Commissioners OK More Water Hunt

The Upton County Commissioner's Court met Monday, February 17 in a Regular Session with all members present. Among matters attended to was the consideration of a report by Freese, Nichols & Esmond, a consulting engineering and hydrologist firm employed by the Court last year to study water conditions along a tract of land West of the Iraan Highway with the idea in mind of developing an underground water field for use by Rankin and McCamey in their municipal water supply.

Although a copy of the report by the engineers was not made a part of the minutes of the court meeting, it is reported that some indications have been developed that show usable amount of underground water is available in the area. The quality of the water found so far is said to be somewhat on the brackish side.

In their Monday session the Court voted unanimously to authorize the engineering firm to continue their investigations of the water program. Another re-



Our good friends in Washington are tricky about feeding us pap. For example, we see all sorts of figures about the rise in the cost of living, especially in the cost of the grocery bill—and it has gone up; nobody denies that. What they fail to mention is that one of the highest jumps percentagewise over the past year has been in taxes—local, state and federal.

A nice little example of how a tax is slipped onto a taxpayer can be found in the current tax return form. For we who are self-employed, the tax rate on Social Security was cut from .08 percent to .079—a grande .001 percent. But, and here's the kicker, the total amount upon which we pay went from \$864.00 in 1973 to \$1,042.80 in 1974, up \$178.80 or about 20 percent.

I don't have the figures for those of you who work for someone else but you can bet that you were not overlooked.

As for the upcoming hike in postage, a tax by any other name still smells just as rotten, and for what? Can we expect a 30 percent improvement in service? Not likely. Can we expect any reduction in the amount of junk mail that adds to the cost of operating the Postal Service— even a 30 percent cut? Not likely.

Last Monday, and Mondays are an "off" day for mail at the News Office. I received a total of twelve pieces of mail. One was important, another was opened and filed in "13" and the other ten— all in the junk class as far as I'm concerned—was never opened and as a rule would have never been carried past the closest trash can in the post office.

But I guess our Congressmen in Washington are too busy to look into these things. It takes up all their time running for reelection — or president — and trying to lay the blame on everbody else for whatever happens to be going wrong at any given

time. Naturally, they will want to work in a raise for themselves to help fight inflation.

It has always been something of an amazement to me as to the amount of abuse the voters will tolerate from those holding high public office. It leads me to believe that I am something of a cynic; that most people have a lot more faith in our government to muddle through than I have for we get the same old faces from year to year, making the same old speeches and coming up with the same old solutions. Through it all, the rich seem to get richer, the poor have food stamps and welfare and the middle class pay the bills.

And yet, comes election day, only about 30 percent will go to the polls and the rest go fishing—saying, in effect, it's all no concern of mine.

Foster Parents Sought in Area by Texas Department of Public Welfare

Quite frequently, it becomes necessary to remove children from their own homes and families because conditions there threaten their well being. These children have been ether abused or neglected and such circumstances cannot provide the sort of environment that children need.

Sometimes the parents are in a difficult situation and just need some help over the rough spots. Other parents may not know how to deal with their own problems and take out their aggressive feelings on their children.

Some parents are just not aware that the form of discipline they use with their children is considered abusive. The result is their children are physically and emotionally injured.

The Texas Department of Public Welfare is seeking homes for these children. These homes must provide love and understanding as well as physical care. Especially needed are homes which will care for infants.

Foster parents must be willing to take a child for a day, a week possibly even a year, and realize the day will come when they must give him up. Foster parents can help prepare the child for the move whether it be to an adoptive home or returning to his parents.

Being a foster parent is not easy, but it can be very rewarding. It requires an unusually large amount of love, patience, understanding and stamina,

Foster parents may designate the sex, the age group, and the number of children acceptable to them. They may accept or refuse to take any child that is brought to them.

The process of becoming a foster parent has certain guidelines. To become a foster parent your family is required to visit with the licensing worker. Your family must have a medical check-up, and your home will need to be inspected by fire and health inspectors.
