All Three Will Be on Saturday, April 6 --

City, School and Hospital Call April Elections

In their regular meeting held Monday, February 11, the City Council, City of Rankin, officially called an election for Saturday, April 6, 1974. Positions to be filled are to include two Alderman seats and that of Mayor. Aldermen whose terms are up include M. O. Price and Ruben Peterson.

Mayor Pettit and Aldermen Price and Peterson have given City Secretary Pat Wrinkle their written request to have their names placed on the ballot for re-election.

The Council appointed Mrs. H. D. Shaw as presiding judge for the election and Mesdames Leon Houchins and Ross Wheeler as assistant judges.

In other matters, the Council approved a motion to have the fire phone bridged into the Upton County Sheriff's Department dispatch office which is in 24-hr. operation. Cost to the city is to be an additional \$4 per month, plus a \$32 installation charge. Upton County is to be charged an additional \$11 monthly rate and an \$88 installation charge.

Approved was a motion for an itemized list of every water and

gas account due for two months or more, to be reported to the City Council at the regular meeting each month.

Approved a motion to install a mercury vapor street light in front of the museum in the Yates Hotel with the City to pay the \$3.50 monthly charge.

A sample budget was presented to the council with a comparison for the 1972-1973 fiscal year revenues and expenditures. Motion was made and approved that the city secretary prepare a proposed budget, using a 15-16 percent increase to cover rising costs of labor and materials. The Council is to review the proposed budget at their next meeting.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

Rankin School Board met in regular session Tuesday night and among actions taken was the official calling of the School Board election for April 6. Two seats on the Board will be up for voting—those presently held by Board President Dr. James Gossett, and Board Member Lloyd Helms. Gossett has already filed with Business Manager W. O. Adams for

re-election. Helms was unable to attend the meeting and has not, as yet, indicated whether or not he will run again.

In other matters, the Board extended the contracts of all three principals until June 30, 1976. Also receiving contract extensions were the Business Manager, until June 30, 1975; Band Director Gordon Shultz, until May 31, 1975; School Counselor Melvin Wimberley, until May 31, 1975; Head Coach and Athletic Director Dwayne Turner, until May 31, 1976; and coaches Heffernan, Poage,

Commissioners in Monday Meeting

Upton County Commissioners met Monday, February 11 with all members of the court except Commissioner O. R. Adams present.

Among actions taken was the approval of a motion to allow Rankin Fire Department to connect by telephone to the Sheriff's Communication Center and to add another direct telephone line to McCamey.

Another motion approved included an agreement for Upton County to purchase certain equipment for use by the Rankin and McCamey Fire Departments. The details of this equipment, to be paid for from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund, are set out elsewhere in this issue of the News.

On a two to one vote, the court approved 15-cents per mile for out of county business travel mileage.

The court then recessed until 10 a.m., February 25.

Weaver was appointed to serve out the term of C. G. Taylor who resigned to accept the J. P. seat in Precinct No. 1.

Telephone Growth Increased in Rankin

Despite recession clouds on the horizon, telephone growth in Rankin is expected to remain healthy during a strong 1973, says Mike L. Sewell, manager for Southwestern Bell.

Telephones in the city total a 2 percent increase over 1972, said Sewell. "That's part of a strong 1973, says Mike L. Sewell, manager for Southwestern Bell. Sewell said if the energy crisis doesn't cause a sharp decline in economic activity, "we may see an 8 to 10 percent increase in construction dollars for Texas this year we'll be spending a billion a week in Texas to improve the telephone service, all of which can affect one service in Rankin."

Besides, if Dolph says he's not guilty, why then I believe him. A while back somebody came up with the "charge" that he had worked wet backs on some of his ranches and he said he had never done anything like that and that ended that so you gotta go along with him when he says he has not violated any of the provisions of the new election law.

It does, however, point out one fact that this newspaper, along with several others, has been trying to get across to all can-

didates; namely, you had better comply with these new laws or you are leaving yourself open for what could amount to one mighty big headache. Not everyone will be believed as readily as is Dolph when he says he's not guilty. As it now stands, this applies to ALL office seekers, be they for paying or non paying offices.

And those who make contributions or help a candidate raise money are also sticking their necks out under the new law unless they, too, meet certain requirements. One of these says in part:

"It shall be the duty of any person making one or more contributions or loans aggregating more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100) to any candidate or political committee for the purpose of any election to ascertain whether the candidate or political committee properly reports such contributions or loans, as provided in

time to time, the Legisla-

tors have asked the citizens of the
state for their suggestions on
what should or should not be in-
cluded in the new constitution.
In fact, they have a toll-free tele-
phone number anyone can call in
Austin for this purpose. If you
have suggestions or complaints a-
bout any proposal, you can get
in a lick by calling them.

I never found a lot wrong with
the old one even though it had
been amended many times to
bring it up to date. But since we
are to get a new one, I'd like to
see some provision written into it
that would put a stop to this bu-
siness of state agencies being
both the judge, jury and executor
of all rules and regulations they
think up and stick people on
without so much as a hearing or
a day in court.

For example, a game warden
finds four people in a hunting
party and among the group is one
illegal deer. He fines all four
despite the fact that only one kill-
ed the deer. An inspector from the
State Health Department comes
to Rankin and finds a leak in a
sewer line. He decides a law has
been violated and slaps on a fine.
Or another inspector decides the
water pressure on a fire plug is
not what it should be and as a
result, the insurance rates for all
Rankinites goes up.

Still another inspector decides
that a local trucker doesn't have
exactly the proper clearance light-
ing on his truck. He suspends his
operating licenses for 60 days.
Another inspector finds — and
this reportedly did happen — as
has some of the above instances,
that a place of business did not
have restrooms for men and wo-
men, despite the fact that it was
operated by a man and his wife.
A fine was assessed and another
rest room had to be built.

You could go on and on with
examples of this sort — not in
any effort to belittle any certain
state agency or their agents—as
an example, most of the game
wardens I know are decent peop-

le and I've never actually known
of a case where they abused their
authority. Maybe you do but the
point I make is that such things
do happen and this ought not be.

It may well be that it's impos-
sible to create a bureaucracy and
maintain full control over its ac-
tions but if such control could be
written into the new state consti-
tution, giving citizens full pro-
tection from abuses and persecu-
tion by those allowed to more or
less write their own laws through
bureaucratic edict, then I think
the Legislators would not only
see their offering readily adopted
by the public at the polls; but,
in addition, would bring high
praise upon themselves as having
produced a document designed to
serve the interests of free man.

Austin Report

The Constitutional Convention in Austin entered its fifth week with delegates continuing to meet in their respective committees. Committee members spent the week discussing and voting on sections of the proposed constitution. The Executive Committee tentatively approved Article IV, Section 2, on selection and terms of officers.

Lengthy discussion centered on the change in wording in earlier "straw votes" which would have replaced "Executive Department" with "Executive Branch." A substitute to the amendment passed 17-1, retaining "Executive De-

partment," which would include the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts and Commissioner of the General Land Office, as elective officers. The five elective officers of the department shall each serve four-year terms. The Committee defeated a proposal to limit the Governor and Lieutenant Governor to two 4-year terms. Instead the Committee favored an unlimited number of terms. Another question raised concerned requiring all elected officials of the executive branch to reside at the seat of government. This would force the Lt. Governor to live in Austin even though he has no duties when the Legislature is not in session and receives the same salary as legislators. I have proposed an amendment to change this residence requirement so that the Lt. Governor need not live in

Austin when the Legislature is not in session.

Appointive officers specified in the amended Section 2 include the Secretary of State. Appointive officers of the Executive branch would be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate and serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The intent is to give the Governor the power to remove officials he appoints.

Committee members then immediately turned to consideration of Section 3. Section 3 covers returns of elections, declaration of election, and tie votes and contests. Lt. Governor Bill Hobby testified late in the week before the committee, answering members' questions on several sections in the article. Hobby said he favored allowing elected officials at all levels to serve "as long as the

people elect them" to office.

By the end of the week the Executive Committee had considered and passed the first seven sections of Article IV. Discussion was continued on the remainder of Article IV.
