Voters Cast Ballots Saturday

Voters in the City of Rankin, the Rankin Independent School District and the Rankin Hospital District will go to the polls on Saturday, April 5, and make their selections for City Council, School Board of Trustees, and Hospital Board of Directors. All polling places will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

Qualified voters residing inside the city limits of Rankin will cast their ballots at the City Hall in the conference room; those living within the boundries of Rankin Independent School District, in the main lobby at the High School, and those in Rankin Hospital District-the same boundries as the schools-at the conference room at the hospital.

In the City Council election, six candidates are in a contest for three aldermen seats. In-

cumbents are Bo Rose, Sr., Tommy Latham and Darrel Northcott, Challenging are James Covill, Jr., Don Vickers and Jesse Perritt.

For the School Board, running unopposed for three year terms, are incumbents Joe Loftin, C. E. Taylor and Ray Barrett, Jr. Also unopposed is Rusty Ratliff for an unexpired two-year term. For a one-year unexpired term, three are in the race; Jimmie Lee, Sam Fitzhugh and Eddie Hyatt. Ratliff and Fitzhugh are appointees by the School Board to fill vacancies when former elected members moved.

At the hospital, with three to be elected, all three incumbents are unopposed.

With the School Business Office closed for holidays, an exact count was not available; however, a check with W. O. Adams on Monday would indicate around 80 ballots cast there. At the City Hall, the count was 45 and the Hospital had 5.



Austin Report

Texas drivers will continue to drive 55 m.p.h. and Texas will receive its federal highway funds as a result of action taken by the Texas Legislature. The Texas House and Senate this week adopted the conference committee report on H. B. 139 by two-thirds votes, thus enabling this bill to go into effect immediately, H. B. 139 as passed extends the present speed limit law and provides for review by the State Highway De partment every 120 days. The sponsors of H. B. 139 were anxious that it pass and be signed by Gov. Briscoe by April 1 so as not to lose \$606 million in federal highway funds for noncompliance with the federal 55 m.p.h. limit.

As you know, Rep. Pete Lanev and I were also sponsoring a 55 m.p.h. speed limit bill, However, our bill provides that the maximum fine for a conviction for a violation between 55 and 70 m.p.h. would be \$25 including court costs and any such conviction would not be put on a driver's record to result in increased insurance rates or loss of one's license. Both versions of the speed limit bill were passed by the House and sent to the Senate but the Senate took action only on H. B.

I am certainly not in favor of wasting fuel. and under my version of the bill those who drive between 55 and 70 m.p.h would pay a fine for such waste. However. I do not feel that insurance rates should be raised for violation of a fuel saving device. Only careless, reckless driving should be penalized by increased insurance premiums and driving between 55 and 70 m.p.h. is not in itself reckless and careless.

The House passed by a vote of 135-0 Senate Bill 3 which provides that the Railroad Commission shall require gas or oil produced under any lease of

Included are lands in any state-owned tract such as the prison system, experiment stations, lands owned by colleges and universities, and offshore properties. This requirement covers all lands on which the surface may be owned by others but the minerals are retained by the state.

It is estimated that the state owns mineral rights under almost 23 million acres.

The Commission can make exceptions if there can be shown that any producer or operator would suffer undue economic hardship, or waste would result from the enforcement.

News Flash! Golfers Lose

It's news when the Red Devil Golfers win another tournament. It is probably bigger news when they lose one-having wound up in this position only a very few times in the past several years.
