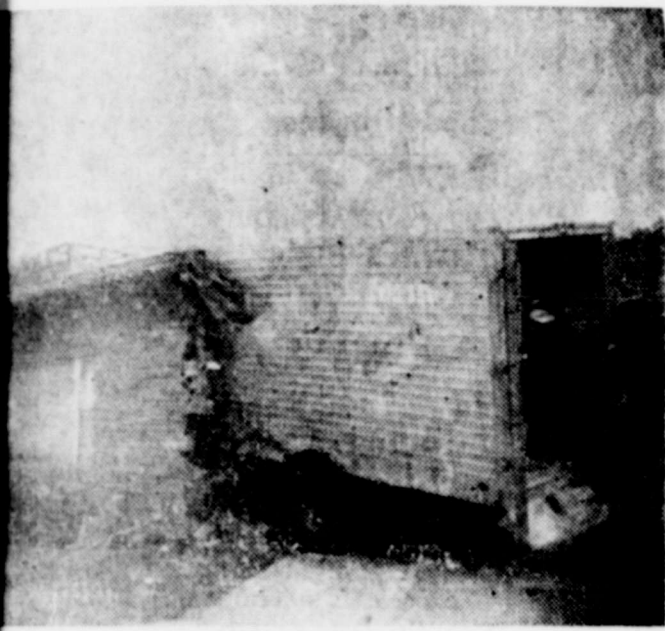

## Polls to Open at 7 Instead of 8--Two Boxes Only

# Saturday is Final Exams for Candidates

With only two boxes to be in operation in the county and both to remain open an extra hour, Upton voters will decide who is to be the next county judge and will mark their favorites in the race of U. S. Representative, 21st Congressional District, in Saturday's Run-Off election.

All voters in Precincts 1 and 2 will cast their ballots at the court house, in the Commissioners Court room on the west end of the building, while voters in Precincts 3 and 4 will vote at the McCamey Park Building.

And the polling places will be open a full twelve hours; beginning at 7 a.m. and closing at 7 p.m. This one hour extension tacked on the opening which has been at 8 a.m. in the past—is a result of actions taken this week

by the Upton County Commissioners Court. The action was taken at the request of the run-off candidates so that those who leave for out-of-town jobs will have an opportunity to vote before going to work.

In the race for county judge, Walter J. Campbell, Jr. and Peggy Garner are expected to put on a repeat performance of their earlier race when both received the same number of votes in the May 6 First Primary and advanced into the run-off. Both have "given it a good go" for the past weeks with lots of leg work and a strong advertising campaign.

In the U. S. Congressional race that covers some 32 Texas counties, the candidates are Nelson Wolff, a San Antonio lawyer and Texas State Senator, and Bob Krueger, a New Braunfels busi-

ness man and former Duke University College professor. With the urban areas expected to be the deciding factor with their large voting blocks, both candidates have; nevertheless, worked hard in the rural areas and both have visited Rankin, Krueger on several occasions.

Upton County Judge Allen Moore who was a candidate for the seat until eliminated in the First Primary, has endorsed Krueger as his favorite in the race, saying that he feels "West Texas and our area will get better representation if Bob Krueger is our man in Washington."

Interest in the election appears to be reasonably strong with over 100 absentee votes having been cast at the office of County Clerk Buena Coffee. Only a short period was available for absentee balloting in the run-off.

### Start Here on June 11th

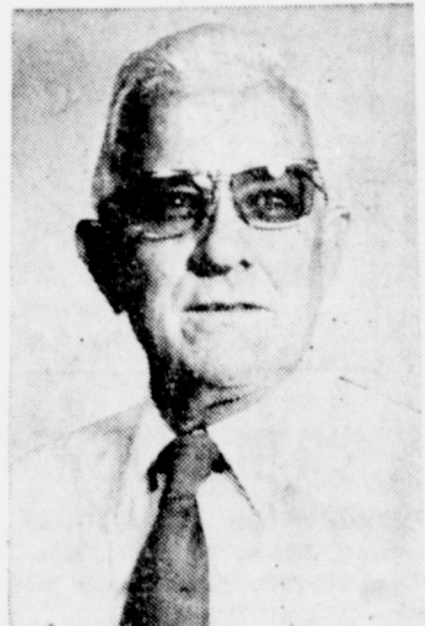

## THE LAST CALL —

For all practical purposes Saturday will be the last round in the 1974 elections. Of course, in November we will hold a General Election, but it will be strictly a formality. Any Republican, not running unopposed, has about the same chance of getting elected as I would of being named "best sport in Rankin."

So if you want to have any say-so about who will be your next county judge and your next representative in Washington, you had better take the little bit of time it will take and cast your vote.

This is especially true in the race for U. S. Congressman. It seems that once you're elected to a Federal office, you have a lifetime job, with minor exceptions, and those that are limited to a given term such as President. O. C. Fisher held the office 32 years. That would mean that the candidate elected Saturday — should

he be in office that long, will be around until the year of 2006—if he lives that long and both candidates are relatively young men.

As noted at the beginning of the year, the News does not endorse local candidates except in rare instances. One reason is I don't want to get punched in the ear and another is that most are well known to the voters and there's little for any candidate to gain by an endorsement; he might lose a few votes, but I doubt that he'd gain many.

In the case of district, state and national races, it has long been the policy of this column to speak out on the candidates in the various races—not necessarily with any intent of trying to tell you how to vote but to try to put before you the facts as I may have learned them. All the newspapers, even one the size of The Rankin News, gets reams of

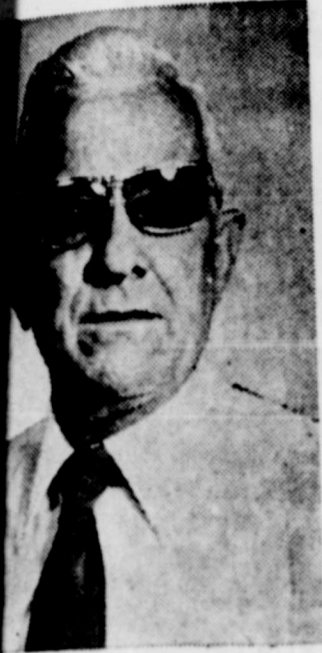

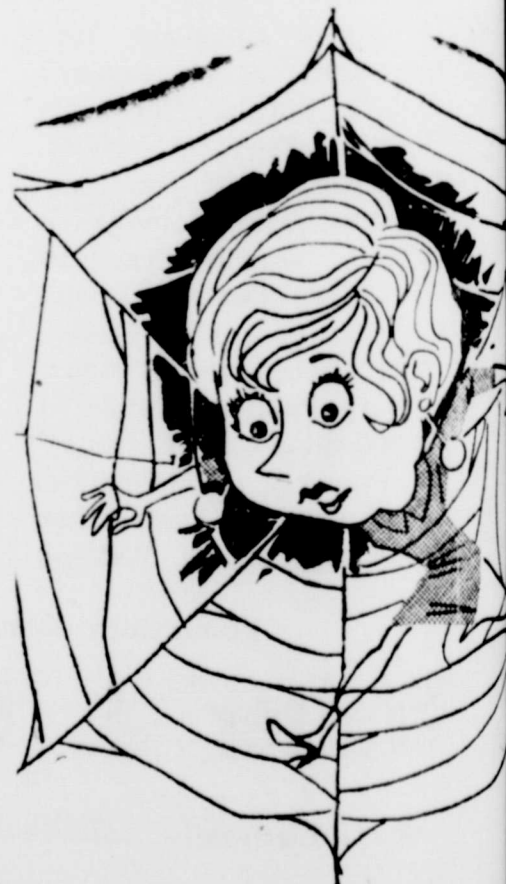

material every election on the candidates and their stands—plus the fact that most will come by at least once for a short visit.

In the case of Wolff and Krueger, this has been one of the biggest races in terms of money spent and effort put forth that I have seen in a long time. Both candidates seem to be well heeled and both have worked the district from top to bottom.

Each calls himself a conservative and is trying to tag the other as being a liberal. Personally, I'm not too impressed with political labels and I'm not at all sure that we need a rock-ribbed conservative any more than we need a cut and dried liberal representing us in Washington. We do need a man who can get something done and, again, personally, I never thought O. C. Fisher ever cut it very well in that department.

Neither do I like to see a picture of him pointing to Wolff and saying in effect, "this is my be-

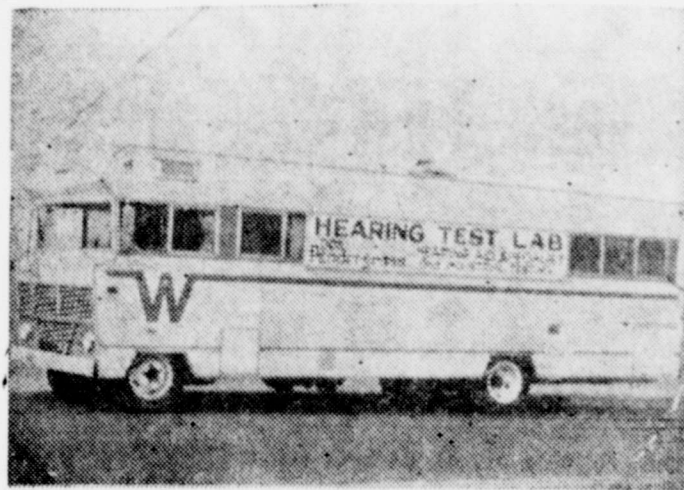
loved son; he shall inherit my throne." But I guess I could live with that for we Texans seldom have much of an opportunity of voting for a candidate who is not hand picked for us by the state political powers. Remember when Lyndon sent John Connally down from Washington to be our Governor? It worked.

Wolff is the professional politician, with his finger in all the right pie and given enough time, may some day be a big man in Texas. That I can take for that's about the way the game's played in big-time politics. Only on rare occasions can an "outsider" beat the system.

But I guess the thing that cuts it the deepest with me about Wolff is the fact that he's already a State Senator and has been for some time and I've yet to observe anyone in Austin who is doing such a great job that I would want him in Washington. On the contrary, most of them ought to be sent back to the boondocks—or wherever they came from.

So this leave Krueger. I'm not too carried away with him either but he does come across as some one who just might vote for a principle instead of a party machine should he ever get to Washington. And for my money, we've got about all the party politicians we can stand right now.

In any case, and regardless of which candidate you vote for, go vote. If we have any hope at all of ever getting this mess we're in straightened out, it's going to be at the polls. When you don't vote, you're turning your back on the American system and saying in effect, "I give up." I don't believe it's gone that far yet.

## Time for Pecan Nut Casebearer Control

By Dub Day  
County Extension Agent

Small pecan nut casebearer larvae have been observed feeding on small pecan nutlet clusters in Upton County. Control measures should be applied during the period from May 24 through June 2.

Homeowners should check pecan trees for pecan nut casebearer damage to pecan nutlets. Chemical control measures should be applied as soon as the first damaged nutlet is observed. A second chemical application is often required about 7 days after the first applications.

Insecticides for control of pecan

nut casebearer in home yard trees are Sevin and Malathion. The insecticide used for pecan nut casebearer control can be mixed with zinc sulfate to prevent zinc deficiency.

Rate of application:

1 Tablespoon sevin per gallon of water

1 Tablespoon zinc sulfate

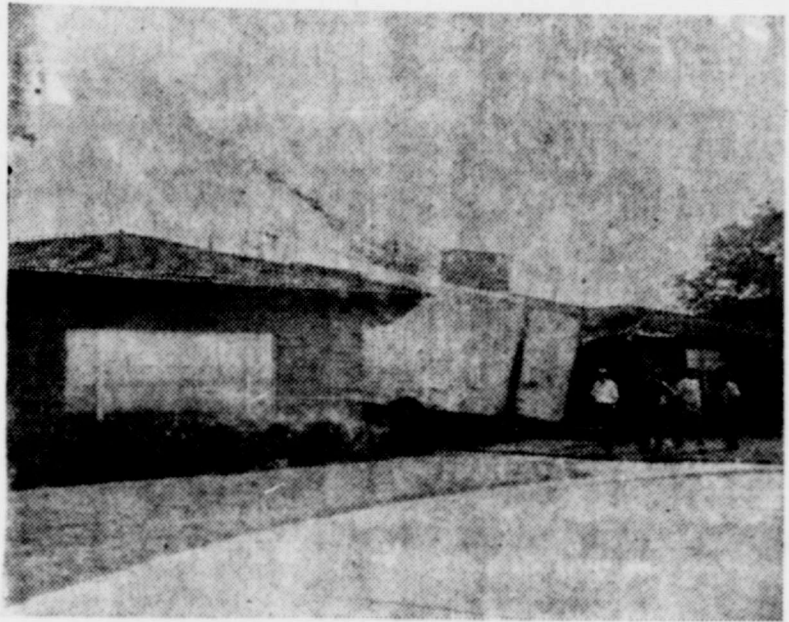
