## For General Operations--Plus Increases --

# City Adopts New Budget of \$136,269.46

Meeting last Monday night for their regular session and, as advertised in advance, a hearing on the proposed budget for the coming fiscal year at the City, the Rankin City Council considered a number of items. Among actions taken was the formal adoption of the budget which calls for an outlay of \$136,269.46 for next year's operations. This figure is approximately the same as last year's operating expense at the City, plus an allowance for increases caused by the upward trend of prices and expenses.

In adopting the budget, possibly the first formally compiled, advertised and adopted by any Rankin City Council in recent years, the City Dads left the tax rate at \$1 on the \$100 valuation—the same as it has been for a long time. The City expects to collect some \$14,436.84 from the

current tax roll.

Funds to finance the adopted budget are to come from four main sources: the General Fund which includes the above mentioned tax levies, plus trash hauling revenue, permits, franchise taxes, etc, and is expected to produce a total of \$28,479.46. From the Systems Fund, which contains water and sewer revenue, another \$45,250 is expected to be available over the coming year; and from the Gas System, the City anticipates an income of \$62,540. A final \$7,915 will come from the City's Revenue Sharing Trust Fund.

In other matters the Council tabled a suggested increase in sewer use rates, further discussed regulators for gas meters but took no positive action at this time, and discussed and set a policy on the handling of trash (Continued to Page 5)

## Some 4000 Vehicles Tagged in County

Vehicle registration in Upton County climbed over the 4000 mark in the latest tabulation by the Tax Assessor-Collector's office. Included in the figure are all the different types of tags issued by the office, including passenger cars, trucks, trailers and cycles.

Money-wise, the County came up with some nice figures. Total value of the plates sold amounted to \$147,717. Of this amount, Upton County is to retain \$98,858 while the remainder, \$48,859, will go to the State of Texas.

"Overall, this is a substantial increase over last year," stated Edith Windham, chief office deputy in the tax office. "In round figures, it will amount to approximately ten thousand dollars."

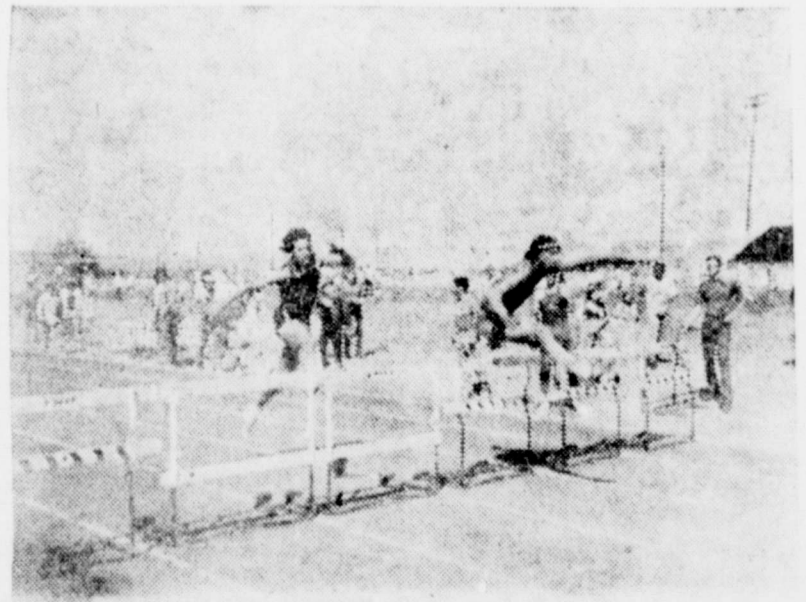
