Tax Office Tells of **Voter and Vehicle Registration Needs**

The office of Tax Assessor-Collector S. O. "Sid" Langford today released two items that will be of importance to Upton residents. One has to do with voter registration; the other with auto registrations.

For the voters, it is a reminder that unless they have cast a ballot in a primary or General election within the past three years, their voter eligibility has now expired and they must reregister before they can vote in any elections. Also, if the voter has moved or changed his or her address- in any mannerthey must so notify the Assessor's office of these changes in order to be eligible to vote in the upcoming school, city and hospital elections.

In the case a voter's eligibility has expired, the local office has plans to notify them in writing of the requirements to re-register. However, if those who have let their eligibility lapse would take the time to register again, it would save considerable time

VEHICLE TAGS

Beginning February 1, the new Texas vehicle license plates will be issued to owners. These are of galvanized steel - the old types used in previous years were made of tin-and they are to stay with the vehicle to which they are assigned for a period of five years.

Henceforth, for the annual renewal, the vehicle owner will get a tab instead of a new plate. A savings of \$10.5 million dollars in the cost of metal alone will be realized by the State of Texas through the use of this method of registration.

Vehicle owners have already received their renewal notices. After February 1, these may be taken in person to the tax office in the courthouse, or the substation in McCamey. However, they may also be mailed directly to the tax office-along with (Continued to Page 7)


RHS Students at Lubbock Meet




Don't be surprised or upset if your language undergoes achange, terms like "chicken-hearted, old hen, egg-head, hen party," and many more will creep into your everyday life.


ment or to stuff pillows. It is possible that this period of your history will be known as the "Egg Revolution."

In this, my first report to the District since it honored me by electing me its Representative, I want to comment on two things: the state of Congress and the state of the Union.

First, the state of the Congress. Some press reports have suggested that the large number of new members means that the new Congress will be "liberal." I disagree. Most of the new members come from basically conservative districts, like ours, and I doubt that those members campaigned in favor of big new spending programs. Further, I doubt that they will vote for such programs. Certainly I do not intend to.

What the new Congress has done, however, is to bring reforms and procedures that alter the seniority system. Now districts with new congressmen have a chance of a more equal voice, so that they can be represented as effectively as the districts of long-time senior members. This change reflects democracy: all congressional districts should be equal and their need be no apology for these reforms. They will help the 21st District and the American system.

Second, the state of the Union. The President in his address said that the state of the Union "is not good." I disagree. Yes, we have problems: high inflation, deepening recession, uncertainty about our national direction. But improvement lies within our power. We can work to control federal spending, and I will do so. We can give shortterm, immediate tax relief to those most in need, as the President suggests, but we must always recognize that money spent today must be paid tomorrow, and I have strong reservations about the massive deficits that the President is asking for and that some in Congress will be willing to provide. The only way that I know to restore govern-

ment to sound financial footing and to control inflation is to have the government live within its income. I will work for that, and I will work to find others to join me.

I hope to use these columns to give you a first-hand report from your Representative on events in Washington, and I hope you will call on me for help with any particular problem.

Emergency Loans Available Locally

Judge Peggy Garner announced today that farmers and ranchers in Upton County, who sustained production losses as a result of drought from September 30, 1973 to September 15, 1974 and excessive rainfall and flooding from September 16, 1974 to October 13, 1974, may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

Those who have not received emergency loans to assist them in recovering from their loses may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 505 North Main Street, P. O. Drawer 1150, Fort Stockton, before close of business on March 13, 1975 for physical losses and October 14, 1975 for production losses.

These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law (P.L. 93-237) enacted on January 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

duction losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975. Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for the loans is 5 percent and there will be no principal cancellation. The loans must be secured by crops, live-

Do It Right In Spring Plantings

If you're planning on adding trees or shrubs to your home landscape this winter, make sure you plant them correctly, says Dub Day, County Extension Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The first step in planting bare-root or balled-and-burlapped plants is to dig a hole large enough for the plant," says Day.

"For a bare-root plant, the hile should be large enough to allow the root system to spread out. The plant should be planted as deep as its original soil line.

This is usually two to three inches above the uppermost root."

For a balled-and - burlapped plant, the hole should be about one-and-a-half times the diameter of the bayy, according to Day. Plant it so that the top of the soil ball is at the surface of the soil.

The next step, says the county agent, is to fill the hole with a good soil mixture such as peat moss and topsoil. Then water the plant thoroughly,

A soil ridge around the edge of the hole will help hold rainwater in dry areas as well as facilitate watering with a garden hose.

"Use fertilizer only after the plant has started growing," he adds.
