## David Binkley Appointed Directors

### The Rankin First State Bank

Directors of First State Bank met in their regular meeting on Thursday, January 9 among other actions taken, the appointment to the Board of Directors of Johnnie Hurst and David Binkley. Hurst is a resident of the local bank and Binkley is a vice-president of the bank.

The bank's financial statement for the close of business December 31, 1974 was released for publication this week. It indicates a substantial gain in total assets for that of a similar period a year ago—the current total reflecting a total of \$3,005,850.50, as compared with \$2,800,000 a year ago.

Total deposits were also up at the bank with \$6,123,294.56 currently on deposit as compared with \$5,860,955.66 last year. Of the current deposits, \$3,117,444.06 is in demand deposits and \$3,005,850.50 is in time and savings deposits—both categories up over last year's figures.

Another area showing an increase on the statement is in "Other Loans" where the present total is at \$1,901,588.51, as compared to \$1,834,189.12. This is the first time in recent statement releases that this particular category has shown a gain over the previous similar quarter.

Undivided profits showed only a slight drop, currently listed at \$395,758.48, as compared to last year's \$400,626.38. On January 2, 1975, the bank declared a dividend of \$15,750 to be divided among stockholders.

## Rankin has 33.25" Rainfall in 1974

In what will probably stand as a record for many years to come, Rankin officially tallied up a rainfall of 33.25 inches in 1974. Mr. Fred Welling, the official U. S. Weather Bureau reporter for Rankin, gathered the record-setting statistic for his year-end report.

It well surpasses the average of 12.7 inches for Upton County and is believed to be the highest amount of rain in Rankin since official records have been kept.

For the first fifteen days of 1975, it has been back to business as usual with approximately a quarter of an inch of moisture recorded—some of that in the form of a light, blowing snow last Sunday.

## Upton County 4-H Club Membership Now Taking Orders for Spring Plants

Upton County 4-H Club members are now selling plants for spring planting within the next two months. In explaining their efforts, the club membership has pointed out that the general public cannot buy plants in the county; therefore, the club hopes to perform a public service and raise money for the State 4-H Center at Brownwood at the same time. Each county in the state has an allotment to raise for the Center and the Upton Club hopes this will be a good way to come up with their share.

Each club member will be selling and taking orders. A colored brochure will be shown prospective buyers in order that they may select the plants they want. In Rankin, orders may also be placed at Ranchers Wool and Supply, or by calling the county extension agent's office.

Some of the suggested plants that will do well in Upton County include: dahlia bulbs, gladiolus bulbs, a hanging basket plus one begonia bulb, and hardy lily plants.

Others that some might want to try are strawberry plants, asparagus plants and the giant aster flower.

All of the items sell for \$1.25.

There will be an order blank to be filled out and the bulbs will be sent to purchasers by mail from the Extension Office.

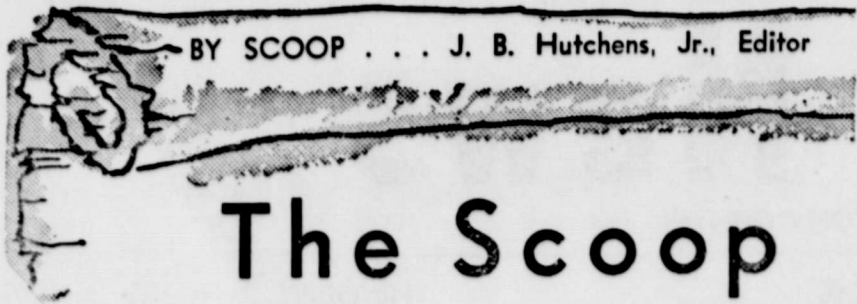

bribe and to this day, I've never said a word about his frolicking ways. After all, what's money when you've got your health.

Still, just once, ten big ones would look mighty tempting and I can see where there's no shortage of takers in this bribe business.

**NOT ANOTHER ONE -**

Take to the hills. The wizards of Washington are cooking up another tax cut for us. It seems to me that every time Washington cuts taxes, it costs me more money and I just don't see how I can afford another tax cut at this time.

Now take, for instance, this present plan that gives everyone a 12 percent refund on their 1974 income tax—it comes with strings attached—like a hike in the gasoline tax. That's going to work out about like walking up to some kid and saying, "Here, Sonny, I'm going to give you this cookie and take away your cake."

Although it hasn't been spelled out in detail as yet—nor enacted into law—it's said that the plan is a straight 12 percent refund on the income tax. I don't think that will include taxes paid on social security. So, if it's a straight 12 percent refund, that is going to mean that a single person paying on a \$10,000 annual income will get back about \$150, according to the tax tables in the current package sent out to everyone since the first of the year. At the same time, a man and wife with two kids, also paying on \$10,000 annual income, is to get back about \$75—those with more kids will get even less and if they have as many as six kids, they will get almost nothing.

But all will get the gasoline tax increase and the number of dependants won't necessarily be a factor—unless they happen to be teenagers, in which case ole pappa is going to pay more tax than the single man—and if you

don't believe that, you have never had a teenager who passed driver ed. (Do any of them ever fail that subject?)

Now the gas tax will vary—depending a lot on where you live and how much you drive. Out here in West Texas where we probably average around 15 to 20 thousand miles a year in driving, it's going to be a lot bigger than our 12 percent refund. And it's not going to help much if any on reducing the amount of gasoline consumed. As long as folk have the money and can get the gas, they're apparently are going to drive the car; no matter what the cost.

And on top of that, businesses will pass their increased costs on to the consumer and away we will go with more inflation. I certainly don't know what the answer to our present economic delima is, but I'll bet you my putting ball that the scheme we get out of Washington will be just one more fiasco—like all the others have been.

But not to worry. You see, we are all going to get our gas tax money back in the form of lower income taxes in 1975. Mama, why are the mean ole men in Washington taking away our money in the first place if they are going to give it back to us? Hur, mama, why?

**Roy Priest Dead at the Age of 79**

Funeral services were held in Austin Saturday, January 11 for Roy Priest, long-time Rankin resident and former district attorney of the 83rd Judicial District. He died January 9 in a Denton nursing home at the age of 79 and had been in ill health for the past several years. Burial was in Austin.

Priest served as district attorney in the 83rd District from about 1928 until 1940. He practiced law in Rankin during that time also and maintained his offices here until about the mid-1950's.

Survivors include one son, Roy Priest, Jr., of the Dallas area. He was preceded in death by another son and his first and second wives.

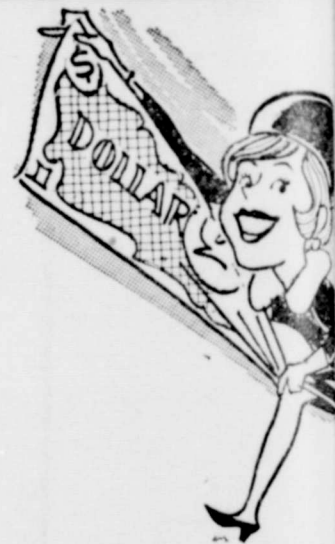

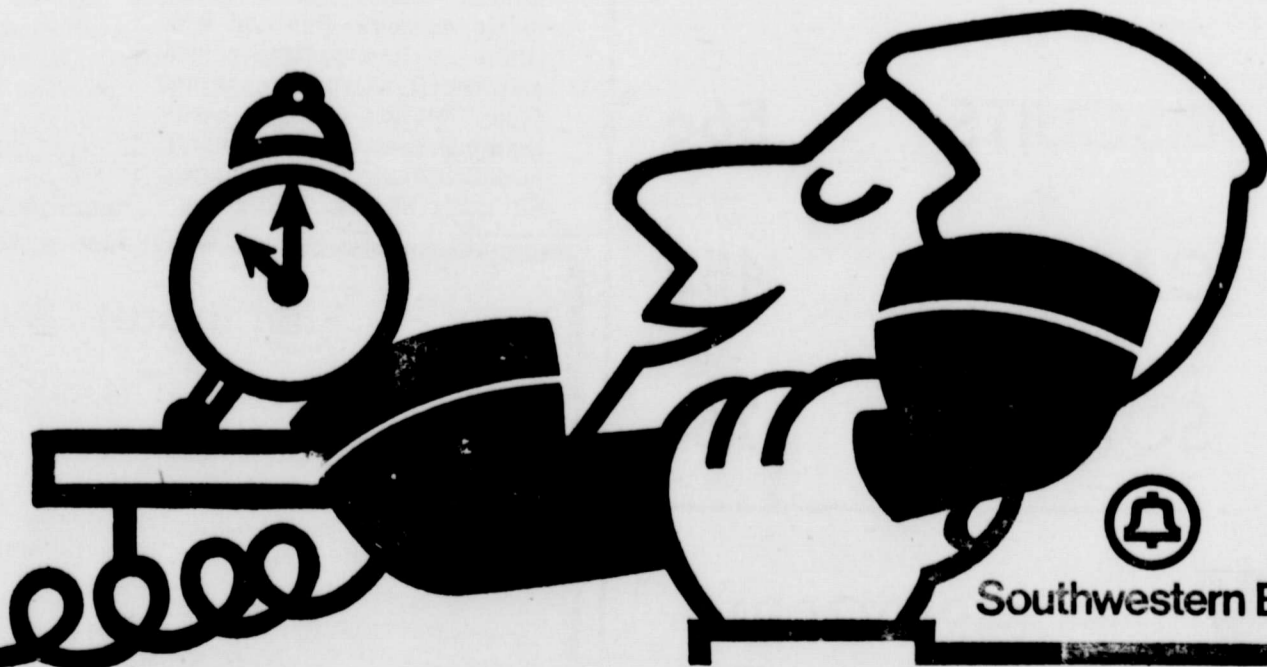
