the Superintendency position of the Tatum (Tex.) Independent School District, near Longview, and will assume his duties there on July 1st.

Tatum Public Schools, Adams reports, is a Class A school with a 601 average daily attendance. The school district is growing both in population and wealth due to industrial development. Three Utility Companies are jointly building a power plant near Tatum on

a new lake development that should be an asset to the school district and town.

"We are looking forward to serving in the Public School System and feel there is a challenge in the job," Adams told the News.

Replacing Mr. Adams as Superintendent of Rankin Schools will be A. C. Copeland, for a number of years, Principal of RHS. Although Copeland will not officially become head of the Rankin System until July 1, he will begin a portion of the duties involved in the very near future.

13. A good neighbor to feed the dogs and cattle when you are a-

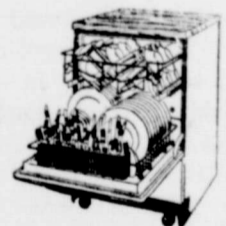

three of the four amendments was to crack down on the pusher. The first amendment increases the penalty for conviction of sale of marijuana from two to ten years to two to 99 years. The second amendment increases the penalty for the sale of LSD and speed from two to twenty years to five to 99 years.

Another amendment relating to sale of hard drugs such as heroin would require life imprisonment with a minimum parole eligibility of twenty years for a second conviction. In an effort to reduce the crime resulting from addiction to heroin, I offered an amendment to make second conviction of possession of heroin punishable by from two to 99 years rather than two to 20 years as the bill originally read. I'm very pleased that each of these amendments were accepted into the bill as it passed.

In other activity, my resolution authorizing a constitutional amendment to allow single adults the same homestead exemption as married adults was passed by the House. If the Senate concurs on the amendments in the House, the measure will appear on the ballot in November of this year. I am very happy that this bill passed. As I have reported to you earlier, I feel it is only just to offer the same exemption to single adults that is available to married persons.

The House also voted to rein-

state the death penalty in some circumstances. Among these are murder committed during burglary by assault, rape or escape from officials of the law. The death penalty would also apply to murder of policemen or firemen in the performance of their duties. I supported this bill.

As always, I welcome your questions and comments concerning legislation before the House.

KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER



Elm leaf beetles will soon be feeding actively on leaves of elm trees. This insect is a serious pest of elm trees in West Texas. Feeding from this insect skeltonizes the leaf surface of leaves and premature defoliation of the elm tree follows. This weakens the tree and makes them more susceptible to tree borers.

The female beetles are now laying eggs on the back side of leaves in clusters of 5 to 20. The eggs are bottle-shaped and yellowish orange in color. These eggs will hatch in a few days into small worms that are nearly black in coloration and are covered with short black hairs.

To protect the foliage of elm trees from feeding damage of the elm leaf beetle, trees may be sprayed with cararyl (Sevin) or malathion. Mix and apply the sprays according to manufacturer's directions on the LABEL of the chemical container.

Thorough coverage of the trees with the insecticide spray is necessary to obtain satisfactory control of this insect.

PECAN TREES—

Now is the time to spray pecan trees for zinc deficiency in Upton County. Zinc is an essential element required by plants for proper growth and fruit production. The pecan tree is a poor feeder of zinc under the best conditions and requires a well planned zinc fertilization program to insure proper growth and production of high quality nuts.

There are two ways of applying zinc to pecan trees: 1. soil, and 2. foliar sprays. Soil application of any form (zinc oxide, zinc sulfate or zinc chelates) should not be applied to pecans in the Trans-Pecos area.

If zinc is applied to soils in this area it will develop zinc deficiency symptoms. The reason for this is that soils in this area have a high pH which renders zinc unavailable to the trees. At soil pH values of 7.0 or above, zinc is

chemically tied up and renders it unavailable for absorption by the root system of the tree.

All application of zinc to pecan trees in these areas should be applied to the leaves of the trees using a ground sprayer, preferably an air blast sprayer. The method of aerial application has been thoroughly researched in this area and has been found to be significantly more effective than ground sprayers for applying zinc to trees via foliar application. The low humidity in the area prevents aerial sprays from being efficient therefore, reduces its effectiveness. Aerial application should be used only in cases of emergencies.

Zinc sulfate (ZnSO₄) should be used as your source of zinc. The chemical Uran should be used & mixed with the zinc in the spray solution. It has been shown that Uran will increase zinc absorption by the leaf.

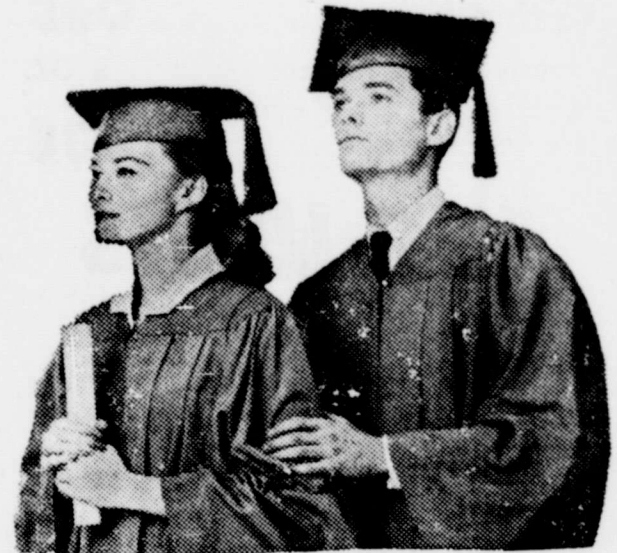
