


Rankin High Qualifying Students For State Finals Competition in May







Time To Spray Your Pecan Trees

BY DUB DAY County Extension Agent

This is the time for you to spray pecan trees with zinc. According to research, when the bud first breaks, the first application should be applied; then seven days later, the second application should be made, followed fourteen days later with a third application.

The mixture for this is as follows: 2 lbs. zinc sulfate per 100 gallons water, plus 11/2 quarts of

For small spryer: 3 gallons of water, 3 tablespoons zinc sulfate, 1 tablespoon of uran.

If you can get zinc nitrate, it is better than the zinc sulfate. However, any zinc is much better than none.

In order to get good growth on young pecan trees, zinc is the most important element for West

When the third application is made, a little sevin can be added to the mixture. This is also at the same rate as the zinc: 2 lbs. per 100 gallons of water or 2 tablespoons per 3 gallons of


